Friday, June 29, 2012: Jennifer Ross-Nazzal, PhD presents "Winning the West for Women"

Dr. Jennifer Ross-Nazzal's book "Winning the West for Women" documents the life of Emma Smith DeVoe, an leader in the suffrage movement, who moved across the country organizing, raising money, and helping make the West central to achieving the vote for women. The National Council of Women Voters, whose members were predominately western women, played an important role in securing the passage of the Nineteenth Amendment. This biography describes the real experiences of women and their relationships as they struggled to win the right to vote. Dr. Ross-Nazzal will discuss her research for writing this book. Books will be available for sale and autograph. Dr. Ross-Nazzal received

her PhD from Washington State University, was involved in the oral history project for NASA and is now the historian at NASA Johnson Space Center.

Texas Women's University

maintains a major research collection on the history of American women. The library first began collecting the biographies of great women in 1932 at the suggestion of its president, Dr. Louis H. Hubbard, "to serve as role models" to students. The collection has since grown to over 78,000 books, 6.200 cubic feet of manuscript collections, 25,000 photographs, approximately 2,000 periodical titles, 600 oral history projects, and major manuscript and book collections on microform. These materials cover the subjects of women's suffrage movement, equal legal rights, authors, educators, athletics and competitive sports, artists, health sciences, and the military. A catalog of these materials is available online. This collection serves as the official archive of the Women Airforce Service Pilots of World War II (WASP) including photographs, wartime documents, uniforms, and artifacts. Select "WASP Photographs" on the WASP catalog to browse over 3900 digitized photographs of women and men involved in the program. Also view WASP class listings.

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Online WWII Newsreels



Do you remember sitting in the movie theatre and watching the black and white newsreels? Some of these newsreels are being digitized and published online for free viewing.

"Fox Movietone News: the War Years, 1942 -1944," provides free online access to over two hundred Fox Movietone News newsreels released in American theaters from September 1942 through August 1944. During the war, two newsreels (8 to 10 minutes long) were released per week by each of the five major American newsreel companies (Fox Movietone News, Universal News, Hearst News of the Day, Paramount News, and Pathé News). View the newsreel released Saturday, November 18, 1942 covering America's progress one year after the Pearl Harbor attack. The footage includes Roosevelt declaration of war and ends with a short helicopter demonstration. The Tuesday, June 13, 1944 newsreel summarizes the offensive strategies used during the D-Day Allied invasion on Normandy. Browse the list of newsreels by month and year or country, or search the cataloged descriptions by key words.

The site also provides access to archival paper records associated with each theatrical release. These paper records (also known as "dope sheets") show the editorial decisions made by the staff at *Fox Movietone News*. This digitized collection is the result of collaboration between the University of South Carolina and the Library of Congress. The collection is to be used for educational purposes only, and items are not to be reproduced without permission from Moving Image Research Collections, 707 Catawba Street, University of South Carolina, SC 29208.

Mapping Antique Photos

You may have heard of *Pinterest.com*. There is a similar website called HistoryPin (www.historypin.com) devoted to collecting vintage photographs, audio, and video accompanied with captions and pinning them to the related geographic location. Then people can search by geographic location and refine by date and subject to locate photos of interest. A short audio click of "Houston we have a problem" is pinned to the location of the Johnson Space Center. HistoryPin has been developed by the not-for-profit company We Are What We Do, in partnership with Google. The site's goal is to share small glimpses of the past and to build up the huge story of human history. Museums, archives, libraries, and individuals across the globe are posting photos on this website. Click on the "Map" tab to begin searching by location, date, or subject for photos already pinned. Click on "Tours & Collections" tab to view themed groupings of the pinned photos (e.g. events, locations). Click on "Channel" tab to view all photos pinned by a specific contributor (e.g. US National Archives, Imperial War Museum, Nova Scotia Archives, Manchester Archives).


This site has the potential of being a good resource but at this point the content is sparse. Suggest adding this site to your list of online resources to search periodically for new content.

Similar site with a different set of photos is What Was There (www.whatwasthere.com). This site links historical photographs of buildings, landmarks, locations, etc. to current Google Maps street view worldwide. By overlaying old photos onto current day street images of the same location, you get an idea of how the area looked like in the past. For example, a search for Houston, TX retrieves a list of photos that include City Hall, Nichols-Rice-Cherry home, H E Hinrichsen Grocery, Alabama Theatre, and Sunken Gardens. Click on one of the photos and then click the "Google Street View" button on that photo to see the historic image overlapped with a current view of the same location.

Cluster Genealogy – May Program Recap

Melodey provided some great examples of how she used the cluster method to uncover information on several generations of many people. Cluster

genealogy allows her to "sneak up on the information" she really wants, by looking at the well known record types for the next of kin, extended family, friends, neighbors, and people with the same surname. It really works! For example, if you cannot find an obituary, try looking at the



Fraternal announcements. These can document the person's death through the printed instructions to the order's members concerning the funeral arrangements. Nick Cimino suggested looking for wedding anniversary notices in the newspapers because the content can list all the family. Melodey pointed out that pension records may include an actual copy of a marriage or death certificate for proof to receive or stop pension, respectively. Pension records are filed in the state the person was living not the where they originally fought.

Want to learn more? Read Chapter 3 "Broadening the Scope: Cluster Genealogy" in Emily Croom's book *The Sleuth Book For Genealogists: Strategies for More Successful Family History Research* available at your local library. The use of cluster genealogy method is sprinkled throughout the book in case studies. Thank you Melodey for providing a great program!

FGS Radio

Did you know the Federation of Genealogical Societies has its own radio show?

"My Society" is broadcasted each Saturday afternoon live on the Internet at 1:00 pm Central and focuses on the issues that confront genealogical societies. Each episode is archived and available for playback at a later date. Available past episodes include Internet Tools for Societies; Facebook and Your Genealogy Society; What's New with Mocavo?; and WordPress for Your Society Website. All you need to listen to FGS Radio is a computer or mobile device (e.g. smartphone or tablet) with Internet access and speakers or headphone jack in order to listen. Access www.BlogTalkRadio.com/MySociety, scroll down to either the Upcoming Broadcast or On-Demand Episodes section, and click on the episode title.

Pst... You can now access Fold3.com from home for free through the Houston Public Library (HPL) website.

In the past, you had to go into a HPL branch to get free access. The HPL website still states "in library use only". Just click on Fold3 on the webpage www.houstonlibrary.org/genealogy and enter all 14 digits of your HPL Power Card number. Don't have one? You can get one for free by visiting any HPL branch. Otherwise, register online at https://catalog.houstonlibrary.org/selfreg/ onlinereg to receive a temporary card that provides access to databases such as Fold3.com for 30 days.

Pst..You can also access content in *NewspaperArchives.com* from home for free through the Galveston Rosenberg Library website. Access their <u>eLibrary</u>, click on "Newspaper Archives," and enter all 14 digits of a valid Rosenberg Library card, available for free to Texas residents.

Giant leaps in progress have been made this month. A 1940 Census search interface is now available for the states of

Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Idaho, Kansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Wyoming, and Virginia. Access the search interfaces and follow the progress of other states at **www.familysearch.org/1940census** and click on "View All States" under "Overall Progress" section.

At the time of printing, members have indexed 76,831 records of which 19,197 records were indexed in the month of June.
