Historical maps provide unique perspectives on ancestral communities and migration routes. Even some Web sites help genealogists locate named places and patented ancestral land.

## Neil Miserendino

I have been planning for a few months to tell our members about searching the Texas land grants. I did not wish to only write about the process about finding the record, but I also wanted to personalize the information by using a Bay Area Genealogical Society member's actual search to demonstrate the process of finding Texas land grants. As I do not have any ancestors who lived in Texas, I waited to write this article until I found a member who had an ancestor that owned land in Texas. This article is now possible because when I volunteered to assist at the Houston Archives, Paula Sinning mentioned that she had an ancestor who owned land in Texas.

To start, the Texas General Land Office (TGLO) maintains records of original land grants that have an abstract number issued by the TGLO. These records are maintained in the Land Grant Database. The Land Grant Database is accessible at:

For those members who do not wish to travel to Austin and have access to a computer, the Land Grant Database can be searched from your home computer. The Land Grant Database web page is linked from the General Land Office web site or you may use this direct link:

I will use some information provided by Paula Sinning as an example of how to search the Land Grant Database. In case someone else can provide assistance to Paula, I am keeping some extra information that she sent to me.

Paula looked up her great-great-grandfather William A. Earp (born 1837 in Alabama) who spent his adult life in Brown County, Texas. He died in 1921 in Brown County. Paula is trying to prove he was a Texas Ranger. She has information on him in the Civil War with the rank of private. She looked him up on the TGLO web site. She did send off for information about his service in the Civil War, however, as of the writing of this article, she has not received a reply. Paula is searching out his first wife's maiden name. She died when their children were very young and William remarried. The children's death certificates do not give the maiden name.

I repeated the search on the Land Grand Search webpage. I did not think the last name "Earp" was common, so I only entered the last name "Earp" as the original grantee. For people with more common names, you can search by adding the first name and possibly the

middle initial. The recommended formats are "Jones, Robert" or "Robert B Jones". When I searched only for "Earp", the result was a listing of about 70 records. I looked down the page and saw two records for "Wm. Earp" in Brown County, and one record for Wichita County. If you are like Paula and know the county, then you might be able to eliminate the person from Wichita County. If you were unsure of the county, then you should ask for copies of the land grants from whatever counties were listed. As for myself, I could not tell if the "Wm. Earp" in Wichita County was Paula's ancestor or not.

I clicked on the two records for "Wm. Earp" in Brown County. Here is that information:

There were also two records for Susan Earp in Brown County. It would now be up to Paula to research further using the land grant information for Susan Earp. After the land was passed to an owner, the records for that property will be kept in the individual Texas counties, so what do you do if you locate a record? Order a copy of the record from the Texas General Land Office.

Here is what Alice Jones has written about her experience:

"The search for the Texas Land Grants is so much better when you use the Internet. I have done research at the Land Office in Austin. The office is not equipped for researchers and has only one six foot table for visitors. It is right in the middle of two employees' work space and they have to retrieve all the records for you. If you want copies, they have to run them and it's \$1.00 per page....! Yes, \$1.00 per page. You may not put anything on the table other than a laptop or a single sheet of paper and pencil and they vigilantly enforce the rule."

For those members who have ancestors that may have obtained land from the State of Texas, searching the General Office Database is a great resource!

#### French-Canadian Research

In addition to having served as past Vice-President, past Conference Chair, past Acadian Acquisitions person, and past Board Director of the American Canadian Genealogical Society of Manchester, New Hampshire, she is also a member of the Lawrence Heritage Genealogical Group in Lawrence, Massachusetts.

If you have Acadian ancestry, you will find much of interest at the Acadian & French Canadian Ancestral Home web site. I already found a number of my ancestors mentioned on the site, and I have not yet investigated everything there. I know I am going to spend some more time on the site this week.


