#### Time to Fill the File Cabinet

We have finally gotten our file cabinet installed in the Great Room underneath the sound control window. Now it is time to bring your material to fill it.

If you use a computer program to organize your genealogy information, you can use the "report" feature to print a genealogy report on your family. Almost all genealogy programs have this "report" feature even though it may have a different name. If you are unfamiliar with this feature in your software, look in the "help" section. Start with your oldest ancestor and print a report with all of the descendents for that person. Clip it together and place it in a manila folder. Print the surname on the folder and file it in our cabinet under the correct letter.

Even without a computerized genealogy program, you must have your information together in some form, so make copies to share with us. By gathering these reports, we can share our information and hopefully break down some brick walls.

## Future County Bus Trips Mary Martin, County Coordinator

I spoke with a woman at the "East Harris County Senior Citizens" bus office this week. She told me that the next round of bus choices would be allocated in September. We received four dates in six months the last time we submitted our choices. If everything goes as I think it will, we will plan for trips in October, November, December, and February. January will be skipped because of the planned trip to Salt Lake City. March will start the next round of choices.

One of the trips might be to a library other than Clayton Library, if there is an interest in this and if it is not too far to drive. So far, we have had trips to the Rosenberg Library in Galveston, George Memorial Library in Richmond, and the Sam Houston Regional Library and Research Center in Liberty. Harris County provides free bus transportation to various senior citizen community groups. BAGS and other groups submit their desired dates and destinations. The county then draws numbers for each group for impartial selection. BAGS normally uses a 16 passenger bus; however, the county will provide a larger bus depending upon the number of members who sign-up for each trip. Though it is not compulsory, the BAGS riders normally give the county a small appreciation donation.

1841 / Nationwide (severe in South) / Yellow Fever

1847 / New Orleans / Yellow Fever

1847-1848 / Worldwide / Influenza

1848-1849 / North America / Cholera

1849 / New York / Cholera

1850 / Nationwide / Yellow Fever

1850-1851 / North America / Influenza

1851 / Coles County, Illinois, The Great Plains, and Missouri / Cholera

1852 / Nationwide (8,000 died in New Orleans that summer) / Yellow Fever

1855 / Nationwide / Yellow Fever

1857-1859 / Worldwide (one of the largest epidemics) / Influenza

1860-1861 / Pennsylvania / Smallpox

1865-1873 / Philadelphia, New York, Boston, New Orleans, Baltimore, Memphis, Washington, D.C. / Series of recurring epidemics of Smallpox, Typhus, Typhoid, Scarlet Fever, Yellow Fever, and Influenza

1873-1875 / North America and Europe / Influenza

1878 / New Orleans (last great epidemic) / Yellow Fever



#### Internet Sites of Interest

My articles are usually about a state or country, but while searching for non-genealogical information, I came across two internet sites that demonstrate how the field of genealogy is changing.

Every day, more and more information of use to genealogists is being posted on the internet. Neither of the sites I will mention can be used to find an ancestor; however, these two sites illustrate that we can find useful information for filling in background information on our ancestors.

The National Archives of Canada is now offering "War Diaries of the First World War" at www.archives.ca/02/020152\_e.html. This internet site contains images of the daily actions of the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF) units. The images contain descriptions of the weather, the movement of the troops, and more. This not about individual soldiers; it is the history of a military unit during the War.

I realize that very few of our members have Canadian ancestors. However, I liked the website for providing World War I background information. The archives are searchable by unit number and date, with wildcards supported. When you search this website, you should specify that only records with digital images be included in the results. This will allow you to find and view the information as it was recorded. The quality of these images varies. Some may be typewritten, while others may be handwritten. But the records make interesting reading even if you do not have Canadian ancestors. Members with Canadian ancestors can go to the main page at www.archives.ca to look for new data as the on-line archives in Canada are updated.

The state of Pennsylvania has digital archives at www.digitalarchives.state.pa.us/archive.asp.

Towards the bottom of this web page, I found a link to a "card file" for the Civil War years 1861-1865.

This collection does not have a "search" feature to help you find an ancestor. The collection is like a

big file cabinet. The file cabinet has the records arranged by the first letter of the last name. If you know an ancestor, let us say a "James Smith," you go to the records that begin with the letter "S." You will get a group of 50 records. You go forward in the "S" file until you get to the "Smiths," then you can search further to get the correct "James Smith." The information on a card

includes mustering in and out dates, description, occupation, and rank. An extra area for remarks may yield more detailed information. You should print out the "Card Key" which describes the information on the cards and which will tell you how to read the cards that are found on this web site.




#### Please Note Newsletter Changes Continued From Page 1


#### Clayton Library Friends To Sponsor "Cuban Papers" Seminar

Next month, on Saturday, September 27th, Clayton Library Friends is sponsoring a seminar on "The Cuban Papers" and how to use these records for genealogical research. The Cuban Papers are a huge collection of records, gathered during the Spanish colonial period, relating to the Gulf Coast, Mississippi Valley, Texas, and the southeastern United States for the period 1700-1820. The collection received its curious name because it was stored for a time in Cuba. Clayton Library is acquiring this entire collection on microfilm.

The seminar will be from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1:00-3:00 p.m. in the auditorium of the Julia Ideson Building, Houston Public Library, 500 McKinney, and will feature nationally recognized speakers Paul E. Hoffman and Robert de Berardinis. For a registration form, contact Dick

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
#### Time to Fill the File Cabinet Continued From Page 2
