Writing Your Family History – Beginning with the Box "From Overwhelming Junk into a Written History"



How often do we think that we know a relative only to find out later that what we knew about that individual was only the pieces found in that box of their stuff? We have accumulated things associated with them but might not really know them at all. Kathryn Black Morrow will show us how to take those pieces, organize the box of overwhelming junk and turn it into a personal history.

She will show, by example, how to organize those lone pieces of pictures, letters, jewelry, or other memorabilia into chronological

sequences and then turn them into their personal stories, by weaving them one by one into a sketch of that person or family. It's a wonderful way to put character in the person and chart.

Since this session is a one hour presentation, Kathryn may conduct one-on-one follow -up classes where you will be able to write your own history. If you are interested contact Kathryn at kathrynblack.morrow@att.net or one of the BAGS officers.

Kathryn is an historian and professional genealogist with 35 years of experience. She and her husband Michael live in Clear Lake, and have four children and seven grandchildren scattered across the world in Guam, Germany, Utah, and San Antonio.

In 1980, she was chosen as a Delegate from the State of Oklahoma to the World Conference on Records held in Salt Lake City, Utah. Kathryn received a B.A in Modern languages from Oklahoma City University in 1981. She served as the co-founder and archivist for the Railroad Depot Museum and as President for the Harrah Heritage and Historical Society in Harrah, Oklahoma. Under her leadership, a permanent collection of artifacts and photos for display in the museum was established at the University of Oklahoma, and sufficient historical information was compiled to produce a book.

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
Kathryn also earned an M.A. in History from the University of Houston, Clear Lake in 2003. Her Master's thesis was a History of Ellington Field, which was published as a series of articles in the BAGS quarterlies this last year. In 2003, Kathryn was asked to evaluate and index the Hartman Collection of slave documents at Texas Southern University. Most recently, she was asked by the French Consulate in Houston to be the historian for the international observance of the 60th Anniversary of D-Day ceremony, held June 6th, 2004.

Do you have old photographs that portray people relationship may be found. After all, how many who you know are your ancestors but you do not know which ancestors they are? This might be the time to start the process of identifying the people in the picture. It may be a slow process; but as with any endeavor, the chances of success increase when you make an intelligent effort and choices.

The first step is to make several color copies of the photographs. You could use a computer to scan the photograph and print your own copy. You need to make a color copy because even the old "Black and White" photographs have some shades of color and fine details that would be lost if you copy the picture in black and white.

Write a description of the people in the photograph. Here is an example: From the left, there is a girl in a dress. Next is the mother, holding a baby of indeterminate sex. The father is standing in a suit with a vest. It appears that the father has a pocket watch because the chain is visible in the photograph. On the right of the father, is a boy who appears to be no older than 12 or 13. The last person pictured is a boy who is younger than the first boy is and older than the girl.

Use this description to make it easier to discuss with other people who will be helping you to identify the people. If you have relatives that will help you with the identification, then send them a copy and ask if they can identify the people in the picture. You should keep one copy (and always ther original).

Now you know there is a family with two older boys, one girl and one other child. Take that information and match it to your family group Eliminate any family that did not have this many surviving children. Next eliminate any family that did not have at least two boys and one girl.

Do you know how you inherited this photograph? If yes, then it's possible that the people in the photo are direct ancestors of the family members from whom you obtained the picture. Do you have more photographs of this family? If yes, then the chances increase that the

people keep multiple photographs of strangers?

As you work to identify the people in the photograph, write more details about the people, the setting and the clothes they are wearing. Are there any distinguishing features of any of the people? Check the shape of the nose of the people. The nose may be one facial feature that you can compare to other known ancestors in other photographs and the same person at a different age.

Next you need to check the hair styles of both the men and the women. Then, like today, hair fashions change over time and even the amount of facial hair on the men would come in and go out of style.

The style of clothes also matters. With practice, if you consult history books about hair styles and clothing fashions, you will be able to identify the date the photograph within ten years. If the people were wearing a particular uniform, that could be very helpful in identifying the photograph. When you cannot narrow the date of when the picture was taken, then you may have to consult with an expert.

Let us assume that you have narrowed the date of the photograph to a specific ten-year period. Again examine the list of possible ancestors that you found and eliminate the families that do not fit with your estimate about when the picture was taken. Hopefully, your list of possible families is smaller, and you may want to send a copy of the picture to other direct relatives of your "suspects". You could also ask for copies of other relatives' photographs. Next, you can try another round of trying to match the people up by distinguishing facial features.

This process of identifying photographs is an art that you can learn. It is not necessarily who is in the photograph. Many times the identification will be made by eliminating who cannot be in the photograph. The process would be harder if the photograph is only of one person, but it still can be worth the effort.


