# Orphan Train Ancestor Resources

The orphan train movement lasted from 1853 to the early 1900s and more than 120,000 children were placed. The Orphan Train Heritage Society (www.orphantraindepot.com) serves as a clearinghouse for researchers and operates an Orphan Train Complex in Concordia, Kansas. They have published the books Orphan Train Riders: Their Own Stories (4 vols.) in 1997; Journeys of Hope: Orphan Train Riders. Their Own Stories in 1999; and the quarterly newsletter Crossroads. Clayton Library has both books and issues of Crossroads between 1987-2005 with a few gaps. You can use PERSI found within the free online resource HeritageQuest to browse or search this newsletter's index for references to surnames of interest in issues published between 1987 and 2009. Ask your local library for login information to access HeritageQuest.

Click on the article title to access details which includes a "request form" link. If the article is in an issue that Clayton does not have, use that form to purchase a copy of the article from Allen County Public Library.

The book *The New York Foundling Hospital: an Index To Its Federal, State, and Local Census Records (1870-1925)* by Carolee R. Inskeep is also available at Clayton Library. It provides the names of 13,000 children who lived in the New York Foundling Hospital, many of whom were sent to adoptive families in the West. The 1890 census used for this book is not the federal census, but the one taken by New York State known as the "1890 Police Census."

Also, the birth location and age indicator for a child on a Census record can serve as a flag that the child was adopted.

# **September 1: Beginning Genealogy Part 1: The Basics**

This course will provide an overview of genealogical basics. By the end of this lesson you will understand: a variety of motivations for studying your family history; the building blocks of a family tree; how to identify the relationships in your family tree; how to record your family tree in a variety of formats; and the proper methods for recording names, dates and places.

# September 15: Beginning Genealogy Part 2: Principles of Family History

Genealogical or family history research is the process of searching records to find information about your relatives and using those records to link individuals to earlier and later generations. Information will be provided on records to search for in your own home and in the homes of your relatives. In addition this course will provide an overview of the most common records used to

The instructor will provide guidance on where and how to obtain original records in print, microfilm and online sources.

# September 29: Computer & Internet Genealogy Part 1: Record Keeping

Computers and the Internet have greatly enhanced the ability of the genealogist to organize their family tree information, share it with others and obtain compiled and original records through Internet record portals and databases. Part 1 of this course will provide an overview of both computerized and online genealogical record keeping options. Both software and Internet sites will be discussed and accessed.

#### October 27: Computer and Internet Genealogy Part 2: Introduction to Genealogy Databases

Genealogical databases are available through many public libraries including local public libraries and the Clayton Center for Genealogical Research in Houston. This course will provide an overview of the major genealogical databases available in local libraries. Special focus will be on methods to conduct searches in *Ancestry.com* Library Edition that is the largest database in terms of the number of records and the number of users. Students will be given a broad exposure to the compiled records and the original records available on *Ancestry.com*.
