Friday, May 29, 2009 at 7:00pm: Charlie Gardes presents "Meet Me at the Raccoon Lodge: Researching in The International Order of Hoo-Hoo and Other Fraternal Organization Records"

Was your ancestor an Elk, Monkey, Buffalo, Sparrow, Knight, railroader, "Daughter of", Shriner, etc.? Millions of Americans belonged to fraternal organizations since this country's inception. Your ancestor could have been a member of one or more of the approximate two thousand charitable, benevolent, or secret groups. Charlie Gardes will explain how to identify whether an ancestor belonged to one, which one, and what deep dark secrets those records may hold. Fraternal records can answer some of the questions we have, but they can also offer much more, including solving that decades old research puzzle.



Charlie is a contributing author to <u>The Desperate Genealogist's Idea Book</u> edited by Jeannette Balleza. The majority of the book is available free for reading through <u>Google Books</u>. Charlie's three-year search in finding and proving his German roots has been detailed as an immigration case study in Emily Croom's *The Genealogist's Companion and Sourcebook*. Charlie has been an active member of the LDS Family History Center, <u>Houston Genealogical Forum</u>, and <u>Clayton</u> <u>Library Friends</u>. Charlie served as project manager for the recently completed renovation of the Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research that was awarded the *Houston Business Journal* Landmark Award 2009 for Historical Renovation (<u>online article</u> published April 13, 2009). He is Clayton Library Friends' 2009 Nominee for the Federation of Genealogical Societies Ruth C. Bishop Family <u>Living Volunteer Award</u>. The winner will be announced at their convention in Little Rock, Arkansas in September.

Since 2005, Charlie has presented classes at the annual Angelina College Genealogy Conference. This year's conference titled "Steps To Success" is scheduled for July 16-18, 2009. Charlie will be presenting two classes: 1) "Meet Me at the Raccoon Lodge" and 2) "What Did You Do in The War, Great-Grandpa? Tracing Your Civilian Ancestor in the Civil War South." Details

Demolition Day Gems

If you did not attend the April program Demolition Day: Breaking Down Those "Brick Walls", you missed a fun informal question and answer session. The group sat in a circle discussed possible solutions to an eclectic set of research issues asked by individuals present. Several of those questions and responses are presented here to share.

Please direct any questions, comments, or additional suggestions on the following responses to the newsletter editor.

Interested in Swedish Research?

Clayton Library provides an electronic database *GenLine* accessible only within the library. The database consists of 16th to 20th century church records written in Swedish and organized by town.

A BAGS member is researching Russian ancestors and looking for someone that can read 1800 Russian Census content on microfilm.

Several suggestions offered included: 1) access student or faculty resources at one of the local universities or colleges, 2) contact the Greater Houston Jewish Genealogical Society or the German-Texas Genealogy and History Society and 3) submit a request on the Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness (RAOGK) website (www.raogk.org) for assistance. This resource is a web-based genealogical research co-op that functions solely by the services of volunteers. Several of the BAGS members serve as volunteers for Galveston and Harris counties. Note: Use Google to access a state specific ROAGK website. For example, search terms "Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness Texas" provided the Texas RAOGK www.raogk.org/texas.htm.

Ancestor was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. What war did the ancestor serve?

Several suggestions offered included: 1) records of those that left the country were kept at the

county courthouses and 2) local VFW post of the National VFW may have a record. The National VFW website (**www.vfw.org**) has a form to locate the nearest VFW post based on a ZIP code (**emem.vfw.org/findpost.aspx**). National VFW contact information: e-mail: **info@vfw.org**; phone: (816) 756-3390.

Note: Founded in 1899, the VFW is the nation's oldest and largest war veterans organization with over 1.6 million members.

Follow-up: Based on a phone call to the National VFW, they do not maintain records of deceased VFW members. They mainly determine eligibility based on the soldier's service record. So the researcher may need to follow regular military research methods of locating the ancestor's service record or looking for a pension or bounty land warrant record as explained by the National Archives military record section online at

www.archives.gov/genealogy/military.

Otherwise, call <u>Clayton Library</u> (832-393-2600) and speak with a reference librarian for assistance.

Looking for online map resource to show rivers and streams nationwide.

U.S. Geological Survey provides an online resource Geographic Names Information System (geonames.usgs.gov/pls/gnispublic) to locate features in the United States and its territories. There are over 2 million features recorded including items such as airports, cemeteries, schools, streams and trails. To locate a specific river, enter the river's name as the "Feature Name", select the "State", choose the "Feature Class" Stream, and click on "Send Query" button. The results list the locations where river appears across counties within the chosen state. Click on the feature name for the specific location of interest. On the right side of the detailed report is a list of "mapping services". Click on the *HomeTownLocator*[®] link to view a map of the area with a pinpoint to the stream using Google[™] Maps. Zoom the map in or out. Click on the "Satellite" button in the upper right area to switch to a satellite image of the same mapped area. (continued page 7)

How to determine the Texas cemetery where an ancestor is buried in 1920?

First, locate the person's death certificate. The certificate often provides the place, cemetery, or county were the person died or was buried. LDS FamilySearch provides a free online resource (pilot.familysearch.org that requires Adobe Flash Player) to locate birth, marriage, or death information worldwide. The records may include a scanned image of the original record. For Texas, LDS has a collection of death certificates from 1890 to 1976. To search the index, enter the surname, select the "Life Event" Death/Burial, enter the "Place" Texas, United States, and then click the "Search" button. Notes: Though Texas law required statewide registration of all deaths starting in 1903, records were not consistently kept until 1930s.

A list of cemeteries for a specific U.S. county can be located through Clayton Library resources, the LDS Family Search catalog, and the free online resource *USGenWeb* maintained by volunteers

(www.USGenWeb.org). Access the specific U.S. state and then the specific county, then look for a link for cemeteries (the content for each county varies). Otherwise, visit with the volunteer responsible with that specific county.

Another free online resource *Cemeteries of Texas* (www.cemeteries-of-tx.com) provides inscription records, histories, photos, and directions for cemeteries in Texas and some in Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, and New Mexico. Browse the specific Texas counties on the main webpage. Or use the "Search" link at the bottom of the page to locate surname cemetery inscriptions.

For example, I found a Buffalo Soldier Private James Karrick, Company M, originally buried at Fort McKavett, Texas December 16, 1869 and re-interred at the San Antonio National Cemetery.

Cookbook Correction
