Alecya is a historian with a background in marine biology. She serves as chairwoman on the Galveston County Historical Commission and as environmental historian for the Environmental Institute of Houston

(EIH) at University of Houston, Clear Lake. She taught ecology classes in Clear Creek Independent School District, established "Sea Campus Kids" summer program at Texas A&M University Galveston, and published several books, papers, and weekly newspaper articles. Alecva's books include The Settlement Community (2006) presenting a history of Texas City (available at Moore Memorial Library), The History of San Leon (1999, available at Clayton and Rosenberg Libraries), and The State of the Bay: The Characterization of the Galveston Bay Ecosystem (2002, available

through Amazon.com). According to her EIH staff biography, "she is currently working on a history of the saltgrass cattlemen of Texas and collaborating with Chambers County historian Kevin Ladd of Wallisville Heritage Park on the history of gunfights around the bay."

Society Bylaw Changes

During the August general meeting, the membership approved the following language changes to the bylaws, ARTICLE V, MEETINGS, Section 1: Schedule (published on pages 44-45 of the BAGS Yearbook 2008-2009) effective October 1, 2009 (old wording is included but crossed out, new wording is printed in bold).

General membership meetings will be held monthly periodically from September through August.

Any changes in the schedule must will be published in the Newsletter one (1) month prior the change if time permits.

The Board of Directors will meet monthly.
periodically, but not less than bi-monthly.
Meetings may be held via electronic means
(E-mail, teleconference, etc.) or personal representation.

A quorum for Board of Director meetings will be met only if eight (8) or more of the members are present in attendance and via the specified medium, either electronic, or by personal representation.

The Portal To Texas History[™] A Texas Counties Resource

Galveston County Historical Commission sponsored the creation of a three volume set titled *Inventory of County Records, Galveston County Courthouse, Galveston, Texas* which is available at Clayton, Moore Memorial and Rosenberg libraries and is accessible online for free through *The Portal to Texas History* of North Texas Libraries' Digital Projects Unit. This set describes the records of each county office, lists the available county records, and lists the records deposited at the Galveston County Historical Museum.

To access the books online, click on this <u>link</u> or go to the portal (http://texashistory.unt.edu) and enter the search terms with quotes "Galveston County Historical Commission". The result shows three books. Click on the title or picture of an individual book. On the next page (bibliographic record information) click on the "All Pages" link shown on the right side to view the entire book.

The Portal to Texas Historysm provides keyword search and browse by Texas counties to view full text and images of books, historical maps, photos, and newspapers covering a time period from prehistory to the present day. This resource enables "you to explore unique collections from Texas libraries, museums, archives, historical societies, genealogical societies, and private family collections. The Portal continues to grow as additional partners contribute digital versions of their collections." (from "About The Portal" webpage http://texashistory.unt.edu/about/portal)

There are a number of Texas counties that have published *Inventory of County Records* books. View these books at either the <u>Clayton</u> and <u>Rosenberg</u> libraries or through The Portal to Texas HistorySM.

Angelina College Genealogy Conference

The 13th Annual Angelina College Genealogy Conference was held in Lufkin, Texas on July 16-18, 2009 this year. The genealogy conference was a great success for me and the trip was well worth the cost. There were three sessions of classes on Friday and Saturday. I was disappointed I could not attend every class. Fortunately, all the handouts were included in the handbook provided by the conference. Friday and Saturday lunch plus Friday dinner was included. The after dinner speaker was Kelvin Meyers. He presented "A Happy Home Without Husbands: The Women's Commonwealth of Texas". What a great presentation, including how he researched the material he presented.

The all day class on Thursday was "Writing Your Family History" by Pat Gordon of Fort Worth, Texas. Pat's presentation covered four sessions: "Writing a Family History: Getting Started", "Publishing a Family History: Book parts", "Digitizing & Editing Images", and "Publishing a Family History: Layout & Design". The class presentations and handouts were great! It was just too much to take in such as short time period.

