Donald E. "Don" Pusch is a native of Houston, currently residing in El Lago, Texas. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University (BA, math) and the Air Force Institute of Technology (BS and MS, electrical engineering). He retired as a lieutenant colonel from the US Air Force in 1986 and went on to a career in the aerospace industry, serving in various management positions with Rockwell Space Operations Company and the United Space Alliance on the Space Shuttle and Space Station programs.

Don has been very active with the Clayton Library Friends since 1991, serving as newsletter editor (1992-2001), director (1992-1993), president (2000-2001), and treasurer (2002-2003).

His primary research interests are in the French colonies of North America, the French navy of the eighteenth century, and French archival source documents.

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Genealogy Research in Virginia

For researching in Virginia, you should be able to access almost one-half million names relating to genealogical research in Virginia because of the Virginia Colonial Records Project. This project researched Virginia names in the archives of France, Ireland and Great Britain.

The index of people's names is published on the internet. You should consult the website: http://www.lva.lib.va.us/ or go to the Library of Virginia, 800 East Broad Street, Richmond, VA, 23219, Phone: 804-692-3500. Some of the records are available through inter-library loans from the University of Virginia Library.

The federal census for the present state of Virginia exist going back to 1810, with the exceptions that 1890 was destroyed and the 1810 census does not have all of the counties, but there exist several lists of residents: A land owner list exists for 1704, and resident lists for 1624 and 1779 are published.

Because Virginia is one of the original thirteen colonies, be sure to check for any records that were transcribed



by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). The DAR transcribed records include: Bible, church, marriage, death, and various other records. The DAR library is at www.dar.org/library/default.html or DAR Library, 1776 D Street, N.W., Washington, D.C 20006-5392, Phone 202-879-3229.

To obtain marriage information in the early years of Virginia, the information would most likely be found in church records. In 1780 ministers were required by law to report marriages to the county clerk so always check county records. In 1853, a law was passed that required the clerk of the county or city court to keep marriage records. Many of the marriages since 1853 are indexed and can be found in the Library of Virginia.

The National Institute on Genealogical Research (NIGR)

Washington, D.C. 11-17 July 2004

The National Institute on Genealogical Research (NIGR) in Washington, D.C. will be held at the newly renovated National Archives building in Washington D.C. and in College Park, Maryland. It offers on-site and in-depth examination of the common and less-known federal records found there. This intensive weeklong study opportunity is for experienced genealogists and for archivists, historians and librarians interested in using federal records for genealogical research. It is not an introductory course in genealogy.

The 2004 program will feature sessions on the census and records for African American, military, land, Native American, legislative and cartographic research. Additional lectures on less-frequently-used sources along with popular sessions on naturalization, citizenship, and im-

migration documents will round out the program. Attendees will spend one day at Archives II in College Park, Maryland, for presentations on records at that facility and for an opportunity to conduct research there. Evening sessions at the Local History and Genealogy Room of the Library of Congress and the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution Library are optional.

To facilitate direct contact between the students and the lecturers and archivists, enrollment is limited. Brochures with an application form will be mailed in early 2004. The class fills very quickly. Tuition is \$325 for applications postmarked on, or before, 15 May 2004, or \$355 for applications postmarked after that date. FURTHER NOTES ON GAZETTEERS

BAGS members have been fortunate and thankful to have had entertaining, interesting, and informative speakers at their monthly meetings. Member research can now proceed at an easier pace because of this wealth of genealogical information presented to us. At the January 2002 BAGS meeting, we heard Bruce Krewinghaus talk on how atlases, maps, and gazetteers can be an aid in genealogical research.

Remembering Bruce's talk, I did not hesitate to pick up some gazetteers being discarded from the collection of an area library. I have donated them to the BAGS genealogy section in the library at University Baptist Church. They are eight volumes of "The National Gazetteer of the United States", published by the United States Geological Survey (USGS). These volumes are the states of Arizona, Delaware, Florida, Indiana, Kansas, New Jersey, North Dakota and South Dakota. Each volume lists geographical names in alphabetical order for places, features, and areas within, or partly within each state.1 These are names found on various maps, charts, and other published documents.² Each volume includes a glossary of common language terms used to categorize each place, feature, or area identified by a geographic name.³ Some of these terms are bay, beach, bridge, canal, church, falls, gap, glacier, harbor, island, school, spring, swamp, woods, etc.4

The following is an example that shows how to use a gazetteer in genealogical research. One surname I am researching is Morton. I found a reference to a tract of land "formerly taken up" by a William Morton in the State of Delaware. This tract of land was called "Cambridge" and contained 500 acres near the <u>Black Swamp</u>.

Black Swamp is listed on page 9 (DE9) of "The National Gazetteer of the United States-Delaware 1983". The information across page 9 shows the Feature Class is a swamp; Status is BGN (meaning the written form of the name has been determined by the Board of Geographic Names); County is Kent; Coordinate is 390016N0753903W; and the Map Name is Marydel. You can now call the nearest USGS office and order a topographical map (Denver CO, 303-202-4200 or email: infoservices@usgs.gov.)

You can also order the map online by starting at the USGS home page: www.usgs.gov.

- On the home page, select Products.
- Then, under <u>Mapping</u>, select <u>Topographic</u> <u>Maps</u>.
- Next, select <u>Finding and Ordering USGS topographic maps</u>.
- Under <u>Online search and order</u>, click on <u>Earth</u> Explorer
- Log on as Guest
- In the <u>Spatial Coverage</u> section, select <u>Enter</u> Place Name
- Next page, enter <u>Place Name</u> (Black Swamp), <u>State</u> (Delaware), <u>Feature Type</u> (swamp); then select Search
- Reference Map opens for viewing; click Select
- Next page, click on <u>Place Name</u> to add coordinates to <u>Spatial Coverage</u> box; when <u>Reference Map</u> opens again, click <u>Select</u> again, then click <u>Dismiss Window</u>
- Next page, under <u>Data Set Selection</u>, select <u>Maps</u>
- Under <u>Map Name</u> enter <u>Marydel</u>; <u>State or</u> <u>Area</u> enter Delaware; ignore remaining criteria; then select Search
- At Results Summary, select Maps
- Begin the ordering and checkout process; map price is \$6.00

These steps illustrate how a gazetteer can be a quick research aid if you have a reference to a name, but you are unsure what the name is identifying — a cemetery, lake, river, school, etc. Also, maps you locate through a gazetteer make a valuable addition to all the names and dates you collect while conducting genealogical research.⁵

⁵ To view and print a map online, go to the USGS home page, select Geography. Select View Maps/Images, then select TopoZone, a USGS "Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA)" partner. At Place Name Search, enter place name, Black Swamp. On the results page, click on the place name to go to its map. At this point, you may view and print the map showing the subject of your search, Black Swamp.




