### Language Translation Tool

*Is your online research taking you to websites published in a foreign language?* Some websites do offer a link at the top of the page to translate the written content into English. An alternative solution is to install the free Google Chrome web browser to do your online foreign research (chrome.google.com). The Google Chrome browser offers a translate button just below the address bar which when clicked will convert the text on the website to English. This should expand the world of available websites for you to research. An online help page is available at https://support.google.com/chrome/answer/173424?hl=en



### **Hurricane Preparedness**

Gulf coast residents with special health care needs or lack of transportation if and when an evacuation is announced, should register in <u>advance</u> for assisted transportation. This includes people that are disabled, medically fragile, do not have a vehicle, or do not have family or friends to rely on for help to evacuate. Do not wait until a storm is in the Gulf to register for assistance. If you or anyone you know needs evacuation assistance in the case of an emergency, **call 211 (or 877-541-7905** if you get a busy tone for 211) to register with the State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry (STEAR) program. Registration is voluntary and free of charge. All information collected by STEAR is confidential and is not available to the public. The 211 STEAR registry <u>now</u> requires <u>annual</u> registration. If you registered last year, you must register again this year. **Hurricane Preparedness tips online:**

#### Beginning Genealogy & African-American Research – Three Sessions

**Thursday, August 7, September 4, and October 2 at 10:30am** at the Friendswood Public Library (416 S. Friendswood Drive, Friendswood) These sessions are free and the public is invited.

Nick Cimino will provide instruction on how to begin researching your family's ancestry with an emphasis on African-American ancestors. The August session will cover getting started with your living family's knowledge, checklists, charting, timelines, interviewing, and African-American surnames. The September session will work through a case study on how to use 19th and 20th Century census, vital records, and military records. Attendees are encouraged to bring family information or memorabilia for show & tell at this program. The October session will cover African-American history and genealogy in Texas, sources for Texas vital records, and genealogy records of special value to African-Americans.

#### "New Avenues in Genetic Genealogy"

**Saturday, August 9 at 10:30am** (registration begins at 10:15am) in the Carriage House meeting room at the Clayton Library. Program is presented by Jeremy Balkin, representing Family Tree DNA, based in Houston. DNA testing for the purposes of genealogy has allowed people to understand more clearly where they came from, who they are related to, and what their overall ethnic makeup is. It has connected the entire world as one large genealogical community. Mr Balkin will help explain, in layman's terms, what "getting tested" involves, how the science behind the testing works, and how you can discover your ancestry more clearly through a simple cheek swab.