The Vendors and Exhibitors were in Hudgins Hall. Books and all kinds were available to purchase. One outstanding book I bought was Census Substitutes & State Census Records, Volume 1 – Eastern States by William Dollarhide. If you have not seen this book, take a close

look at it. The book is available at Clayton Library.

Wheats living in Lufkin. Texas. The family was Woody Gann and his mother was Wheat. Yes, we are related, but you have to go back to the mid to late 1700's to make the connection.

Stealing Your Email Address and Passwords is Easy – Unless - - - submitted by Dick Warren

The names highjacker, thief, criminal, spammer, and cyber terrorist are interchangeable. Be warned!

You would have thought I learned my lesson about safe surfing on the Internet after having my Hotmail email account hijacked. No, it had to happen a second time before I woke up to the threats from email and Internet surfing. Fortunately, everyone in my address book knew I was (and am) home in Houston, Clear Lake City and wasn't stuck in Africa or India and I didn't need money to get home. Several let me know what had happened and I was able to take action to neutralize the highjack threat.

I used my first and last name in my email address (firstname.lastname@isp.com). This format left me open to theft. Sure enough it happened! The thief highjacked my email account, broke my password, changed my secret questions (used to reset or recover the password), and changed my alternate email address to his own.

What to do When an Email Account has been Highjacked

I was able to recover my Hotmail account from Microsoft but I had to answer some pretty tough questions that follow:

(1) My Windows Live ID, (2) My first and last name, (3) My date of birth (month/date/year), (4) My country, (5) My state, (6) My postal code, (7) My IP address. (8) List the IP addresses from each computer that I use to access my account, (9) The answer to my secret question, (10) My alternate email address, (11) My Internet service provider, (12) The last date and time when I successfully signed in, (13) The names of any folders that I created in addition to the default folders. (14) Names and email address of contacts in my address book, (15) Subjects of any old mail that is in my inbox or mail folders (16) Names of contacts on my contact list (include the email address), (17) My Windows Live Messenger nickname (display name) (17) customers who have paid services, (18) Last 4 digits of the credit card that I used. (19) Full Name as it appears on my credit card, (20) Expiration Date as it appears on my credit card and (21) Security Code from the back of the credit card.

Safe Surfing with Strong Passwords

I looked for ways to stop hijacking in the first pace.



No method is absolutely fool proof, but careful use of password management can shift the odds significantly in my favor. How to manage strong passwords for all my email and online accounts? Getting hijacked once can be chalked up to ignorance. The

second time serves as a big kick in the a##. I needed to know more about the threat and how to apply it to my situation.

Two articles helped to identified why strong passwords were important and then how to create them. "Gmail flaw shows value of strong passwords" by Becky Waring in *Windows Secrets Newsletter*, issue 209, published August 6, 2009 and available online at

http://windowssecrets.com/comp/090806 (scroll down pass the ads) explains the benefits of a strong password and provides tips for using and keeping those passwords safe. The second article, "Create strong passwords" from Microsoft Online Safety website

www.microsoft.com/protect/fraud/passwords/create .aspx, lists password strategies to avoid. A strong password consists of a minimum of 8 characters providing sufficient complexity and variability. serving as a deterrent for cracking. These articles suggest creating a strong password by plucking the first (or second) character from each word in a memorable sentence and substitute symbols or numbers for a few of the characters to make the password complex. For example: Use the sentence My genealogy research has hit a brick wall. Pull out the first character of each word to create the string *marhhabw*. Then substitute numbers, symbols and capitalization for several characters to create a strong password m9rHH@6w Use an online password checker such as Microsoft Online Safety password **checker** to verify strength of the chosen string.

Passwords are the keys you use to access personal information that you've stored on your computer and in your online accounts. If criminals steal this information, they can use your name to open new credit card accounts, apply for a mortgage, or pose as you in online transactions. In many cases you would not notice these attacks until it was too late.
