September Meeting: Karen Stanley will present "Genealogy Research Using Clayton's Online Databases"

At the September 28 meeting, Karen will describe the Clayton Online Databases and how to use them along with tips and tricks to make searching for our ancestors a bit easier.

Born in Cape Girardeau, Missouri, Karen Stanley is descended from a long line of farmers that includes everything from original English, Scots, and Mennonite colonists to mid-19th-century German immigrants. Although she has lived in Florida, Ontario, South Carolina, Illinois, and has lived in Texas for more than twenty years, she is still a Midwesterner at heart.

Karen holds a BA in History from Florida State University, an MLS from the University of Texas, and an MBA from Rice University. She worked for many years in Houston in the petroleum exploration industry, as a records manager and later as a marketing and business process consultant specializing in technical data management. In 1999, she decided to abandon the petroleum industry and return to the library world. Today she is a full-time reference librarian at Clayton Library, Center for Genealogical Research, providing specialized genealogical reference assistance to library patrons. Some of the special duties she has assumed at Clayton Library have included database conversion, web page design, staff and public computer training, group presentations and tours, and collection development. Karen has been an avid genealogy researcher since the age of 14, and is delighted to be working at one of the best genealogy libraries in the country.

From the Founder & Past President --

As most of you know, the August meeting was my last meeting as your President and I will not be taking an office next year. I thought I would take a few moments to explain why I will not be volunteering again.



Genealogy Research in Louisiana

If you are researching in Louisiana, here is the state web address: www.sec.state.la.us/archives/

There are many records available for genealogical research in Louisiana. The overwhelming percent of the records of wills, marriage, divorce, deeds and civil court records are maintained at the parish level. You should start your search by reading the inventories of the parish archives. Many inventories of parish archives are available at the Clayton Library. If the records are not available in Houston, I encourage our members to plan a trip to our closest neighboring state.

New Orleans has been a major port for many years, that means even if your ancestors did not remain in Louisiana, they may have immigrated through the port. Many of the passenger lists or indexes for New Orleans can be found at Clayton Library.

Before 1810, there were various local and military censuses taken in the area of Louisiana from the years 1699 to 1805. To learn more about these censuses and to view the microfilmed federal census for the years 1810 to 1930, take a trip to Clayton library.

As you may have heard, Clayton library is acquiring copies of the "Cuban papers". The "Cuban papers" are records of genealogical interest that contain information about parts of the United States when those areas were under Spanish rule. The records were transferred to Cuba and became known as the "Cuban papers".

Because both the French and Spanish administered the area of Louisiana, there are some early records for Louisiana that do not exist for some other Southern states such as Alabama or Mississippi. You may need to obtain foreign language genealogy guides. I mentioned how to obtain study guides in a previous article about researching in foreign countries. That information can be applied to help you with understanding Spanish and French genealogical records for the state of Louisiana.


Upcoming non-BAGS Events

Hoffman from LSU - America's foremost scholar on the Cuban papers from 9:30am-11:30am and Robert de Berardinis specialist in French language and Deep South genealogy. from 1:00pm to 3:00pm. 

Five Generation Charts Needed!

When you joined BAGS, you were asked to submit a five generation chart. While many of you have done so, there are some who still have not and some who would like to update their information. If you are unsure of the format. look at a Newsletter or Quarterly. In each edition of the Newsletter and Quarterly a member's five generation chart is published. You may look at these for an example. Many of you use genealogy software which will print a chart similar to this. If not, we have blank forms that you can complete by hand. As you can see, many people do not have information on every one of their ancestors so far back. That doesn't matter; just include what you know so far. If you do not want your five generation chart to be published, make a note on it. You are encouraged to turn in an updated chart if you have more current information. On the back of your chart, please indicate the date it was completed and, for married women, the current surname. Charts may be given to Tammy Frey, tfrey99@hotmail.com.
