Max will be lecturing at this month's meeting about genetic genealogy and the area of DNA family research. Since its inception, in April of 2000, Family Tree DNA has been associated with the Arizona Research Labs, led by Dr. Michael Hammer. Dr. Hammer is one of the world's leading authorities in the field of genetics. Having other renowned scientists on its <u>advisory board</u>, Family Tree DNA is the only organization in the field of genetic genealogy that has been constantly developing the science that enables many genealogists around the world to advance their families' research.

The Y chromosome is passed from father to son unchanged, except for a mutation about every several generations. Testing the Y chromosome will provide you with a genetic fingerprint consisting of 12, 25 or 37 numbers. By comparing this fingerprint to others one can determine relatedness. We will look into the basics of genetic genealogy, so that next time someone comes across the subject, they will be very comfortable in understanding how it works and how it can help a person's genealogical research.

Please join us this July for Max Blankfeld and what should be an interesting and enjoyable lecture regarding the subject of DNA. Our meeting will be held at 5:00 pm at the University Baptist Church Chapel on July 31st. We look forward to seeing you and the public is invited.



Max Blankfeld is the son of Holocaust survivors and he emigrated from Brazil to the US in 1991. He has earned degrees in Journalism/Political Sciences, Business Administration, and an MBA from Rice University. After selling the previous business in 2001, he partnered with Bennett Greenspan to help transform Family Tree DNA from a hobby into the world's leading company in the area of genetic genealogy.

Reference Guides to Newspapers

I took a short trip to New Jersey that included genealogical research. As part of that trip, I searched past issues of various newspapers.

To prepare for the trip, I had to locate the repositories for old copies of newspapers published in New Jersey. I will use this state as an example and I will provide an additional list of reference guides to newspapers for some of the other states.

In the New Jersey section at Clayton Library, I found an excellent reference guide to the newspapers that were published in New Jersey: Directory of NEW JERSEY newspapers, 1765-1970 / [edited by] William C. Wright, Paul A. Stellhorn. Clayton Library Call number 974.9 D598 NJ

I would like to report that my search of the Dover Advance newspaper was successful, but it failed. That newspaper had neither obituaries nor death notices. Well, I learned one more piece of information - that I should have called the library ahead of time to ask if the newspaper published either obituaries or death notices. The good news for me is that the trip to the library was not a failure as I found useful information in their copies of city directories.

The good news for the readers is that you can locate repositories of newspapers for the states you are researching with reference books that are available at Clayton Library.

I want to save some of our readers the time it takes to search other states, so I am including the titles and call numbers of some states. I have not examined these books, but I feel it is likely that this list contains some reference books that you can use. More on Microfilm in a future issue.

The need for volunteers to help run our society has been mentioned at our meetings and in our newsletters. At one of the meetings, the president told us that our quarterly needed a new editor. I had submitted one article for the quarterly and loved seeing it in print, so I thought I might enjoy trying my hand as editor. But, I didn't say anything. At the next meeting, the president said that if we didn't find a new editor (Resa Hennings, who had done such an outstanding job as editor was retiring from the position) then our society would no longer have a quarterly. That finally got me to speak up and volunteer for the job...or at

least to give it a try. As it turned out, I have loved receiving the articles from our members and putting them together into a

As I became more active and began to meet more people in BAGS, I discovered that they were not all professional genealogists, but were still learning just like I was. Their common goal was to help with the tasks required to keep our society going. You don't have to be a professional genealogist to the Bay Area Genealogical Society, I thought greet new members, to make telephone calls to members, to bring refreshments to the meetings, to prepare charts for the newsletter and quarterly, to make name tags, or any of the other things we need for our officers and committees to do. All you have to have is a desire to see that our society survives and continues to thrive so that we can all continue to learn and promote the Bay Area Genealogical Society.

> Find a committee list at our meeting and offer your help in whatever area you would like to serve. I know we need someone by September to edit the newsletter and also someone to help with member services. There are many other areas where we need help. Check with any Board member to learn what other volunteer opportunities are available. Some of our members have been doing these jobs for the last 3-5 years and need a well-deserved break.

Give it a try. I did, and it has been very rewarding...and we still have a quarterly.



On Saturday July 9, 2005, Clayton Library Friends started a project to inventory the Houston Post.. Sarah Jackson opened the archives to twelve volunteers on the weekend to get this project started. Six of the volunteers were BAGS members: Ann Davidson, Annette Bowen, Claudia Grafton, Resa Hennings, Paula Sinning and myself.

The volunteers were trained to classify the condition of each bound issue of the Houston Post. This determination will guide the archivist in deciding whether a volume is to be made available to researchers or whether conservation will be needed.

In the few short hours that we worked, we processed perhaps six years of the Post. Considering the many years that the newspaper was published, there is considerable work to be done.

Do you wish that more records were available? The only way it will happen is for volunteers such as yourself to put in the effort and help out.
