

Never one to miss an opportunity to tout the Bay Area Genealogical Society, while there I managed to get Emily Croom to agree to speak to us next year. I also met two prospects from our area, who promised to be at our next meeting, and talked Trever Wooster Beverly into giving a seminar in November. Trever is a very knowledgeable speaker on genealogical research and is a delight to hear.

A great bonus of the conference was that it was considered a college course and we received a certificate from the college giving our college credits. I highly recommend that you make plans now to attend next year.

Chasin' Wimmin' in Probate and Property Records

The Problem: Since you don't know the maiden name, you don't know her father's surname and cannot find her parent's will by checking the index of testators.

- Some (very few) courts have a "Beneficiaries'
 (Devisees') Index" which will list your lady by
 her married name, which you know, thus
 leading you to her parent's will.
- 2) Published county or regional abstracts of wills today should include an every-name index. There is a high probability that this index will list either your lady's married name or her husband's name, which you know, and this will lead you to her parent(s). An example: For twenty years I had been looking for the maiden name of Rosa, first wife of Owen Smith of Prince Edward Co., VA. One of my students subscribed to "The Southside Virginian," which lists records of about twenty counties. The index of one issue listed Owen Smith, which led to the will of Owen's father-in-law, Benjamin Hawkins. Though Rosa was not mentioned in the will, I now learned her maiden name was Rosa Hawkins. (If the will is that of your lady's mother, beware that the mother's surname is not that of a later marriage which will not be your lady's surname.)
- When the widow is executrix of her husband's estate, co-executors often are her brothers or other family.
- 4) "Partitioning" records show the division of a father's estate among his children, but her



name probably won't appear in the court index.

5) As a last ditch effort, scan every will of the likely location and time for the name of your lady and/or her husband.

Property Records

- A "Quit Claim Deed" signed by her and her husband, or by her husband or children if she has died, often refers to property owned by her parents or a brother. After twenty-five years of searching, I recently found the maiden name and parents of a g-g-gm through a Quit Claim executed in Ohio for land in Massachusetts.
- Deed "for Love and Affection" or a "Trust Deed" from parent to married daughter.
- Husband's mortgage was often carried by wife's father or brother. Here's a clue. Check the will of these mortgagors for your lady as a beneficiary.
- 4) Using the proximity theory (people married neighbors), copy the names of neighbors in many types of records, for example:
 - a) Deeds; the boundary description in the "metes and bounds" colonial system often lists adjoining neighbors.

- b) Road (maintenance) Orders for her area of the county or town.
- c) Processioning Orders: check property boundaries, then scan the wills of these neighbors, hoping to find your lady as a beneficiary. Witnesses to all sorts of documents often were family.
- 5) Federal Census:
 - a) 1880 and later: The relationship of all household members to the head-of-household is shown. "Mother-in-law" is the name you want, if she has not remarried.
 - b) In censuses 1850-1870, the older woman may be a mother-in-law bearing the wife's maiden name. But Ma-in-law may have remarried and thus will send you up the wrong road! Or, less likely, she may be the mother of a deceased former wife of the head. Could be an aunt, etc. Look further!
