# Have you considered using Facebook as a genealogy collaborative tool?

The "group" option in Facebook allows you to define a group of people that can privately or publicly share images, videos, links and start discussion boards using your Facebook page. Group membership can be defined as invitation-only or by request. A quick tutorial on creating a family group on Facebook was published in the *Family Tree Magazine*, November 2010 issue, page 69. #### Roots in Estonia, Latvia or Lithuania?

The article "Back to Baltics" by Lida A. Alzo published in *Family Tree Magazine*, November issue, pages 48-54 discusses eight steps to follow in researching ancestry information in the area of Estonia, Latvia, and Lithuania. #### Norwegian to English translation

Quick want to search in several fields at once. Enter your ole olsen 1850 Bergen, the system looked for a person with a first name ole, sumame Olsen was born in Bergen in 1850. Enter your ole o. 1850-9 rock. To people with sumames that börja 'o, place of birth as börja' on rock and year of birth between 1850 and 1859 become accepted. Otherwise you can use regular staples, etc. If you type ole o. 1850-9 \* Berg. place of birth will be able to contain rocks. You can also write td ole, ole olsen, olsen olsen birthplace of Bergen.

#### **Norwegian Research Resources**

At last month's program, Blaine Hedberg introduced us to several nuances in searching for information on Norwegian ancestors. First, he explained that there are specific naming patterns that can help provide clues as to the person's family relationship or place of residence. For example, a man's last name would be the name of the farm where he worked. Therefore, the last name could change several times during his life. The online article "Naming Patterns" found under Helpful Resources section on the The Norwegian American Genealogical Center and Naeseth Library website provides details on the naming customs. Blaine pointed out that a Norwegian emigrant's police passport record includes the American destination/sponsor. This information can link immigrants to church records in or around the American destination location. Blaine recommended locating and reading the bygdebøker (a local farm and family history) for your ancestor's area and requesting an inter-library loan for the book Norwegian Local History by Dennis Auburn Hill. Organized by parish, this book provides a bibliography aid for locating your bygdebøker. Also, consider joining a bygdelag, an organization of people whose ancestors came from a particular area of Norway!

Blaine recommended the free online resource **Digitalarkivet** (http://digitalarkivet.no), sponsored by National Archives of Norway, which provides digitized census, parish registers, vitals, tax, vaccination, and some regiment records. Click on "English" link on the left side and then click on "Database Selector" along the top to search across all the databases. Entering a search term starting with a capital letter (e.g. Aker) will retrieve records with words/names that <u>begin</u> with Aker. Enter the same search term in lower case (e.g. aker) and the search will retrieve records with words/names that <u>contain</u> aker. If the page shows text in Norwegian, copy and paste the text into **<u>Google Translate</u>** to decipher into English.

On the "Database Selector" page, browse and search the 1850, 1860, 1870, and mostly 1880 U.S. Census lists of Norwegians living in various states by choosing **Censuses** for the "Source category" and also choosing **Norwegians in the US** for the "Sub-category."

# Blaine also recommended *Norway-Heritage: Hands Across The Sea*

(www.norwayheritage.com) a free site that provides physical descriptions, schedules and pictures of ships that carried emigrants. There are several good "how to" research articles published on this website. Specifically <u>Hunting Passenger Lists</u> by Børge Solem, etc. (1999) explains how and where to look for passenger information about Norwegian emigrants.

If you have Norwegian ancestors, seriously consider gathering your family research and traveling north. There is a wealth of Norwegian and Norwegian–American family records available:


