Friday, February 28, 2014: Nick Cimino discusses Research Techniques for the British Isles

Come learn research techniques for the British Isles from 1801 to 1922. Records both before and after this period will be discussed as well. This program covers the geographic area of England, Scotland, Wales, Ireland, and the Isle of Man. BAGS member Nick Cimino will summarize the principal types of record sources for these areas including online, microfilm and archival.

Nick Cimino has been actively pursuing genealogical research and education since 1989. He has worked as a genealogical teacher and lecturer since the early 1990s presenting genealogy classes and lectures on beginning, intermediate and advanced techniques. His

areas of expertise include U.S. and Colonial America, Ireland, Britain, Italy, Native American and African American. He has done on site research at the Public Record Office of Northern Ireland and the Family History Library in Salt Lake City and is well acquainted with the principal record sources for the British Isles, Ireland and the Channel Islands.

The general meeting program on Friday, March 28 will feature Rene Armstrong, local author of *Wings And A Ring: Letters of War and Love from a WWII Pilot*, discussing her research, writing, and publishing experiences.

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Message from the Corresponding Secretary Annette Anderson Bowen

I am serving my second term on the BAGS board as Corresponding Secretary. My job is to send welcome cards to BAGS visitors, thank-you notes to our speakers, and cards to members when they are ill or have deaths in their families (provided I am notified!) I have also served as proof-reader for the *Quarterly* and worked on the Mt. Olivet Cemetery Project

and the BAGS cookbook. I am a charter member of BAGS, and belong to DAR, UDC, Clayton Library Friends, First Families of Mississippi, and the Vicksburg Genealogy Society.

I began researching my family about fifteen years ago. A cousin invited me to a ceremony in Clark County, Kentucky, to mark the graves of our ancestors who were pioneer settlers and had been at Boonesborough with Daniel Boone. When I saw historical markers for two of my ancestors, I was hooked. I wanted to learn everything I could about my family's history. I have been actively researching my family ever since. Our travels have involved visits to locations where ancestors lived, visits to state archives, court houses, the Family History Center in Salt Lake City, and of course, to many cemeteries. I am now trying to write my family history, including scanned copies of the documents, letters, newspaper clippings, invitations, and other sources, to share with cousins so that my work will not be lost. I have submitted short sections of my work to our BAGS *Quarterly*, and would suggest that this is a good way to preserve your work for future generations since it will be indexed in PERSI.

My mother's paternal family came to Colonial Virginia and migrated through Kentucky and Tennessee to Mississippi. Her maternal ancestors settled in the Mississippi Territory, just north of Natchez. My father's family immigrated from Sweden and Norway in 1869 and 1880 to Red Wing, Minnesota and settled just across the Mississippi River in Wisconsin. I also research my husband's family. His mother's ancestors were Mennonites who came to Penn's colony in the early 1700s. Her ancestor left Pennsylvania to settle in east Tennessee, and eventually moved to the Arkansas Territory. His father's family was in South Carolina and Georgia before also moving to Arkansas. Surnames I research include Holder, Bowles, Harwell, Bowen, Hoover, Hughes, Standridge, Deramus. In Sweden and Norway they used Patronymics rather than surnames. I am always happy to "talk genealogy" and willing to help when I can.

January Program Recap

At last month's program, Anna Marie Edwards discussed the past and present contributions Native Americans have made to the U.S. military in the areas of tactical planning, maneuvering, leadership, and sacrifice. She shared endearing stories of several Native American veterans: **Charles Chibitty** (Comanche code-talker on Utah Beach in Normandy), Pfc. **Ira H. Hayes** (one of the men who raised the U.S. flag atop Mount Suribachi, Iwo Jima), **Billy Walkabout** (most decorated Native American soldier in the Vietnam War), **Lori Piestewa** (first women in U.S. armed forces killed in

2003 invasion of Iraq). Military records may be a good resource to track Native American ancestors. Anna stressed Native American men were willing to serve in the U.S. military and had the highest volunteer rate of other ethnicities. Also keep in mind when researching records, Native Americans were not considered citizens of the United States until June 2, 1924 when Congress passed the Indian Citizenship Act. This started the policies of creating Indian schools to teach children reading, writing, and social habits of mainstream America. The 1928 Meriam Report showed these policies were oppressing Native Americans and destroying their culture and society. The Indian Reorganization Act passed in 1934 returned some of the surplus land to Native Americans and urged tribes to engage in active self-government.

Anna and her husband Jim serve as historians for the group "Gathering of Eagles," a veteran and active military organization. The group's website address is www.gatheringofeagleshouston.com. They have created approximately seventy displays boards, each presenting the life history of a specific veteran. They brought and setup ten of these boards for us to view during the meeting. Page 8 has a couple of pictures of these displays. Some of the articles presented on the boards were pulled from the publication *Native American Times* (now accessible online at http://nativetimes.com) and VVA (Vietnam Veterans of American) Veteran Magazine (archive issues available online at http://vva.org/veteran.html).

The Gathering of Eagles group meets twice a month on Thursdays from noon to 1pm at the IHOP Restaurant located on Gulf Freeway at Woodridge, just inside the 610 Loop. The meetings are open to everyone and there is usually a speaker from the military community. The next meeting will be on Thursday, February 20.

Black Roots: Tracing the Family Tree 9:15am - 10:15am

This is a fun, inspirational talk for beginners and people with no knowledge of genealogy research. It contains humorous stories of research and how an important 100 year old riddle was solved, mending bad family feelings. It contains easy, practical methods and sources that anyone can use the next day to begin researching their family history.

From Census to Slavery 10:30am - 11:30am

Most African American researchers try to leap from census records to slave research, bypassing a multitude of records in between. A broad foundation after the Civil War will increase the probabilities of success during the slavery period.

Follow Your African American Roots to Clayton Library noon - 12:30pm

This is a Lunch and Learn presentation by Franklin Smith. Learn about the many resources at Clayton that will help you find the information you need when researching African-American Ancestors.

Methods and Sources of Identifying Slave Owners 1:00pm - 2:00pm

Everyone is not fortunate enough to have had the name of the last slave owner passed down from generation to generation through oral history. Therefore, if this name is unknown, research must be conducted to identify the former slave owner - essential to researching slave genealogy. Many texts and many researchers overlook this crucial question. Identifying the slave owner is based on evidence, not assumption. There are many records that indicate the name of the former slave owner. Learn how to prove who the last slave owner was. This presentation will also cover some of the unique problems associated with African American surnames, which sometimes lead our research astray.

The Six Phases of African American Genealogy 2:15pm - 3:15pm

This is an overview of the methods and sources in the six distinct phases that are the building blocks of African American genealogy. It progresses from beginning to more advanced research, highlighting some of the problems and complexities of African American genealogy along the way. It is designed for beginners, intermediates and advanced researchers.
