DNA testing basics in a nutshell

Thanks to Jane Buck's presentation last month, the group gained a better understanding of the different DNA tests and how those tests can help identify surnames, ethnicities, and genetic cousins. In short, there are three types of

DNA inheritance that are helpful to genealogical research: Y-DNA, mitochondrial DNA, and autosomal DNA. Y chromosomes are passed down from father to son so only men can participate in the Y-DNA testing. The test results identify ancestors only in the direct paternal line. For women to benefit from Y-DNA testing, a brother, father, uncle, or grandfather must be tested. Mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) is passed down from mother to all sons and daughters so both men and women can participate in the mtDNA testing. The test results identify ancestors only in the direct maternal line. Both the Y-DNA and mtDNA tests can help identify a person's deep ancestral ethnic and geographical origins. Autosomal DNA is passed down from both parents to all children. That mixture of autosomal DNA in the children is combined with future mates' autosomal DNA and passed down to the next generation of children, and so on. Therefore, your autosomal DNA is a mixture of all previous generations of your family tree. Testing autosomal DNA is relatively new and both men and women can participate. Family Tree DNA (FTDNA) calls this test "Family Finder." The test results help identify members in all branches of your ancestry between 2 and 6 generations back. This works because each person participating in the autosomal DNA test provides their list of identified ancestral surnames based on their previous genealogical research. The test identifies other participants whose DNA haplotypes (values for a set of markers across a stretch of DNA) closely match and therefore are more closely related. The number of differences between two participants' haplotype can tell approximately how many generations they must go back to find a common ancestor. At this point, the participants (i.e. genetic cousins) review the list of known ancestral surnames to begin researching the common family relationship.

Sorenson Molecular Genealogical Foundation (SMGF) offers several short videos online introducing the types of DNA and how they help identify ancestry. FTDNA published online Genetic Genealogical Tutorials explaining how to pick the right person for testing, how the tests are

conducted, and understanding the test results.

Free public databases are available for people to compare their personal DNA test results with others. **SMGF** provides free public accessible Y-DNA and mtDNA databases you can search without previously participating in a DNA test. By looking at the entries in one of these databases, you can discover which surnames have participated in a DNA test. The entries include pedigree charts providing names with possible birth, marriage, death dates and locations for 2+ generations back. This information could provide a research clue or persuade you to participate in DNA testing. As an example, I created an account on the SMGF website (which only required name, e-mail, and a password) and searched the MOORE surname





using their provided default genetic values. I selected the search options: "Exact" surname, include country and include all maternal-line surnames. The results represent people that have been tested whose genealogical research has shown relationships to MOORE in Arkansas, Ohio, Tennessee, and Georgia. I viewed corresponding pedigree charts for several of the result entries looking for any ancestral connections to names, countries, states, counties and dates.





FTDNA offers two similar public databases: www.YSearch.org and www.MitoSearch.org. FTDNA also offers surname, lineage, and geographical projects for people to explore at
