# Friday, May 25, 2012: Melodey Mozeley Hauch presents "The Importance of Cluster Genealogy"

We meet at the University Baptist Church in the Great Room, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Clear Lake City - <u>online map)</u>

Cluster genealogy is also called the "whole family" or the "big picture" approach. The cluster includes the next of kin, the extended family, the friends, neighbors and associates and finally, people with the same surname. Melodey will share some techniques that help researchers not to break through brick walls but instead to work around them with information found in the nine types of records left by members of the cluster.

Melodey Mozeley Hauch was born and raised in Charlotte, North Carolina, moving with her family to Atlanta where they lived for many years. She graduated with a B.A. in Psychology from Agnes Scott College in 1971 and moved to Texas in 1980 with her husband Robert. The Hauchs have been residents of League City since 1984 where they raised their two sons.

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Melodey is currently an active member of six local lineage and historical societies. She started researching her family history nearly thirty years ago and became addicted to the hobby on her first visit to Clayton Library when she saw her grandmother listed on the 1900 census as a teenager.



Always interested in old cemeteries, Melodey has been researching and writing about local cemeteries since 2003 and is particularly interested in the historic graveyards in the area. She researched and compiled biographical sketches on all of the persons buried in three vandalized cemeteries, Sandy Point Cemetery in Brazoria County, Arcadia Evergreen Cemetery in Santa Fe and Campbell's Bayou Cemetery in Texas City. Melodey has won eight personal writing awards for her books and articles from the Texas State Genealogical Society and has been the editor of the BAGS Quarterly since December 2008. Husband Robert is listed as providing tech support for the Quarterly – he frequently rescues her when she cannot figure out how to get the computer to do what she wants.

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# Emily Croom's moto to all is...

## Think! Apply Logic! Research!

Emily stressed the importance of identifying good dates of events in order to move forward in your research to find more facts, and citing the sources used to establish those facts. This is your best defense against published information that contains errors.

During her presentation to BAGS, Emily discussed many resources she uses to flush out facts including:

Julian and Gregorian calendars since countries did not transition at the same time.

Records found at a state's Adjutant General's Office. Try a Google search using the the terms: *texas Adjunct General's records* 

Military and civilian national personnel records at the National Archives in St. Louis (www.archives.gov/st-louis)

Remember you can access military records within *Fold3.com* and *Ancestry.com* for <u>free</u> when using the Internet access within a Houston Public Library branch (e.g. Clayton Library). Use the library's public Internet stations or take your own laptop. Following the links in the section "Revolutionary War Online Records" on the website *American Revolutionary War* 

(www.myrevolutionarywar.com) to access search interfaces for specific Revolutionary War records that can be found within *Fold3.com* and *Ancestry.com*.

# Native Americans in 1940

If your Native American ancestor was enrolled in a tribe and living on an Indian Reservation in 1940, you may find them in the NARA microfilm publication M595, *Indian Census Rolls, 1885-1940* (totaling 692 rolls). The National Archives has provided a table on their <u>website</u> and in a <u>PDF document</u> listing the contents of each roll, the jurisdiction and coverage dates. The rolls are available for viewing at the Clayton Library in cabinet C67, drawer D01. The library notes for this resource are:

- Alpha by Agency, Location or Tribal Affiliation.
- Information on Rolls Vary.
- Not a Census for Every Reservation or Group of Indians for Every Year.

## 1940 U.S. Census Community Project



At the time of printing, 17 members had indexed over

44,171 records of which 24,653 records have been indexed during the month of May. Many of the members have indexed over 1000 records in May. Patsy Chappelear leads the group with 13,800 records indexed, followed by Annette Bowen with 5,179 records and Bill Mayo with 4,240 records. **Great Job Everyone!** Thanks to this community project, there is now a search interface where you can enter surname/given names, county, gender, and race to find people included in the 1940 Census living in Delaware, Colorado, Kansas, New Hampshire, Oregon, and Virginia. Access the search interfaces and follow the progress of other states you are interested in at

www.familysearch.org/1940census and click on "View All States" under "Overall Progress" section.
