Message from the President

I've been noticing all the new genealogy websites on the Internet and was curious as to what data each offered and what were the costs, if any. I found a great site called *No 1 Reviews*

(www.No1Reviews.com) owned by Cyberscape Media that reviews a broad range of products and



services, including 58 genealogy websites. This site provides indepth expert reviews and user reviews. A top 10 list is created for each product group based on various criteria, including popularity, functionality, features and limitations, value for money and ease of use. For each genealogy website, a 1 to 5 star rating is given to individual categories of search effectiveness, ease of navigation, features, technical support, help files and documentation, ease in joining and registration, and value for the money. In addition, the site's features, joining fees (if any), experts narrative review, and any user reviews are included. *No1Reviews.com* will publish reviews on genealogy software. **The current top 10 genealogy websites (with costs) according to** *No1Review.com* **are (access list <u>online</u>):**

6. RootsWeb.com (free, but some searches will be directed to the parent site, Ancestry.com, where there will be a charge)

7. KindredKonnections.com (\$100/yr., \$35/qtr., \$15/mon., \$7/ten days)

8. FamilySearch.org (free site sponsored by LDS)

9. OneGreatFamily.com (\$59.95/yr. or \$19.95/qtr.)

10. WorldVitalRecords.com (running a special now of \$49.95, two years for the price of one, for the U.S. collection. Founded by several key members of the original *Ancestry.com* team. They seem to be giving the older sites a run for their money. Everton Publishers was the first to team up with WVR and thus, all their content, including the *Genealogical Helper*, thousands of pedigree charts and family group sheets submitted through the years, have become available online.)

Chicago Research Resource

The Department of Local and Family History of Newberry Library in Chicago has provided a free online resource *ChicagoAncestors.org*

(www.chicagoancestors.org) for researchers to find and share historical information about Chicago. Click on the tab "tools" and access old city directories (1866-1900) and address conversion tools. Mary Martin found her great-great aunt's husband's business in the 1880 Chicago City Directory. Click on the tab "browse" and then the "Collection" link to access neighborhood, school, church, and cemetery collections. Choose a category and press submit button. Expand the results and click on one of the addresses. This updates the map but also presents detailed information that can include links to digital images or citations to material in the Newberry Library (www.newberry.org).

You have research questions, your fellow BAGS members have answers...

Question: I am trying to get my Irish ancestors back to Ireland. I have a good handle on the Feeneys back to birth 1830 in New York, NY, and then it stops.

Answer: Alice Braud-Jones recommends John Grenham's Tracing Your Irish Ancestors as an excellent publication for all things Irish. She also suggests attending the week-long class Irish research provided by David E. Rencher, AG (Ireland) of the FHL in Salt Lake, as part of Samford University's Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research (course description: www.samford.edu/schools/ighr/IGHR Co **urse10.html**). Alice has attended his class and can recommend more resources. Rencher recommends researching your Irish ancestors in this order: naturalization records, land records, probate records, church records, census, tombstones, vital records, newspapers, military records, family records, and artifacts. Irish also migrated through Boston and Canada. Ann Davidson found an Irish ancestor arrived by ship through Boston. Kathleen Maca has a Feeney ancestor and found the ship's record on the Canada Genealogy Centre (part of The Government of Canada and Library and Archives Canada) website:

Having trouble reading the column heading on a microfilm census?

RootsWeb "Blank Charts & Forms" web page (helpdesk.rootsweb.com/get_started/chart s_forms.html) provides easily read column headings and record information for the US census forms (1790-1930), US slave schedules (1850, 1860), 1890 US veterans schedule, UK census forms (1841-1891), and Canadian census forms (1901, 1911). These forms are also available at your local library or Family History Center. Question: How do I search databases for a two-word surname – Vander Meulen? Using Vander gives back too many results and using Meulen doesn't find enough/correct ones.

