The Bay Area Genealogical Society welcomes back two recent speakers, Robert de Berardinis and Marje Harris, who are teaming up to provide a highly interactive problem-solving program which should be of great benefit to the audience.

Problems will be taken from the audience and the team will show how to solve them, sharing with the rest of the audience how to approach the problem and ask the right questions. Members should bring your research problems - the brick walls that prevent you finding your ancestors. The problems should be accompanied by enough data and details to show where the problem is and what you have done to get to that point. The scope will be limited to genealogy of American, Canada, the Caribbean, France, and Italy.

Program objectives:

- 1. How to frame the right questions in order to solve the problem.
- 2. How to assess the sources available to the researcher.

Between the two of them, they can cover a lot. What the audience will hopefully discover from each other is that there are very few genealogical problems that are truly without solutions. There will be a brief intro about analysis from Elizabeth Mills.

Locating Your Ancestor's Ship

The process to find the ship that brought an ancestor to America can be very involved. The reasons are many. There is no central repository for the records. There are many archives and collections spread around the world. Many collections may not have been transcribed.

At the November 2002 Texas State Genealogical Society Convention held in Galveston.

John Philip Colletta, author of "They Came in Ships: Finding Your Immigrant Ancestor's Arrival Record," told about the Steamship Historical Society of America Collection. collection is part of the Special Collections of the Langsdale Library at the University of Baltimore includes photographs of ships. Copies of these photographs are offered for sale.

Their web page is: http://www.sshsa.net/. On that web page is a link to a PARTIAL index of their records. I emphasis PARTIAL because even on their web page they state that the collection is so large that many ships are not listed. The collection has information about ships from the mid-1800's to the present. If you know the name of the ship, you should first try to confirm if the ship you seek is in their collec-

tion. Go to this link: http:// archives.ubalt.edu/ steamship/trans.htm.

Click on the first letter of the name of the ship. If you do not find your ship, keep this link in your favorites. You can check back every few months as more names of ships are added. If you do not have access to the Internet or you do not want to wait for the collection to be in-

dexed, the organization will search for a ship in their collection for a non-refundable fee of \$5.50 for each ship that you want them to find. You have to enclose a stamped self-addressed envelope with a check or money order for the payment. The address is:

Now, let me choose a specific ship (the Caroline) and see what information can be found. Start with the website that contains transcriptions of information from Lloyds Register of Ships:

http://www.reach.net/~sc001198/Lloyds.htm.

When you go to this website, you can search by key word, or you can click on the links to pages that are transcribed. I clicked on the pages that start with the letter "C" and found the Caroline. Or did I? It seems this name was used for more than one ship. We have to be aware that our search is narrowed but not over. You will have to match your ancestor's record and hope that the port of registry is mentioned in the Passenger List. If not, the next step may be to try to track down the voyages of each of these ships. Then we can match the correct Caroline with our ancestor's actual ship. At the bottom of this article is the information from the website.

As you read about the various "Carolines," look at the lines that start with "Rigging." Some lines list "ship" - this is not very descriptive. The other lines list a brigantine and a schooner. Besides a good dictionary, some definitions of ships are found at http://infa.abo.fi/~fredrik/sships/. On the web page, the description of a brigantine states that it "is a two-masted vessel with her foremast full square rigged ..." I will leave it up to the reader to find the description of a schooner.


interested in researching your family history/ family tree to learn a little bit more on how to go about it. Speakers will also be discussing research tips and entertaining you with historical stories.
