Mr. Reed is Chairman of the Continuing Education Program at San Jacinto College Central Campus and is also Director for Information Technology at the Aerospace Academy for Engineering and Teacher Education in Clear Lake City. The Aerospace Academy is an education-industry-government collaboration and was developed to address the shortages of engineers and other high technology practitioners plus the mathematics and science teachers needed to produce that work force. He has had many speaking engagements and traveled extensively with this position.


### Heritage Cookbook By Carol Moody

# Transcribing Old Documents By Carolyn Traweek Hellen



One of the most rewarding experiences in researching is to find an original record concerning one of your ancestors. The next most rewarding

experience is being able to read the record you found.

To read the old records and interpret the handwriting, you must become familiar with the old styles of writing. The study of these writing styles is called paleography.


When trying to read difficult or unfamiliar handwriting, try the following suggestions:

- 1. Do not try to read every word at first. Read through the text or a good portion of it and pick out any words or phrases you recognize.
- 2. Write out the document using the words you can make out and drawing a line for the words you can't. When you finish, read the document. Sometimes the missing words are evident by the context.
- 3. When you see a letter you don't recognize, compare it to letters in previous sentences.
- 4. Remember, the old way of spelling doesn't always correspond with today's spelling. Double letters often use the symbol "f" and "th" is often added to the end.
- 5. Keep an open mind.
- 6. Be careful. An error in transcription could change the entire meaning of the document.

Practice makes perfect; the more you read old documents, the easier it will become.

FYI: "Soldiers disease" was a Civil War euphemism for morphine addiction. Some 400,000 soldiers left the war addicted to morphine.


