Public Invited. Join us at 6:30pm for dinner.


We meet at the University Baptist Church in the Chapel, 1st floor. (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Clear Lake City - online map)

1940 U.S. Census – Searching & Correcting


Ancestry.com has fully indexed the 1940 U.S. Census for every state and territory. Ancestry.com is providing access to this collection for free but you have to create an account and sign in with that account before the results will be shown. Click here to access the search interface. This interface provides search fields for name, birth year, birth location, living location, family member name, family relationship, marital status, street, gender, and race/nationality.

For the 1940 US Census Community Project led by FamilySearch.org, the indexing effort was completed on Friday, August 3, 2012. It will take a few more weeks to complete the quality audit of the remaining states (Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, South Carolina, Tennessee) and publish them online for searching. However, the majority of the states and territories are already searchable online at www.familysearch.org/1940census. This interface provides search fields for name, living location, family member name, family relationship, gender, and race/nationality.

Searching

The search indexes for Ancestry.com and FamilySearch.org were developed independently and therefore the same search can produce different results from each resource. Meaning you may have more success in finding the right 1940 Census entry for a person in Ancestry.com vs. FamilySearch.org, or visa versa. For example, I was helping a friend locate her father, Charles Lowe, who lived in Miami, Florida in 1940. She knew his mother's name was Frances Lowe and they were all living with Frances' parents Charles and Catherine Norris. Using Ancestry.com, my searches for Charles Lowe in Florida returned many entries but none appeared to be the correct person. I tried searching for Charles Norris in Florida and then Frances Lowe in Florida. I would have found the entry if I had used a wildcard to compensate for different spellings (i.e. Charl* would match Charle, Charlie, Charles), but I gave up and switched to FamilySearch.org. My first search provided the exact match. My problem was the surnames were transcribed correctly in FamilySearch.org and not in Ancestry.com. In Ancestry.com, the Lowe was transcribed as Loure. Charles Norris was transcribed as Charle and Frances was transcribed as Frances. I don't blame the transcribers because the handwriting is hard to read and I am stunned FamilySearch.org got it right.


1940 U.S. Census entry from Ancestry.com for Charles A. Lowe, Miami, Dade Co., Florida.

Correcting


Ancestry.com provides an online error reporting system allowing users to add alternate information or corrections (e.g. transcription errors, birth or maiden names, nicknames, name variations, incorrect originals), report an image problem, and leave comments. The original information remains intact. You will find these features in the **Page Tools** section on the left side of an individual's summary page. Click here to access instructions for using these features. For my 1940 U.S. Census example, I viewed the summary page Charles A. Loure and selected **Add Alternate Information** within the **Page Tools** section on the left side of the page.



Then in the "add an update" popup window, I selected **Name** as option for "Provide alternate of" question, chose **Transcription error** for "reason", entered corrected information, cited my source, and then clicked the **Submit Alternate** button. When the change was applied, I was asked if the same change should be made to the mother's and brother's surnames. This process can be used to also update the relationship, age, birth year, and birth place.

These updates appear written in italics in the index overlay when viewing the record image. However according to the online help, the same information will be viewable by others in roughly four weeks.



I can update or delete the alternate information I added through the same feature. Click on View/Add Alternate Info in the Page Tools area. Then the "view member contributions" popup window appears. Click on the trash can to delete a contribution, or click on Add to include additional alternate information.



The Experience

Use wildcards and include birth or residence information to compensate for different name spellings when searching the 1940 U.S. Census records. BAGS members that participated in the indexing project for these records have a better understanding of this problem after agonizing over correcting a census taker's errors for names, places, and gender associations.

Loren Martin, BAGS Treasurer, kindly provided the

following summary of his indexing experience which is shared by several of the BAGS indexing volunteers.

"When the 1940 Federal Census Indexing Project began, I wanted to participate to help others who would be researching in the future. I have been very appreciative of the many indices that have been available to me in my research in the past. The first few 1940 batches that I indexed were a challenge. I had trouble deciphering the handwriting, was bothered by the misspellings and inaccurate geographic references, my very poor typing skills, and the slowness of my old computer. It was a slow process in the beginning, because of these issues and diligently looking-up the correct spelling of the cities, counties and countries where individuals had lived in 1935. However the more batches that I transcribed, I began to be 'pretty good' at deciphering handwriting and learned when to correct spellings and wrong locations and when to just copy what was recorded (for example, cities or counties listed in the wrong state or entered in the wrong column). My typing proficiency improved a little and I learned how to adjust to the slower computer turnaround. I then became obsessed with entering as many batches as I had time (spending late nights and many hours during the day). The sense of accomplishment and the 'good feeling' was very rewarding that I was actually in some small part repaying others, who indexed before me, and helping those who would use this information starting almost immediately. I genuinely had fun doing this project and am very proud and thankful for the thousands of individuals who accomplished so much and in such a very short period of time." - Loren Martin
