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From the President

I hope all of you now have your genealogy artifacts and papers in an acid-free environment after that great talk on preservation at the last meeting.

It was informative as well as helpful in explaining what to do with the things we want to save for future generations.

Speaking of preservation, that is exactly what I have been doing for the past several months, working to preserve our home and heritage in Alabama. The house was built in 1829. Stabilizing a 174 year old home is a work in progress. No matter what you do, something else rears its head to remind you to take care of it as well.

As with most homes of that era, the kitchen and dining area were separated from the rest of the house. They eventually built a walkway from the house to the kitchen. The well was adjacent to the walk. I remember my mother bathing me in a #10 washtub on the walkway next to the well. As the generations passed, they screened in the porch, then walled it in, and finally covered the inside with knotty pine paneling and the outside with siding. Unfortunately, no one ever took a level to the floor. They simply worked with what they had.

The contractor determined that there was a six inch drop from the back of the original house to

the kitchen and dining area, which made the sofas and other furniture in the walkway area sit at an angle. I didn't like looking into the kitchen from this "new" area that had no name (den, porch, sitting area??), so I decided to change it.

I had the workmen put up sheet rock and a huge picture window. I'm sure you know how expensive hired labor is, and with Roy in Houston, I had to pay five workmen as much as \$18.00 per hour. That is still cheap by Houston standards, but expensive by my checkbook standards! After they left at 5:00 each evening, I would spend my time nailing down plywood, filling the nail indentations in the sheet rock with joint compound, and generally trying to do as much as possible before they returned the next day because I work really, really cheap!

Our home is located in Monterey, Alabama, about five miles from Forest Home. Downtown Forest Home consists of a post office. Monterey consists of a store that used to sell a few groceries until the owners died. It is now closed, but there is a working drink machine still on the porch outside. The nearest place to get a meal is twenty miles away, so I wound up cooking for all the workmen, and one of them even brought his two kids. Most of you know that Roy and I eat out

The Houston Chronicle on Wednesday, May 7, 2003, had a front-page article on the at-risk records in the District Court Clerk's office. Harris County documents dating back to the Texas Republic are in need of preservation. The County Commissioners will be asked to provide \$800,000 for professional rescue of the most threatened records.

The BAGS Board of Directors will be considering if there is anything the Society can logically do to help make the papers available to future generations of genealogists and historians.

Some possible programs might be to: raise funds, volunteer labor to do preservation tasks, index or transcribe records, etc.

Genealogical Research in Ohio

One feature of Ohio genealogical research is that some counties and cities held their own census from the time Ohio was a territory to the year 1911. The state archives have holdings for birth and death records since 1909. Contact information: State Vital Statistics Unit, Ohio Department of Health, P.O. Box 15098, Columbus, OH 43215; 614-466-2531. When this article was written, the cost of a five-year search on a name was only three (\$3) dollars. What a deal! The down side is that each spelling variation of a name is an additional three dollars. However,

at this price you could still spend less than ten dollars if all you need is a "Xerox" copy. They would only charge an additional five cents per page plus postage for sending you a copy.


From after the Civil War to the year 1908, birth and death records were at the county level. If your record is not at the state level, you can



find the address of which County Probate Court to write by using the genealogical *Handybook* or by going to the Ohio website: http://www.state.oh.us.

Another thing to be aware of is that more than 300,000 men from Ohio served in the Civil War.

Such a high percentage of the male population of Ohio served in the Civil War that a Civil War records search is a must for Ohio genealogical research.


I cannot wait to get it all finished, but I certainly have mixed emotions. When it is finished, we will be moving, and I will miss all of you very much. I have figured out that we can
