
Locating Your Ancestor's Home in Europe

At our October meeting, Wolfram M. Von-Maszewski will speak on researching overseas ancestors. Mr. Von-Maszewski was born and raised in Europe. He received his BA and MA degrees in anthropology from the University of Texas at Austin. He did additional work in American studies at the University of Colorado and in genealogy through Brigham Young University.

Mr. Von-Maszewski has produced several publications: <u>Index to the Trail</u>

<u>Drivers of Texas</u>; <u>The Volkfest in Brenham</u>, <u>Texas</u>; <u>A Sojourn in Texas</u>, <u>1846-47</u>, a translation of the experience of an early German traveler in Texas; <u>German</u>

Emigration Ships to New Orleans,
1865-1869; and most recently, Voyage to
North America, 1844-45, a translation with
notes of Prince Carl of Solms's Texas diary;
Solms coordinated the movement of German
settlers into Texas and became the founder of
New Braunfels. His current project is the
translation and compilation of letters and




Civil War.

Mr. Von-Maszewski was president of the German-Texan Heritage Society for several terms, and in the year 2000 he was invited to Germany to speak on emigration as well as on the commercial relationship between the port of

Bremerhaven, Germany, and the port of Galveston in the 1800s. Professionally, Mr. Von-Maszewski is a Certified Genealogical Records Searcher (CGRS) and the manager of the Genealogy and Local History Department at George Memorial Library, Richmond, Texas. The things this society can accomplish never cease to amaze me. According to Carolyn Farmer, we now have over 2,000 names in our Surname Database and, as Paul Harvey would say,

"now for the rest of the story." Carolyn's committee, Stephanie Struby and Dick Warren have compiled these names into a format that includes your surnames and BAGS ID number. A booklet will be printed with these surnames placed alphabetically in the front. Your name, address, telephone, and ID number, as they appear in the yearbook, will be printed in the back. These booklets will then be sold at the Texas State Genealogical Society in Galveston.

This is a common practice for genealogical societies. It is like sending out a giant query with all of your surnames listed at once. One advantage is that someone who is also researching your family may contact you. Who knows, someone else may have that vital link that you need, or you may have the name of a grandfather they have been searching years to find. If for any reason you do not want your name and surnames printed in the booklet, please contact me immediately. The booklet will go to press within the week.

When you turn in your five-generation chart, will you please pencil on the back the name you are known by in the society? This is especially important for

charts that begin with a woman's maiden name. Do not write on the front; just write it in pencil on the back.

Do you have a filing cabinet in your garage or attic that you don't use? We need one in which to store genealogical files. It will be kept in the church library until we have a permanent home. Please let me know if you have one to donate.

We will be selling subscriptions to Family History Magazine at the October meeting. The cost of the subscription is \$28.95 per year. Thirty percent of the subscription price will be donated to our society. Samples of the magazine will be available. There will also be a few copies of the new Handy Book for Genealogists for sale.

Our society will have a table at the Texas State Genealogical Society Convention on November 2nd where we will be giving away our brochure and free pencils. We will also be selling our **surname book** and *Family History Magazine* subscriptions. **Help is needed!** If you aren't registering for the convention, but would like to come to Galveston and work at the booth for a couple of hours, please give me a call.

The Five-Generation Chart, Part II

All of the members of BAGS have been asked to provide a five-generation family chart. This is the second article in a series about this project. In this installment, I will list the most common geographical areas in which members need help researching.

According to the five-generation charts that have already been submitted, the most common state where members have ancestors on which they do not have enough information is Alabama. The next most common states that contain missing ancestors are Georgia, Texas, Ohio, New York, Louisiana, Tennessee, Virginia, and Pennsylvania.

By looking at the five-generation charts for countries in which members need help locating

missing ancestors, I have identified the top four. Those four countries are Germany, England, Ireland and Canada.

Depending on the space available for the next installment of this series, I will write about how we can research in Alabama, and which members are researching in that state. If you wish to be included in that list, then remember you have less than one month to submit your five-generation chart before I write the



1. www.google.com Google is my online Wal-Mart. I give them first shot at everything. You can do a search for historical events, an individual's name, a race or culture, or anything you can think of, even recipes, if you are so inclined.

- 2. www.glorecords.blm.gov/ This site is very good for searching land records, and you can print a copy of the certificate from the screen. It does not have the original 13 colonies but still a good website.
- 3. www.rootsweb.com/~usgenweb/ussearch.htm This one is very good for searching for an individual in a certain state or county or doing a search on a subject like "marriage records".
- 4. www.hpl.lib.tx.us/clayton/ This one is for Clayton's card catalog AND film holdings. I check it all the time, print out the pages for what I'm interested in and take them to Clayton with me.
