
Inside BAGS ---

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Message from the President

At the same time, I have on several occasions tried to impress upon you, as a member, the importance of becoming involved to the point of volunteering for an elected or appointed position within the Society. At this point, I fear that we are reaching a crisis, in that it is becoming very difficult to find members who are willing to step up. You will find that this is so when you see the slate of candidates for office for the coming year. And while many of them serve in appointed positions, they too are ready to serve again. I first learned about City Directories when I lived with my parents and a gentleman came to the door as part of a survey to get information about the local City Directory. I can still remember a few things about that interview. He clearly identified himself as seeking answers to put in the City Directory and I remember answering all of his questions.

After he left, I thought that maybe I should have been wary of strangers and should not have answered his questions. After the City Directory, which contained the information that I supplied, was published, I went to my local library and verified that the information about our family (as reported by me) was correct.

As it turned out, he was just doing his job and our family information was included in the City Directory with the rest of the people from our town. Of course, I do not think I told my parents that some man came to the door and I answered all of his prying questions, but after reading this article, they now know. As a Genealogical researcher and in retrospect, I am glad that the person who answered the door (me) gave honest and complete answers that can be used for Genealogical research.

What is a City Directory and how do we use them for Genealogical research? City Directories were published to give information about individuals and businesses in a city. In the United States, City Directories have been published for some cities since the 1800s. In Europe, some City Directories were published even earlier than that.

Most City Directories in the United States contained this information: an alphabetical list of heads of households, a listing of the businesses, and a listing of the streets in a city with the occupant's names. City Directories also may have contained other information such as advertising for those businesses that purchased the space on the pages. (Not as valuable to us as Genealogical researchers).

Here are more complete descriptions about the information that we need to use.

Aside from an alphabetical list of heads of households, some city directories would also include the wife's name or other people may have been listed. The other people listed would include the names of unmarried women and if they were employed or widowed. Added bonuses for us are the City Directories which included the names of children.

The business listings in a City Directory were the equivalent of the present-day "Yellow Pages" in our phone books. Businesses could be located in a City Directory before telephone books existed or before telephone books became widespread.

Some City Directories contained a listing of the streets with the occupants of the street. The occupants of each address could have been a family, an individual or a business.

Now that you have been introduced to the topic of City Directories, how we use them for our research will be discussed in a future article.

Posting of Queries

Many BAGS members are aware of the numerous online query or message boards that exist on the Internet. For those unfamiliar with them in genealogy, they are a way of posting a name or other question and waiting for responses. These query boards are organized by locale, typically counties, or by surname or by topics such as obituaries, cemeteries, and adoptions. In addition most genealogical societies have query boards. BAGS has one and the link can be found at the top or bottom of the opening page of the BAGS web site.

Our own query board is not extremely active, but it is only one of hundreds or thousands in existence. As RootsWeb states, "Take advantage of the largest collection of genealogical messages on the Internet. This feature allows users to post and read important tips, information, and assistance as part of a helpful community of thousands of fellow researchers." A page where you can list or search all RootsWeb message boards is located here: http://boards.rootsweb.com/ or you can click on "Message Boards" when on the BAGS or any other board.

The posting of queries on the BAGS board is not limited to our members, as anyone can post new messages or reply to others' queries as long as you are registered and logged in. There is no charge for being a registered user. You can receive e-mail notifications where there is a new message posted or just when your own posting has a new response. A tutorial on their use is available here: http://boards.ancestry.com/mbexec?htx=help&r=rw or by clicking the "help" button on any board web page.

As an example, the Traweek query that our founder, Carolyn Hellen initiated in 2001 on the BAGS query board has had activity this month. It is a good example that replies can continue for years. In this case there were none in 2002 or 2004, but look at 2005. The collapsed (meaning the text of message is not shown) query tree is below. Each indentation indicates a reply to the less indented one above it. I have included the initial query from 2001, but not the 18 replies which are indicated below it. Many are replies to replies, so the thread has taken on a life of its own. Sometimes the replies may number in the hundreds, and sometimes there will not be a single response. Posting in multiple boards that are related to the subject can improve getting a response. Be prepared to wait, and make sure you use a permanent email address. Try to make the query subject meaningful and don't put something general like "Need help with an ancestor" as the message might not be read.


