October Meeting: Marje Harris will present

"Stepping Back in Time — Problem Solving"

The Bay Area Genealogical Society is fortunate to have Marje Harris, Manager of Clayton Library, the genealogical research unit of the Houston Public Library, as guest speaker on October 26th. Her talk will be Stepping Back in Time - Problem Solving.

Not only is Marje Harris knowledgeable, having obtained an MLS (Master of Library Science) from Texas Woman's University and a BA in Library Science/Education from the University of North Texas, she is an entertaining speaker. Her credentials are varied, from certified Genealogical Records Searcher, to teacher at Rice University's continuing education program and Houston Community College.

Ms. Harris continues her personal education by taking classes from the National Genealogical Society, the Institute for Genealogical Research, the Houston Genealogical Institute, the Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy and she has completed the genealogical Home Study Program through the National Genealogical Society.

Her interest includes many patriotic and hereditary societies. She is a member of Colonial Dames of America, Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Magna Carta Dames, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, the United Daughters of the Confederacy and Women Descendants of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company.

Ms. Harris has worked for the Houston Public Library for twenty-seven years and at Clayton Library for twenty-two years. She is qualified to speak on any genealogy subject and on the Clayton Library. She has spoken on Colonial Records of Virginia; Introduction to Research in England; Afro-American Research; Immigration, Naturalization and Migration; Civil War Research; Probate Records; Research in Texas During the Time of Spain and Mexico; Migration Trails; Military Records; Problem Solving Techniques and many more topics.

The meeting is open to the public and will be held at University Baptist Church, 16106 Middlebrook Drive in Clear Lake City at 5:00 on Sunday afternoon, October 26, 2003. The Society now boasts of more than two hundred members. If you are a beginner it will help you get started, if you are experienced it will help you overcome brick walls. 

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Give to Get

Today I am writing about "giving to get." Many times we overlook the need to give. Perhaps it is because you feel it will take too much time or too much money. That is not true.

After tropical storm Allison, I ran into someone who was a research scientist at the Medical Center downtown. I remembered how the buildings at the Medical Center experienced flooding in their basements. As you may recall, the basements were where the medical research laboratories were located. The news reported years of research were lost because of the flooding.

Making conversation, I said that must have been terrible. She explained to me that it was bad, but not necessarily as bad as reported. Some researchers had habits where they regularly shared their work with other people around the country. While their research suffered some setbacks, those researchers that shared their work, even before their research was complete, were able to recover most of what was lost.

She further stated that those researchers who did not share just suffered a loss. To paraphrase her words, "I feel bad for those researchers who did not share their work because they lost more and may not be able to recover from the loss. But I do not feel too bad." She meant that those researchers who did not share in this case suffered the full loss. Those researchers that shared received the gift of being able to recover their work.

As a result of that conversation, I re-examined my family research. I had accumulated my family research and planned to present it to my relatives after I produced a book. Now, I realize that was wrong. I made copies of my research and gave it to other relatives. I now know by giving my relatives my genealogical research, even though the research is in progress, I am getting the security of having backup storage.

Aside from the security of knowing that you will not have to research twice in an event of an emergency, I would guess that many members have received documents, pictures, and memorabilia from other relatives. Just by sharing (giving) that they are researching the family tree.

For example, my family never had pictures of my great-grandparents. I shared my research with an aunt and she sent me pictures of my great-grandparents. I never knew those pictures existed. I definitely "got by giving."

I hope all of our members can relate another story where they have given research or knowledge and received something in return. If not, no matter how much or how little research you have, I encourage you to "give to get."

Here is a little tip to keep track of what documents you have shared. On the back of the copies of your documents, write down the person with whom you shared the document. For example, if you gave a second copy of your grandparents' birth records to your cousin Sue, write down "cousin Sue" on the back of your copies. This giving can encourage other relatives to participate in researching the family tree, so you will get help even without asking for it.

I have heard of instances where one member has received help from another member. While this giving and receiving may not be a direct exchange, our total society in general is receiving a benefit. We are receiving a benefit because the total research of our members is increasing.

Another area where our members can "give to get" is volunteering. By volunteering at Clayton Library here is what you will get. Clayton will continue to be open more hours to be more accessible to you and other people. You have already spent the time to go to Clayton. Therefore, when your volunteer hours are over, you will get the opportunity to research at one of the finest genealogical libraries in the country.

Genealogy Research in Tennessee

The State of Tennessee archives web site is:

There is no state census for Tennessee. To get census information for the period prior to when Tennessee became a state you may consult one of these books:

Partial Census of 1787 to 1791 of Tennessee as Taken from the North Carolina Land Grants by Lucy Kate McGhee

1770-1790 Census of the Cumberland Settlements: Davidson, Sumner and Tennessee Counties by Richard C. Fulcher.

Tennessee has been included in the national census since 1810. The national censuses for the years 1810 and 1820 only list a few counties for Tennessee. Some information for the mostly destroyed national census of 1890 can be found in: Enumeration of Male Inhabitants of Twenty-one Years of Age and Upward, citizens of Tennessee, January 15, 1891 by Sue S. Reed. (Note: the complete title is much longer.)

The best way to search the censuses for the years 1810 to 1870 is to consult the Tennessee statewide surname indexes that have been published.

For anyone researching in Tennessee, my highest recommendation is to get the Research

Outline for Tennessee that is available from



the Family History Library. At a cost of \$1.00 it is a great help and is organized to tell you what to do. This research guide contains a research record table that can help any researcher get organized.

For example, you want to find the children of an ancestor. The research table tells you to look in Vital Records, Church Records, Newspapers, or Obituaries. Then you can search Census, Military Records, Naturalization and Citizenship records or Cemeteries. Further in the research guide is information about how or where you can get the Vital Records, Church records, etc.

Even for members who do not research in Tennessee, you can use the research table as found in the *Tennessee Research Outline* to organize your research in other states. I will bring the Research Outline to the October meeting. I will spend a minute to hold up the Research Outline. During the social hour, I will put the *Tennessee Research Outline* on a table to the side so that our members can get an in-person demonstration of what I am writing about.



If you are unsure of the format. look at a Newsletter or Quarterly. In each edition of the Newsletter and Quarterly a member's five generation chart is published. You may look at these for an example. Many of you use genealogy software which will print a chart similar to this. If not, we have blank forms that you can complete by hand.
