De Berardinis to Speak on Land Records

We are again fortunate to have Robert de Berardinis as guest speaker on November 24th. His subject is one that many look forward to hearing about: Land Records.

Mr. de Berardinis is an example of a true friend in the Clayton Library
Friends organization. Marje Harris, Manager of Clayton Library, said, "Without
his expertise, it would be very difficult for us to acquire some of the foreign
records. We are very lucky to have him." He speaks both French and old French
and is working closely with the Spanish Consulate to acquire the Le Gajos also
known as the Cuban Papers. The papers have nothing to do with Cuba but are
called this because they are documents of the Spanish government that were
stored in Cuba for safekeeping during the turbulent times of war. They will be
invaluable for research once they are received. Among the many records de
Berardinis has helped acquire for Clayton Library are the English and Welsh Vital
Records from 1837-1930. He is currently serving his second term as a director of

Clayton Library Friends.

An avid genealogist, he has written four books: Index to French Superior Council Records; French Officials, Officers and Soldiers 1710-1770; Analytical Index to Documents Concerning Military and Civilian Personnel in French Archives Concerning the Province of Louisiana; and Some of the Ancestry of Michel Billeaudeau of Ville Platte, Louisiana. He has authored over 60 articles that have been printed in state and national genealogical publications. In addition to his writing, de

Berardinis has lectured in five states on French and Spanish language genealogy.



The Five Generation Chart, Part 3


This month, I will suggest research resources that need to be consulted to find our missing ancestors. I have found that many members are missing information about ancestors needed to complete their five-generation ancestor chart. The state that is number one in missing ancestors is Alabama.

While it is generally considered that the federal census records for Alabama started with the 1830 census, some residents of Alabama were enumerated earlier as part of the Mississippi Territory. From 1811 to 1839 (excluding the years 1820 and 1830), indexes for Alabama are published in book form. Alabama state and territorial census records exist for the years 1816, 1818, 1820, 1831, 1850, 1855, 1866, and 1880. These indexes and state census records should not be overlooked.

The multi-volume book, Alabama Records, by Kathleen Paul Jones and Pauline Jones Gandrud and Early Alabama Marriages, 1810-1850 (San Antonio, Family Adventures 1991) are among the highest-rated genealogical books about Alabama. Other records that are easily accessible to our members are the many directories of the heads of households that were published for the major cities in Alabama.

Let's Plan a Research Trip to Salt Lake City by Nancy M. Irle




rich with treasures I had acquired about my past.
