### **Topographic Maps**

The United States Geological Survey (USGS) produces many maps. One of the most useful maps for the genealogist is their 1:24,000 scale topographic maps. The earth is divided by longitude and latitude which are measured in degrees; each degree is further measured in minutes. The 1:24,000 scale maps are detailed maps that show a part of the United States that is 7.5 minutes by 7.5 minutes of the earth. The 1:24,000 means that one inch on the map represents 24,000 inches (or 2,000 feet) on the earth. To put it another way, one inch on the map is a little larger than one-third of a mile.

You may find some use of these maps for your genealogical research. They list some buildings, cemeteries, rivers, lakes, roads and other major land features. You may get free map indexes and catalogs by writing to:

The current cost for a 1:24,000 scale topographic map is \$6, plus the \$5 handling charge per order.

I use a computer and the Internet but found that it was better to use the telephone to get an index and order form. When I used the telephone, I also received a small map that matched the list of numbers with a section of the state. Within five business days, the index arrived with an order form. Ask for a state index and you will get a list of all of the 1:24,000/1:25,000 scale topographic maps. You will also get a map index that contains a map of the state that is divided into squares. When you use the second index it is easier to locate the 1:24,000 scale topographic maps that you ordered.

I sometimes worry that I emphasize the Internet too much in my writings. For getting the map lists and order form, I recommend that you call 1-888-275-8747, instead of using the Internet. The phone is answered from 9am to 6pm CST.

I sent in my order and received my maps within two main entry page. It is open to weeks of my first call. This was great service from a of RootsWeb to post or reply.

#### Amendment to BAGS Constitution and Bylaws

The vote on the proposed amendment has been rescheduled for the April 24 BAGS general meeting. A vote "YES" is for bi-annual elections and a TWO YEAR TERM for elected Officers. A vote "NO" is for annual elections and a ONE YEAR TERM for elected Officers.

ARTICLE III

ELECTIONS

The existing bylaws state:

Section 1: Timing of Elections

Officers and members of the Board serve at the will of the general membership and will be elected annually according to the following schedule: in March the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of two (2) Board members and three (3) from the general membership.

If the members approve the amendment, this section of the Bylaws will change to:

Officers and members of the Board serve at the will of the general membership and shall be elected to two year terms. Elections shall be held bi-annually according to the following schedule: in March of the election year, the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee composed of two (2) Board members and three (3) from the general membership.