Answer: Doug Wilson offers the following search strategies:

• Put both names in the surname block. This works for *Ancestry.com*, *FamilySearch.com*, and *RootsWeb Surname List* (rsl.rootsweb.ancestry.com). Try them both with exact spelling and Soundex options.

• Take out the space to make one word and try again. Sometimes indexing is set up differently.

• Split the surname in three words: Van Der Meulen.

• Try alternate spellings. Enumerators varied widely in recording surnames, especially if subject was not literate. The 1880 U.S. Census spells it three different ways. Do not forget "mule". Some countries used Ter Muelen with a "T". Do not ignore the Meulins or Mullins just because there were a lot of them. In some countries names beginning with Van and Vander were considered elitist.

• Look in lots of places where Dutch folks went. For example, there were Vander Muelens in England, Indonesia and South Africa. The International Genealogical Index records accessible at *FamilySearch.com* can help.

With the threat of tropical storms and hurricanes, Dick Warren suggested reading an article "Genealogy disaster plan a precaution worth taking" by Julie Miller published July 13, 2008, accessible <u>online</u>. This article suggests you 1) decide now what material must be preserved, 2) digitize and store irreplaceable material on e-mail servers and/or removable media (e.g. CD, DVD, flash drive), 3) send backup copies of research to relatives living in another state, and 4) identify and use disaster safe storage.

You have research questions, your fellow BAGS members have answers...

Question: Where can I get an electronic generated 5-Generation Pedigree form to fill out on my computer?

Answer: Doug Wilson suggests using forms provided on the *Family Tree Magazine* website

www.familytreemagazine.com/forms/dow nload.html. Choose the "text" option to download the chart as a .doc file. Open the file with Microsoft Word (or other word processor that can interpret files of that format. Create text boxes to type in the ancestor names. Text boxes already exist for the birth, marriage, and death information. Lineage-linked software program like *Family Tree Maker, Personal Ancestral File,* and *Legacy* automatically generate the chart from your family data.

HeritageQuest™ Online now offers a portion of the United States

Congressional Serial Set accessible through your local Texas public library. You can perform a full-text keyword (e.g. person or place name) search on Private Relief Actions. Memorials. and Petitions. For example you may find an ancestor 1) in 1841 petitioning for a land grant in St. Louis Missouri to build a railroad, 2) at Camp Floyd in the Utah Territory as a miner petitioning refusal to become a State in 1872, 3) acting President for the District of Columbia Board of Commissioners recommending reimbursement to congressional committee, or 4) suspended as a West Point cadet for flogging a teamster in 1819. A full-text searchable database is available for the complete Serial Set from 15th Congress through 48th Congress (1817 – 1885) at the Alfred R. Neumann Library at University of Houston at Clear Lake (see the database listing **online**)

Question: How do I research someone from Mexico when I don't know Spanish? How do I research African American genealogy? And someone from Africa when I don't speak African?

Answer: The question is a good one in that it can apply to any one of several ethnic groups Including African American, Asian, Native Americans and more. Doug Wilson suggests accessing the "Localities" and "Ethnic Groups & People" topic categories on Cyndi's List website to locate available resources. These topic categories provide directory access to specific resources for a specific ethnic group such as genealogical word lists, libraries, archives, record sources, societies, and message boards. There is a directory for Hispanic, Central South America, & West Indies including Mexico, Latin America, and the Caribbean (www.CyndisList.com/hispanic.htm). There are directories for Africa (www.CvndisList.com/africa.htm) and African-American resources (www.CyndisList.com/african.htm). For African research, Doug suggests viewing the PBS series Finding Oprah's Roots: Finding Your Own by Henry Louis Gates Jr. that is available in DVD format at the Harris County Freeman, Texas City Moore Memorial, and Galveston Rosenberg Libraries. Gates did an excellent detective search. Also consider viewing BBC Motherland – A Genetic Journey for an excellent reference and data source. A description and ordering information is available online at

www.rootsforreal.com/motherland_en.php.
