## To DNA Test Or Not That is the Question

Interested in understanding the genealogical interpretation of Y-DNA and mitochondrial DNA test results?

The December 2009 issue of the Family Tree Magazine published a good article titled "DNA Fact or Science Fiction" (page 26-32) by Lauren Gamber that debunks myths surrounding genetic testing and explains what useful information a genealogist can obtain from participating. # Interested in Preserving Family Keepsakes?

Published in *Family Tree Magazine* December 2009 issue pages 54-59, the article "PreservationRx" by Grace Dobush offers specific preservation instructions for newspapers, books, scrapbooks, photo albums, jewelry, dolls, toys, clothing quilts, needlework, and flags.

Conservation and restoration details can be found in the book *Caring For Your Family Treasures: Heritage Preservation* by Richard W. Long and Jane S. Long, published in 2000, available at local libraries: Harris County (Freeman), Houston Public (Clayton), League City (Helen Hall), and Friendswood.

"Getting Up to Date" by Maureen A. Taylor, published on pages 23-28 in the *Family Tree Magazine* issue November 2010, provides identification and preservation tips of different photograph formats from 1839 to present. A photograph's format (e.g. daguerreotype, ambrotypes, tintypes) identifies a specific time period when that photograph was created thus providing a genealogy clue to an ancestor's life.

#### **BAGS Quarterly**

With the December 2010 issue, the BAGS Quarterly will begin its tenth year of publication. This latest issue will be available at the January meeting.

#### **Archaic Medical Terms**

Have you come across an unfamiliar medical condition listed as the cause of death in an ancestor's letter, death record, or obituary? Do you know the meaning of the archaic medical terms black tongue, la grippe, quinsy, St. Vitus' Dance, and vomito?

Try using the online resource Rudy's List of Archaic Medical Terms (www.antiquusmorbus.com) to discover their meanings and help decipher the causes of death found on mortality lists, certificates of death and church death records from the 19th century and earlier. This resource provides a collection of old medical terms in English, French, German, and other European languages with corresponding modern English definitions and occasionally an image of the handwritten text. Click on the "International" button to access the other European language lists. A list of Native American or New World diseases can be accessed by clicking on the buttons "English" and then "American" located on the left side of the webpage. There is also special lists for treatments and miner's diseases. Some of the definitions include a brief citation. Click on the "Bibliography" button at the top of the webpage to locate the complete citation.

#### **Research Guidance**

Are you new to genealogy, or maybe looking for a new angle, or just need some inspiration? Consider reading Who Do You Think You Are?: The Essential Guide To Tracing Your Family History by Megan Smolenyak Smolenyak, 2009. This is a companion guide to the NBC series designed to assist you in family research. The book includes preparation. online resources, how to use census and vital records, tracking down military and immigration documents, and the sleuth process. Mrs. Smolenyak, formerly chief family historian and spokesperson for Ancestry.com. co-founded RootsTelevision.com and **UnclaimedPersons.org** a volunteer group that assists coroners and medical examiners.

Use the *Online Archive of American Folk Medicine* database (www.folkmed.ucla.edu) to search for an ailment and discover the variety of homemade treatment methods used. Use the <u>advanced</u> search to specify the ailment as the "Condition" or select a "Region of Collection" (e.g. Western South for Texas, see the map) and browse the conditions. Some entries appear to be just plain silly. Click on the condition term to read the details on the belief and citation for that condition.

Look closely at the physical characteristics of ancestors in family photos. Differences in hair, eyes, teeth or the mouth, hands, fingers, legs or feet can help identify health problems. "Pictures of Health" published on page 23 of the Family Tree Magazine December 2009 issue shows several photographic examples.
