Genealogy involves using multiple sources to analyze and create a family narrative. This presentation is a case study about the discovery of documents and paper trail left by the Eli Hugh Davis family. Multiple research strategies will be discussed, as well as the importance of primary and secondary sources. Following case studies are a great way to learn more about how to use specific resources, understand how to solve specific research problems, and discover new research methodologies.

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Maiden Name Research Notes

As a reminder on how common genealogy record resources can help you track down a female ancestor's maiden name, read the online article "<u>Top 10 Places to Find Maiden</u> <u>Names</u>" by Kimberly Powell published on *About.com Guide* website.

Locate print and online resources of primary source collections through a subject index and finding aides published on <u>American</u>_

<u>Women's History: A Research Guide</u> website provided by Ken Middleton, a reference librarian at Walker Library, Middle Tennessee State University. Follow Middleton's blog titled Women's History Sources

(http://womenshistorysources.blogspot.com) for new and notable primary sources (exhibits, digital collections, books) in archives, historic sites, museums, and libraries.

From Middleton's guide, I discovered a wonderful free online resource called **Discovering American Women's History**

<u>Online</u>. This database simplifies access to an existing set of free online digital collections consisting of primary sources (photos, letters, diaries, artifacts, etc.) that document the history of women in the United States.

There are approximately 490 diverse digital collections accessible through *Discovering American Women's History Online*. You may search this group of collections by keywords or browse by subject (150+ entries), U.S. State, time period (1600s to 2009), and primary source type (e.g. diaries, scrapbooks, yearbooks, quilts, census, newspapers).

I looked for collections involving either Houston or Galveston. I found the <u>Mary (Mrs. Anson)</u> <u>Jones Letters</u> collection from The University of Houston Libraries' Special Collections had been digitized and is accessible online at *Portal to Texas History*, hosted by University of North Texas Libraries. Mary was the first President of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. You can see and read the original documents for some of her land deeds, power of attorney, property lists and law suits. This is part of a large collection of her personal letters discussing local affairs, family, and friends dated between 1866 and 1882. I used keyword searching to locate this collection. But browsing by U.S. State and choosing Texas would have been just as effective.

To search for collections involving a specific city, click on <u>advanced search</u> and then choose '**Selected fields.'** For example, enter **Texas** in the first box and choose '**Place'** for the first field name. Only U.S. States names are used in the '**Place'** field. Enter **Houston** in the second box and choose '**Description'** for the second field name. Specific cities are listed in the descriptions of the collections.



Indian Trail Marking Submitted by Neil Miserendino

The Indian River Lagoon in Florida spans nearly the entire coastal extent of Brevard, Indian River, St. Lucie and Martin counties. An unusually shaped oak tree located along this lagoon caught my curiosity. I found information that explained how Native Americans would mark the trails by bending trees. Maybe this tree was bent to mark a trail long ago. Since this tree is not large, it may not be old enough. However, the saltwater and bending could have stunted the tree's growth. Nearby the Bent Pine Golf Club located in Indian River County is named after a similarly bent pine tree located on the eighteenth fairway.

Elaine Jordan wrote the book *Indian Trail Trees* discussing and documenting many bent trees in Ellijay, Georgia. This book was published by Jordan Ink Publishing Company in 1997 and is available on <u>Amazon.com</u>.

The Mountain Stewards are sponsoring The Trail Tree Project in hopes of determining if the bent trees are from natural causes or a legacy from a former culture. The project established a central registry database to record information about probable trees existing today across the American Continent. Anyone can submit a tree for review and possible inclusion in the database. Do you have one in your neighborhood? Currently, there are over 1600 trees already collected and their graphic distribution is shown on an interactive map. Click on a map section to view individual tree pictures. This organization is currently applying for a grant to continue work in age determination and map correlation to natural or historical landmarks.

Got a GPS unit? The locations of interesting trail trees have been documented on *Waymarking.com* under the category <u>Native</u> <u>American Trail Trees</u>. *Waymarking.com* is an online resource allowing people to share and discover unique and interesting locations on the planet by latitude and longitude coordinates. Try finding one when you are in the area.

The Log House is owned by the San Jacinto Chapter of The Daughters of the Republic of Texas www.sanjacintodrt.org.
