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## "Make Your Genealogy Roar with WorldCat" Irene Walters



Come to the BAGS meeting on Friday, September 29<sup>th</sup> to hear Clayton Library's resident database queen, Irene Walters, describe how to "Make Your Genealogy Roar with WorldCat." Irene will answer questions such as: Who has a copy of that small town newspaper that mentions great-grandpa's gold medal for butter making; or, the one with the obituary on grandma that mentions her maiden name? Where in the world

is the book written by the author for whom you were named? Also learn how to obtain a book through the Inter-library Loan (ILL) process. These and many more questions can be answered by using WorldCat. What is WorldCat you ask? Let's break it down; libraries use catalogs and world refers to the scope of the catalogs' references; therefore, WorldCat.

WorldCat is the world's largest bibliographic database, built and maintained collectively by libraries that participate in the Online Computer Library Center (OCLC), a global cooperative. Created in 1971, WorldCat catalogs the content of more than 50,000 libraries in 90+ countries. As of April 2006, it contained more than 63,000,000 records referencing physical and digital items in more than 360 languages. WorldCat itself is not directly purchased by libraries, but serves as the foundation for many other fee-based OCLC services (such as resource sharing and collection management).

Irene Walters was born and raised in rural New York state. She has a Master of Library Science degree from the State University of New York (S.U.N.Y.) at Buffalo. She has been a librarian at the Houston Public Library's Clayton Library for Genealogical Research since 1997. Her interest in genealogy extends back to her years as a teenager and encompasses much onsite research within New York State's courthouses, town clerk's offices, historical societies, churches, libraries, and archives. Her personal genealogical research is concentrated in New York State, France, and Ireland.

Irene will be bringing a handout from Susan Kaufman on "Planning for your genealogy during a disaster -- like Katrina or Rita." You have to be at the meeting to get it! -- Dick Warren

### **Design: Reports Overview**

Next to charts, reports are the form of printed output most commonly associated with family history. While charts are generally used to display ancestors, reports are more frequently used to print descendants and family groups. Family Tree Maker lets you print an exceptionally broad range of reports.

### **Design: Different Reports**

The standard, three-generation Family Group Sheet report displays a traditional nuclear family consisting of parents and their children. The father and mother of each parent are also listed.

The Outline Descendant report shows all of the descendants of a selected individual, labeled by generation and grouped under parents in descending order.

The Genealogy Report uses a "one generation at a time" format to display a selected individual and all descendants. For each person listed there are vital statistics, spouse(s), children, and an ancestral trail back to the earliest recorded generation on the selected line.

A Kinship Report calculates the relationship of the selected person to each of his/her relatives in the entire family tree. Because this kind of report can become quite lengthy, it's probably best viewed on screen.

A Custom Report is whatever you choose to make of it. You specify the criteria.

The names of the remaining specialized reports are pretty self-explanatory: the Alternate Facts, Address, Medical Information, Birthdays of Living Individuals, Marriage, Parentage, Bibliography, Data Errors, Documented Events, and Source Usage. As with almost all reports, the accuracy and completeness of these reports depends on the proper use of the different data fields when inputting individual information. For example, if you've entered most of your source data in the Notes field rather than as a source, your Source Usage report will be deficient.

### **Design: Customizing Reports**

Family Tree Maker includes templates for the most popular types of reports. Your particular needs may require a specialized or custom report.

To create a custom report, click the **Reports** toolbar

button . Then click Custom. Click Contents on the menu bar; then click Items to Include in

Report. Select the items you want this report to list by highlighting them in the field on the left, then clicking the right arrow button. You can remove items in the opposite fashion by selecting them on the right and clicking the left arrow button. The double left arrow button lets you remove all items in your report to start fresh . You can also re-arrange the sequence of items with the Move up Move up and Move down buttons Move down. When you're done, click **OK**.

Click **Contents** on the menu bar; then click **Individuals to Include in Report**. You can opt to include all individuals, but for most reports you'll probably want to click **Selected individuals**, then

the Individuals to Include Individuals to Include...
button. The Individuals to Include dialog box appears. This window lets you select individuals one at a time or in groups. The arrow buttons work the same way they did in the previous dialog box. You can select an individual on the left and click the

Ancestors Ancestors or Descendants Descendants button to include all of that person's ancestors or descendants, respectively. You might want to experiment with this process to get comfortable with it. Click **OK** when you're satisfied with your list.

Click **Contents** on the menu bar; then click **Title** and **Footnote**. The Title & Footnote dialog box appears. Make your selections and click **OK**.

You can also use the vertical toolbar on the right of your screen to further customize your report.

When you're done creating your report, click the

Save View button . The Save View As dialog box appears. Enter the name of your report in the main field and click **OK**.

Later on you can retrieve your custom report by clicking **File**, **Open Saved View**. The Open Saved View dialog box appears.

Select your report from the list and click **OK**.


