Mormon Church Announces Free Census

The Mormon Church recently held a news conference at their Broadway location for a nation-wide announcement about the United States 1880 census and the Canadian 1881 census.

The news is that both censuses are now available free on-line from their web site: www.familysearch.org. Many of you may not be aware of the fact that a family had to have a child under the age of ten living in the household in order to be on the 1880 soundex. The soundex was done in the early 1930s for the express purpose of finding out how many would be eligible for social security if it were established. To save money, not every household was soundexed. Five-Generation Chart: Georgia Research by Neil Miserendino



While I write these articles to assist members in filling out their five-generation chart, I also want to feature genealogical sources that may

be unique to each state or country. Distinguished resources for Georgia genealogical research include the lists of land lotteries. These lotteries were held in 1805, 1820, 1821,1827, and 1832. If you had an ancestor living in Georgia during those years, then you need to search the land lottery lists. In common with the other states, Georgia land deed records are held in the various counties. You will have to search the county records if you need to get genealogical information from a land deed.

Georgia is another state with state census records. Since the state census records exist for certain counties for the years from 1786 to 1890, you should look at

the published indexes of the state census records. If you are able to locate an ancestor in a census index, you can order a copy of the original record from the Georgia State Archives.

Because of the large number of Georgia residents who fought for the Confederacy, if you are searching for a male ancestor during the war years, you can search in the "Roster of the Confederate Soldiers of Georgia," which is an index in book form.


searched the 1880 census without this knowledge, and your people did not have a child under the age of ten, you might have thought they were not on the census.

For the past 28 years, the LDS Church has been compiling a record of the 1880 census, listing every person on the census. This is a valuable tool for researchers for more reason than one. If you could not find your ancestor but knew the state in which he was living and the fact that he was a blacksmith, you could search by that category in the state, and the program

would bring up every blacksmith in the state during 1880. You might find your ancestor with a name spelling you had not thought of.

When the U.S. census first came out, the 54 disks were for sale for \$49.95, and many people purchased them. With this free on-line service, it is easier than ever to access the 1880 United States census. And, if you have a Canadian ancestor, the Canadian 1881 census will also be of much benefit to your genealogy research.
