University of Houston Reference Librarian to Speak at May Meeting

Gay E. Carter, Reference/Documents Librarian at the Alfred R.

Neumann Library, University of Houston - Clear Lake, will be our guest speaker at the May 19th meeting of the Bay Area Genealogical Society. The title of her speech will be "Hidden Gold: Using a University Library for Genealogical Research." She will explain how to use the reference section of the University of Houston - Clear Lake Library for research in ways that may not have occurred to you.

Gay is a charter member of the UHCL staff, having started work there in 1974. She supervises the library's depository collections for both the Texas and United States government publications.

Gay first became involved in genealogical research in 1970. She has

From Your Newsletter Committee by Ralph Hall

Ongoing work by your committee continues to produce a very nice-looking, informational newsletter. We hope you agree! Member Linda Coltharp has suggested we explore the possibility of arranging, for members who want it, the receipt of newsletter via email. Members that do not own a computer and printer would continue to receive their copy by regular mail.

This holds exciting promise in several areas. First of all, we know that the cost of every newsletter printed and mailed is steadily rising. Not counting the considerable number of volunteer hours donated each month to this process, actual out-of-pocket costs are currently about \$120/month, or \$1,440/year. Maintaining this level or even reducing it, via the use of email as membership levels rise, could bode well for our Society in the future. Second, for cost reasons, we print your newsletter in black and white only. Color copies are exorbitantly high. The originals we take to the printer each month are so attractive because they are expertly done on a color printer. We always feel depressed seeing those vibrant color photos and borders disappear at the print shop! Copies from your own color printer would really be nice to have. Third, members wanting information a little earlier each month would have access to the email version about a week in advance of normal mail. At any rate, we are now at the point of determining just what is required for us to provide this service and will know soon if the newsletter will be available via our BAGS website. Stay tuned for further developments!

We are also working on a more standardized process for newsletter publishing. "Deadline" dates for submission of information, articles, or reports have been moving targets, as it seems. For the immediate future, please read this column to obtain the deadlines for future submissions. For the June newsletter, your deadline is Wednesday, June 1, 2002. 

Library Master Plan





Many of you have heard about the new Library Master Plan and have asked about

some of the rumors concerning Clayton Library. A number of genealogical societies met recently to discuss the situation. The first order of business was to select a spokesperson to meet with Barbara Gubbin, director of the Library Department of the City of Houston, to find out what information was indeed rumor and what was fact concerning closing Clayton Library on Saturdays and closing early on Mondays and Tuesdays. David Singleton was selected for this position. He is to meet with Ms. Gubbin and will call another meeting to inform the genealogical community of his findings.


Mr. Singleton shared a letter from Ms. Gubbin that addressed the allegations posted on *Housnitch* (www.housnitch.com) and sent to Council Members and others. In her letter, Mrs. Gubbin said that there is no plan, nor has there ever been one, to "dissolve our Central Library and our historic Julia Ideson Building." The Julia Ideson Building contains the "Texas Room" where many papers, manuscripts, and books are kept. Ms. Gubbin further stated that the Texas Room and the Archives will remain in the Julia Ideson Building as part of the Central Library complex.

Several at the meeting gave a first-hand account of how volumes of books, papers, and other items are being sold by the library at a fraction of their cost. One of our past speakers had purchased a remarkable deal for only \$20.00. The staff was told to take what they wanted of things

being dispersed from Central Library because they were going to be disposed of. Another speaker received a wonderful first edition free. So

More information will be made available to you as it is acquired. I would hope that the members of the Bay Area Genealogical Society would be willing do their part in any letter writing




campaign, etcetera, needed to inform the Mayor and the City Council members of our thoughts regarding negative changes for Clayton Library.

What Time is it Please? Submitted by Carol Garrett Moody

Before 1883, more than 50 time zones existed in the United States. Each town determined its time based on the noon position of the sun. With the development of the railroad and the need for accurate travel schedules, this lack of a standard time system caused chaos.

Canadian engineer Sir Stanford Fleming proposed a solution. Fleming's system of 24 world time zones was adopted by the American Railway Association on Nov. 18, 1883 and was authorized by Congress in 1918.
