LONDON RECORDS

The London Historical Records from 1500s to 1900s is accessible via the Internet through a subscription to Ancestry.co.uk. Key record types include parish and workhouse records, electoral rolls, wills, land tax records and school reports. The current Ancestry.com subscription accessible through the Houston Public Library system does provide some London and British records but does not include the London Historical Records at this time. The Fort Bend County Libraries offer a free online obituaries database

The Genealogy Department at George Memorial Library has spent many years collecting, compiling, and publishing a record of all the cemeteries and obituaries for Fort Bend County in a five-volume set (with supplements) entitled Registry of Cemeteries in Fort Bend County. Texas. The **Obituaries Database** is a digital version of this information is available for online access. The contents include obituaries of Fort Bend County residents, as well as some obituaries of former long-time Fort Bend County residents who have left the area. Most of the obituaries appeared in the Fort Bend Herald and its predecessors. Entries, representing obituaries published in the Fort Bend Herald from August 1, 2007 to the present, include a .jpg image of the original article. Images of obituaries dating before August 1, 2007, will be progressively added each month.

To access the database, go to the Fort Bend County Libraries Catalog (http://ipac.fortbend.lib.tx.us) and click on the "Obituaries" tab. Search the contents by names, birth and death dates, cemetery of burial, and notes. Browse by names, source, or cemetery. Read the search tips to understand date and wildcard search formats.

Veterans: Life Stories, Marking Graves, Searching Cemeteries - Resources

Deborah Gammon, member of BAGS, League City Genealogy Society, and League City Historical Society (LCHS) provided a wonderful presentation at the Friendswood Library concerning her research methods used to uncover a person's life story starting with a grave site. Deborah uncovered and collected the life stories of WWII veterans buried in the Fairview Cemetery located in League City, TX. These stories were reanimated during the Ghost of the Past Tour presented by LCHS last month. Deborah has performed similar research for Civil War veterans buried in the same cemetery. That information was published in booklet form and is available through LCHS. LCHS meets monthly on the last Thursday of every month except July and December. Deborah's enthusiasm for genealogy and touring cemeteries is contagious. The following is one of her many helpful tips. Spread the word...

The U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) will furnish a free headstone, marker, medallion (Summer 2009) or memorial headstone/marker for:

- Veterans who died after September 11, 2001 whose graves are marked or unmarked.
- Veterans who died before September 11, 2001 whose graves are unmarked.

Veterans discharged under conditions other than dishonorable are eligible for this benefit.

Submit a formal request using the VA Form VA40-1330 Application For Standard Government Headstone or Marker for Installation in a Private Cemetery or State Veterans' Cemetery (available online at www.va.gov/vaforms/va/pdf/VA40-1330.pdf). VA Applicant Assistance is available by phone toll free at 1-800-697-6947 or via e-mail mps.headstones@va.gov. The application requires a copy of the veteran's discharge certificate (DD Form 214 or equivalent).


Complete eligibility details for this benefit are posted by the VA online at www.cem.va.gov/hm/hmelig.asp

"How to Request Military Service Records or Prove Military Service" online article and related links published by the National Archives (www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records/get-service-records.html) explain how most veterans, their next-of-kin, and the general public can obtain copies of a veteran's DD Form 214 (Report of Separation).

The VA website www.va.gov under the link "Burial and Memorials" provides information on benefits, examples of headstones and markers, and a list of national, state, and overseas veteran cemeteries maintained by the VA, individual states, Department of the Army, National Park Service, and American Battle Monuments Commission (ABMC).


This site also provides access to the **Nationwide Gravesite Locator** to search these cemeteries for the burial locations of veterans and their families.

Search by cemetery, last name, first name, middle name, birth date, death date.



Access <u>ABMC</u> website to search for service members buried in overseas cemeteries using the feature "Search ABMC databases".

Search by last name and optionally first name or initial.

Free Online Courses

Family History Library Research Series Online is featuring England records research. The course is presented in five lessons, 20-35 minute long. Each lesson offers a video presentation (Adobe Flash Player), class outline, handouts, and a printable presentation slides.

Brigham Young University offers free online Family History/Genealogy courses through their Independent Study program. Current courses offered include military records, French records, German records, Huguenot research, Scandinavia records, writing family history, and finding your ancestors. To begin a course, access the course list and click on the name of the desired course. A brief registration (e-mail, name, city, state, ZIP, country) is required the first time a free course is accessed.

World War I Prisoner Records

The Red Cross Museum in Geneva has thousands of card and dozens of registers compiled between 1914 and 1918 which include capture, death, or burial of servicemen from over 30 countries drawn into World War I; personal effects, home addresses and grave sites. During that period the Red Cross acted as a go-between, logging, and passing on information among the 30 countries. The Red Cross hopes to have the archive online by 2014. A.J. High's memoir is a pure delight to read. It is a window into the early history of the U.S. commercial airline industry in Texas from the 1940s through the onset of economic deregulation in the late 1970s as seen from the Captain's seat! High's book chronicles a little-known part of Texas' aeronautical heritage— the growth of local service carriers. This first-hand account of Trans-Texas Airways and Texas International Airlines is a must read for anyone who has a passion for aviation history.
