Sue worked as a legal assistant for 12 years. The experience tremendously enhanced her research ability. Sue earned the Professional Genealogist certification in 1999 mainly in preparation for something to do after retirement.

She currently works as a Business Administrator for the University of Houston. Sue enjoys assisting researchers at the LDS Family History Center, but more importantly, she loves teaching others how to find their own family history. "The glow on their face, when they have discovered their first ancestor, is fantastic."

New York State Newspaper Resource Contributed by Shirley Robbins

I broke down and signed up for Ancestry.com. I "met" a couple of cousins and a couple of folks who had family marry in and who have a bit of data on my folks. At any rate, one of these folks put me on to a link to New York newspaper digitized images

(www.fultonhistory.com/Fulton.html). It is fabulous -- and I've spent far too many hours perusing thru there and getting the low down on things whispered about or not ever talked about. I highly recommend it for folks looking into family in NY. It's free and you can save PDF files to your computer.

[editor's note] The *Old Fulton NY Post Cards website* provides a free online access to search 13.5 million digitized full-page images of New York newspapers published from 1795 to 2007. New images are added every Sunday evening. View the [index](#) for the complete list of newspapers and their published dates available through this resource. Access the index to browse specific newspapers. The website's current design is organized into a left and right vertical panes (or frames). In the left pane is the keyword search

right pane but the process may take 1 to 3 minutes. To save the page image, use the right button on your computer mouse and click over the image to access a menu and choose "save the frame" (i.e. image) to your computer. Scroll the left pane down to the bottom to access the search interface again. Specifying a date range is only good for pages published in 1990 or after. The [online help](#) explains what Boolean words and special characters that can be used to improve results found.

Show & Tell – Great Fun!

Members shared wonderful items and advice at last month's Show & Tell program.

Three good examples of utilizing preexisting research to locate early ancestors: Jeanine Lawrence made a family connection using information published in *Texas First Families* by Texas State Genealogical Society ([copy available](#) at Clayton Library). She also reminded us that cemetery books may include family history information. Susie Ganch found books about her family on [Amazon](#). [editor's note] Locate items by using the search terms "genealogy" along with a geographic location (e.g. **genealogy Kentucky**). You can also find family history related books on [eBay](#) using the same search strategy.

Lowell Brigham reminded us to also use nicknames when searching records. Several online resources provide lists of name/nicknames: [USGenWeb Project](#), [GenealogyToday](#), [Cyndi's List](#), or use [Google](#) using the search terms: **genealogy ethnicity nicknames** (i.e. for *ethnicity* use **german, french, dutch**, etc.)

Keith Stine featured the end product of his project to preserve and pass down family values and history to the next generation. He scanned photos, letters, newspaper clippings to produce a book for each family member: his father, his mother, wife, and son. He used The Bookbindery in Missouri City (281-403-3009, www.thebookbinderyhouston.com) to produce the bound books. Keith suggested our family histories should include personal letters to future generations capturing our views on life, love, and money.



David Cate attended this year's Federation of Genealogical Societies Annual Conference in

Knoxville, Tennessee. He toured the area and worshiped in churches attended by his ancestors. David is donating the conference class materials to BAGS.

Jane Thompson shared model-sized metal toys (complete with moving parts and electric lights) collected by her father while serving as a scout for the 9th Armored Division in Germany during World War II. Jane and her brother used to play with them as children.


