Why is it so expensive to research genealogy online? You do have other options! Your closest Family History Center (FHC) offers the public **free** access to several popular fee-based websites. The most notable of these is *Ancestry.com*. Of course you can't wear your jammies with the feet in them to the FHC, but the price difference between \$300.00 and free is substantial. Come April 25 to find out exactly how many other sites can be accessed for free at the FHC.

March Program Recap

The group enjoyed learning of Rene Armstrong's research paths into locating living people and primary resources that identified and explained the lives of Lt. James Richard Jones and Helen Elnora Bartlett, the subjects of her book *Wings and a Ring* (www.wingsandaring.com). She discussed how she interweaved additional primary material with the couple's love letters in her book to intensify the reader's understanding of the WWII operations in New Guinea. As part of our personal research efforts, Rene encouraged us to connect with local historians, meet family fraternity and sororities brothers and sisters, and attend war veteran reunion groups. The American Legion publishes the dates, locations, and contact information for reunions in their magazine and on their website (www.legion.org/reunions). The



website supports searching by unit, ship, and/or branch as well as browsing by branch. VetFriends.com provides a list of "US Military & Veteran Organizations by State or Category" **www.vetfriends.com/organizations.**

Rene along with Suzie Jones Neff (daughter of the book's featured couple) plan to donate the love letters to The Institute on World War II and the Human Experience at Florida State in Tallahassee, FL (<u>http://ww2.fsu.edu</u>). With over 6,000 collections, this institute's mission is to collect and preserve the memories of men and women in who participated in all the military branches, service with the Merchant Marine, Red Cross, USO, workers and volunteers on the Home Front (e.g., ship-building yards, defense plants, YMCA and other clubs) during the WWII era and the immediate post-war period (i.e., 1939 - 1949). In 2001, Tom Brokaw donated countless items sent to him while writing his three books on "The Greatest Generation." The institute accepts donations related World War II (1936-49) "Great Depression" to "Early Occupation." This facility is open to the public but research must be done in person by appointment.

At the end of the program, Rene shared an entertaining and informative rarely-seen film footage recorded by the 345th Bomb Group members while they received and escorted Japanese Peace Emissaries to and from the formal surrender meeting with General MacArthur.

Reminisce

Did you read last month's newsletter article "Old Memories Take on a New Meaning" by Mary Martin? Annette Bowen did and here she shares a similar experience.

We were on the way home from Georgia and went through Jackson, Mississippi, so that I could do some research in the Mississippi Archives (<u>http://mdah.state.ms.us/new/research/genealogy</u>). Every Wednesday they have a history program during the lunch hour, usually at the Archives, but that week it was a talk on the Old Capitol, the building and events there, and the program was given in the House of Representatives Chamber in the Old Capitol building. I decided to take a break and attend it. In the middle of the presentation I suddenly realized that I was sitting in the very chamber where my great grandfather had sat as a young man, when he served as a representative in 1854. I had been in that chamber many times for different programs when my mother lived in Jackson, but this was the first time that it had occurred to me that it was the same chamber where William Dunbar Holder had served as a representative.

Cloud Storage

Want to go paperless? Want to move to the cloud? What is the "cloud?" The "cloud" is disk storage that is accessible from the Internet using either a web browser or a web-accessible application on your computer or makila daviage. This disk storage resides an acfe and accura guatement maintained.

mobile device. This disk storage resides on safe and secure systems maintained by companies such as Amazon, Apple, Dropbox, Google, and Microsoft. Clouds can be used as primary or backup storage for your data files, letters, photos, videos, etc. Access your personal cloud storage from anywhere you can connect to the Internet. This setup can protect and preserve your research



from computer, home, and natural disasters. There are several companies that offer cloud storage and most of those work on all computers, tablets, and phones. Each product has a different free/pay plan and imposes different individual file size limit restrictions. Plans may also offer features for mobile access and file sync between all your devices. Below is a listing of a few major providers and their current free/pay plan. Most of the products work on all devices except where noted.

Notes to provide a frame of reference when reading about disk storage sizes: 1) One gigabyte (GB) of disk storage can hold approximately 500 photographs scanned at 300 dots per inch or 350 digital photographs taken with a 10 mega-pixel camera. 2) There is 1000 GB in one terabyte (TB). 3) Current basic laptop has between 300GB and 500GB size hard drive installed. 4) A Microsoft Surface can have 256MB of file storage resident on the tablet. 5) An Apple iPad can have 128GB file storage. 6) A Kindle Fire can have 64GB file storage.

With a free Gmail account, you automatically get access to **Google Drive** (<u>drive.google.com</u>) which provides free file and photo storage of 15 GB. You can obtain more storage space for a fee starting at \$24 per year for 100GB and \$120 per year for 1 TB. Help is available online at <u>https://support.google.com/drive/?hl=en#topic=14940</u>. The file size limits vary depending on the type (i.e. document, spreadsheet, presentation, photo, etc). File size limits are explained online at <u>https://support.google.com/drive/answer/37603?hl=en</u>

Dropbox (<u>www.dropbox.com</u>) offers free file (date and photo) storage from 2 GB up to 16 GB by referring friends to Dropbox. Obtain more storage with a yearly subscription to Dropbox Pro 100GB, 200GB, or 500GB plan for a fee of \$100, \$200, or \$500 per year, respectively. Your storage quota defines the maximum file size limit.

Microsoft OneDrive (<u>onedrive.live.com</u>) offers 7GB of free file storage. Existing users will get an extra 500MB free for each new user (up to 10 total users) they refer to OneDrive. Individual files cannot be more than 2GB in size. Obtain more storage of 50GB, 100GB, or 200GB for a fee of \$25, \$50, or \$100 per year, respectively.

Box (<u>www.box.com</u>) offers free file storage up to 10 GB with an individual file size cannot be larger than 250MB. You can obtain 100GB more storage space for a fee of \$120 per year and then file sizes can be up to 5GB.

Got an Apple device (iPhone or iPad)? Apple iCloud (**www.icloud.com**) offers free file storage up to 5 GB. Obtain more storage of 10GB, 20GB, or 50GB for a fee of \$20, \$40, or \$200 per year, respectively. Did not find any references to file size limitations.

Got a Kindle Fire? Amazon offers 5GB of free Cloud Drive storage for your personal documents, photos, videos, and music, with additional storage plans available for purchase. Any supported content uploaded to your Cloud Drive account will appear on your Kindle Fire. Help is available online at http://www.amazon.com/gp/help/customer/display.html/ref=hp navbox clouddrive faq?nodeId=200557340.

Flickr (<u>www.flickr.com</u>) offers free photo and video storage up to 1 TB. The file size limits are 200MB per photo, 3 minutes per video, and 1GB per 1080p HD video.
