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2010 Census Is Coming!

Residents regardless of citizenship are expected to participate in the United States decennial 2010 Census. The census form will be mailed to you in March with an expected return by April 1. Census workers will visit households that do not return forms to take a count in person.

Questionnaire Assistance Centers (QAC) will be available to assist those unable to read or understand the census form. For those with visual impairments, the language assistance guide will be available in large print and Braille. Deaf and hard-of-hearing persons who do not have access to Video Relay Service (VRS) can call the TDD number, 1-866-783-2010. In addition to these options, language assistance guides will be available in 59 languages at all QAC locations. Contact Dallas Regional Census Center at

Creatively Sharing Family History

During August 2009 Show & Tell program, Melodey Hauch shared a framed original cover of the *Saturday Evening Post* October 24, 1959 issue. The cover art was Norman Rockwell's painting titled *Family Tree* that illustrates the colorful complexity of American heritage. *Ancestry* magazine July 2004 issue used this same painting as the cover art to advertise an article about creatively illustrating your family tree. Illustrations are a great way to introduce family and friends to the depth and breadth of your research without scaring them off with mounds of binders, folders, boxes, etc. Consider enticing people to your obsession by summarizing your research using one of the following illustration methods.

Personalized maps. Google offers a free online worldwide mapping resource. Use Google Maps "My Maps" to create a personalized and annotated map of your ancestors as you trace them across the globe. Set markers, descriptive text, and embed photos or videos to document family members. Keep a map private or share and collaborate. To create or edit maps, you must sign in to your Google Account. If you do not have an account, create one for free. For more information about using Google Maps click here or access Google Maps (http://maps.google.com) and click on "My Maps" and then "Learn more" links.

Fan, Bowtie or Picture Pedigree charts.

Photo montage, collage, or generational arrangement.

Quilts, cross-stitch, or embroidery that include printed photographs, hand prints, or named tree leaves.

Shadow boxes of mementos and memorabilia.

Photo albums or scrapbooks manually or digitally prepared and presented as books, presentations, or movies. Local companies are available to scan and convert negatives, 35mm slides, VHS, paper and audio into digital CD or DVD format. Ask fellow BAGS members Lynn Finger about her DVD of the family's 35mm slide collection and Susie Ganch about her digitally prepared scrapbook.

WWI Draft Registration Cards

What is this?

This is a good resource to identify a male ancestor born between September 13, 1873 and September 12, 1900. Three civilian registrations for the U.S. World War I draft were conducted between June 1917 and September 12, 1918 for men of age 18 to 45 regardless of citizenship. Only a subset of these registrants was actually drafted for military service.

A draft registration card contains a wealth of information that can help you locate other family members.

A typical card has the man's full name and signature, home address, age, birth date, citizenship status, occupation, employer's name and address, race, dependents or nearest relative, and physical description. For registrants born between 6 June 1886 and 28 August 1897 (45 percent of the total), the cards also give city or town, state, nation of birth, previous military service and marital status. (See Tips 1-3)

How to find them?

Locate an image of the registration card through Ancestry.com accessible for free using a public Internet station in one of the Harris County or Houston Public Libraries (e.g. Freeman Memorial in Clear Lake City, Parker Williams on Scarsdale, or Clayton Library in Houston).

At Clayton Library or your local Family History Center, look at the National Archives microfilm M1509 titled *World War I Selective Service System Draft Registration Cards, 1917-1918.* Clayton library has rolls for Louisiana, North Carolina, and Texas draft registrants.

The draft registration cards are organized by state, county, draft board, and then by surname. A draft board was created for every 30,000 people meaning large cities had more than one draft board. (See Tips 4-5)

Tips

- 1. Men who resided in British territories sometimes listed themselves simply as British citizens without noting their origin in Canada, Australia, Ireland, Jamaica, etc
- 2. Some immigrants wrote their last names first, resulting in some cards being filed under first names.
- 3. Since Hispanics often have two surnames, one derived from their father and the other from their

mother, look for their cards under either part of their surname.

4. A registrant not living in his hometown could register elsewhere and the card would be sent to his home draft board.

In some rural counties, it may have been easier to travel to the bordering county to register and request that the registration be sent on to the actual county.

Because it's possible that some registrations were never transferred, look for an individual's card in a neighboring county or state.

5. For large cities, use boundary maps to locate home draft board and surrounding draft boards. Browse these boards looking for ancestors. At Clayton, view the boundary maps on microfilm titled Boundary Maps of Selected Cities and Counties of World War I Selective Service Draft Registration Boards, 1917-1918 (National Archives roll ID# M-1860, Cabinet C52, Drawer D04). These maps are arranged roughly alphabetically by city, but a number of New York and Pennsylvania cities and counties are grouped at the end of the film. See: the order of the cities and counties on page 3 of the beginning of the roll. The film contains maps of the following cities or counties (from Clayton catalog entry):

Through your local Family History Center, a similar film is available ask for FHL film# 1498803 titled *List of World War One Draft Board Maps*.
