Working Without the 1890 Census

It seems without a doubt that each of us has some vital data missing from our research that the 1890 census would provide if only it were available. The presentation of our January speaker, Don Pusch, is entitled, "The 1890 Census: Sifting Through the Ashes." It will suggest some ways we can compensate for the missing data. Attendees will be provided a handout listing some "gap-filler" books and microfilm at Clayton Library.

Don is a native Houstonian. He graduated from Texas A&M in 1965 and entered the United States Air Force. After his retirement as a lieutenant colonel, he moved to El Lago, where he and his wife now reside.

From 1989 to 1993, Don was editor of "Reflections," the newsletter of the Founders of Natchitoches. In 1992, he became editor of the Clayton Library Friends Newsletter. He served as president of that organization for the 2000-2001 year and currently serves as its treasurer. He has been a member of the board of directors for several years.

Don is a published author. Among his publications are "The Capture of the Chariot Royal," Le Réveil Acadien, 18:79-84; "Employees of the Marine in the Colony of Louisiana, 1759" LGR, 47:69-87; Selected Papers of Winston De Ville (editor); Mississippi Valley Mélange, vol. 4 (coeditor with Winston De Ville); and "The French Flûte Fortune and Her Encounter with the Slave Ship Judy," a talk given to the Paul Carrington Chapter SAR, Armed Forces Day, 2002.

It is hoped that some of you will skip the Super Bowl and be on hand to hear him tell what was lost and what was salvaged of the 1890 Federal Census.

The Five Generation Chart - Texas Research

One big advantage our members have in Texas research is that many records can be reached in less than a day's drive. From Clayton Library in Houston, to the state archives in Austin, many state records are

fairly nearby. The Clayton Library has such a rich collection of Texas records that you should first consult with one of their subject guides for Texas researchers. There are published inventories of many Texas counties that can save you time in finding the best genealogical sources. An uncommon resource for Texas researchers is the fact that Texas has some church records for the major religious denominations in state

repositories, where access is possible. Also, city and county records are not only available at the county level, but microfilm copies are preserved at various Texas repositories.

Our society is planning a bus trip to the **State Archives and Library in Liberty.** If you are looking for a city or county record in Texas, join us for this trip. Trip details will be in the events calendar and mentioned in our monthly meetings.

Something New at Clayton

Clayton Library has added something new for your convenience. It is now possible to scan information from microfilm or microfiche. The Minolta machines in the upstairs microprint room will scan the microfilm or microfiche and save the image as a TIF file. If you are running MSWindows 95 or later on your computer, you should be able to view single-page and multi-page TIF images using the Wang Imaging for Windows software that is included with Microsoft Windows.

To use this feature, you must have your own ZIP disk to scan onto. Clayton does not sell these disks or have them to loan. The cost for scanning is 25 cents per page. The funds from scanning are used to help provide supplies and service for the equipment in this room. Instructions on how to use this new feature are available at Clayton Library.




