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United Kingdom Research

Find search strategies for using the British National Archives' digital microfilm free resource (located online at

www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/records/digitalmicrofilm.htm) in the article "British National Archives – Digital Microfilm Access" by Ed Storey in *Internet GENEALOGY* magazine August 2013 issue. This collection covers naval personnel, civilian sailors, and army officers and families from mid 1700 through 1990. Access the <u>online catalog</u> to search all their online record collections. Searching the catalogue is free of charge, but there may be a fee to download the records. For free items, you may still need to add them to a shopping cart and checkout but payment is not requested. If you are new to searching these archives, use the <u>start here page</u> to learn where and how to use the British National Archives.

The same magazine issue includes a second article "Memorial Inscriptions on United Kingdom and Irish Gravestones" by Alan Stewart on page 37-42 discussing free and subscription websites that provide transcriptions of gravestones, monuments, and floor-stones located in Britain, Ireland, Scotland, and Wales.

It's Hurricane Season!

One way to ensure your research survives and thrives from a disaster is to go paperless. Vertical Files at Clayton Library

I discovered bible records for a Texas ancestor on the DAR GRC Index Resource and ordered a copy. I was surprised to discover that the records were also in the Vertical File at Clayton Library. I encourage you to check for ancestor names in the Family Vertical Files located on the second floor next time you are at **<u>Clayton Library</u>**. This resource is a series of filing cabinets containing file folders of miscellaneous loose papers arranged alphabetically by surname. Also check the Family Bible Records that are located at the end of the Family Vertical Files. These bible records are copies of the family pages (typically showing birth, marriage, and death dates) from family bibles that had been donated to the library in the past. To assist you in using the Family Vertical Files and the Family Bible Records, there are two notebooks on top of the filing cabinets, one titled "Vertical File Materials - Families" and the other titled "Bible Records in the Vertical Files". These notebooks show which surnames are represented in these two collections. 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July Program Recap



Greg Boyd of Arphax Publishing gave some background about himself and his company that has published 510 books in the Family Map series. The books provide maps of the first landowners in the public land states. Greg then provided a live demonstration of the *HistoryGeo.com* website and the First Landowners Project. Greg has put all of the maps from the books online into one single interactive map containing over 7 million land owners spread out among 17 of the 23 public land states and Texas. A parcel of land is linked to the county boundary history, patent details, survey, and original document images. He has produced two free online YouTube videos demonstrating how to use this product.

First video: *HistoryGeo.com's First Landowners Project - Map Viewer Essentials* shows how to view a single-map containing millions of original landowners in Alabama, Arkansas, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, Texas, Utah, and Wisconsin (with all states west of these, and Florida, yet to come). Second video: *HistoryGeo.com's First Landowners Project - Tips, Tricks, and New Tools* shows how to locate original landowners, towns, and cemeteries, and how to use longitude and latitude to zoom to locations in this single map with over 7.2 million original landowners. (click here to view video)

For those that prefer the hardcopy, Clayton Library has over 500 of Greg's books containing township/range maps for various counties in 21 states: AL, AR, CO, FL, IL, IN, IA, LA, MI, MN, MS, MO, NE, NM, ND, OH, OK, SD, UT, WA, and WI. Use the Houston Public Library Online Catalog at https://halan.sdp.sirsi.net/client/hou to determine if Clayton Library has a family map book for your specific state and county. Enter the search terms: "family maps" boyd alabama (change alabama to the state you are researching).

Access the Texas land survey maps books by entering the search terms: boyd texas bell (change bell to the county you are researching).

Click on the "Search" at the top of the **www.familysearch.org** home page to access the familiar keyword and browse search page.

FamilySearch Family Tree Photos Search At the top of the search page are tabs to access an interface for searching individual records, submitted genealogies, LDS library catalog, digitized genealogy and family history publications, and the wiki. Use the wiki to find helpful how-to research articles on a topic or country/state. Many publications from the Clayton Library have been digitized and can be viewed online using the "Books" search. Just enter "Clayton Library" in quotes.

Family History Books

Periodically visit the "Records" search page, and choose "United States" (or another country) under the "Browse By Location" section to see what record collections have been recently updated. For example, this month the *Arkansas First Draft Registration Cards* (1940-1945) images, BillionGrave Index, Boston, Mass. Passenger Lists (1820-1891) images, Texas County Tax Rolls (1846-1910) images, and US Public Records Index have been added or updated.

Scandinavian Research

Take a look at the five techniques to puzzle out patronymics, read church records and find ancestors in Norway, Sweden, and Denmark presented in the article "Discovering Scandinavian Roots" by Diana Crisman Smith published in *Family Tree Magazine*, September 2013 issue.

Dr. John Philip Colletta is one of America's most popular genealogical lecturers. Knowledgeable, experienced and entertaining, he resides in Washington, D.C. He has worked at the Library of Congress, taught workshops at the National Archives, and wrote the books *They Came in Ships, Finding Italian Roots*, and *Only a Few Bones*.

Today, Dr. Colletta is a faculty member of the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama, the Salt Lake Institute of Genealogy, and Boston University's Certificate in Family History program. This seminar includes the following lectures:

Records of the Federal Courts *1789-1911: Drama in Your Ancestors' Lives*

Federal court records contain all manner of information about your ancestors: their finances, business dealings, personal and family relationships, homes and property, personalities, disputes, triumphs and defeats. This lecture explains the system of federal courts, 1789-1911, and describes the records those courts created. Research strategies demonstrate how to use the Web site of the National Archives, public records, newspapers, Federal Cases, the Federal Reporter, and other tools to find federal court cases involving your ancestors. Particular case studies reveal the fascinating personal information these records contain.

Lesser-Used Federal Records: Sources of Rich Detail about Ancestors' Lives


Whenever the path of an ancestor's life intersected with a federal government agency, paperwork was created. That paperwork fills our National Archives. Most of it has not been indexed, published, microfilmed or digitized, but some of it has. This lecture explores some of the more easily accessible paperwork that provides rich biographical detail about our ancestors. Discussion includes a selection from the following: 1) passport applications, 1791-1925; 2) homestead files, beginning 1863; 3) Civil War Income Tax records, 1862-72; 4) The Journals of Congress, 1789-1873; 5) Appointments of Postmasters, 1789-1971; 6) Federal Court records, 1789-1911; and 7) Civil War draft registrations, 1863-65.

The Library of Congress: An Introduction and Overview

The Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., is one of the country's greatest repositories for genealogical research. Yet, because it is dauntingly large and requires on-site research, it tends to be underutilized. This lecture takes the mystery and trepidation out of using our national library and demonstrates the tremendous benefits of making a research trip to Washington. It sketches the institution's history, describes the formalities for using it, and highlights — one reading room at a time—the innumerable and often unique treasures it holds. The extraordinary Web site of the Library of Congress is explored, and practical suggestions are made by someone who worked part-time at the library for twenty years.

Private Archives: What They Are and How to Use Them

Private entities, such as churches and synagogues, businesses, social organizations, and educational institutions, create records about their activities and their members. Over time these records accumulate, and eventually many private entities segregate them into an archives for preservation and research. Using Internet sites, this lecture describes the various kinds of private archives that exist and explains when and why you might want to search for one. Five sample cases illustrate how using private archives contributed to the speaker's genealogical research.
