#### A Research Story from August 2014 Show & Tell BAGS Program

My paternal Grandfather, Eugenio Miserendino, was one of three brothers who emigrated from a small town in central Sicily called Petralia Sottana. During the early years of the 1900s, the brothers settled permanently in Newark, New Jersey and were part of an Italian American area located in the "Iron Bound" section of Newark. [The name "Iron Bound" derived from that part of Newark being "bound" by railroad tracks.] Their migration was an example of the genealogical concept of "cluster genealogy" which can include extended family, friends, and neighbors either from one region or town, or emigrating to one geographical area (one city or one part of one city). The concept of "cluster genealogy" is well known by genealogists and has been presented to our Society by

**Background:** About the year 1906, my grandfather was able to purchase a house. The house has been owned by a Miserendino for over 100 years now and is still in our family. The house ownership was transferred many times. Upon the death of my grandfather the house was owned by my grandmother, Frances. When I was young and visited, she and my unmarried uncle Vincent (Vincenzo) lived in the first floor which consisted of two bedrooms, one bathroom and a living room. The basement and upstairs floor which also contained a bathroom and a kitchen was rented to various tenants over the years. Upon the death of my grandmother in 1967, the ownership of the house passed to my uncle Vincent who lived there until his death in 1986. Upon the death of my uncle Vincent, the house passed to a cousin (son of my aunt Frances who had the same first name as my grandmother and by that time was also deceased), then to my aunt Josephine, and then to my father, Morris (Mario). When my father owned the house, he rented it to my oldest brother Paul who had been working in the northern New Jersey/New York area. A little later, my brother Paul bought the house from my father.

**Research:** Growing up I and other members of my immediate family thought my grandparents came from Palermo, Sicily. We were told no family story of the actual city. We assumed Palermo as it was (and remains) the biggest city in Sicily. When I started my genealogical research, I talked to relatives. My brother Paul mentioned there were a few papers in the house which listed names of relatives. He sent copies of the pages. One page in English showed my Aunt Frances and my grandmother taking a trip to Italy via ship with the final destination of a town I never heard of "Petralia Sottana." My father confirmed that was the original town of his parents.

Following other genealogical training presented by Trevia Wooster Beverley, I learned about ordering microfilmed civil registration records of foreign cities through the LDS Family History Centers. I ordered microfilm rolls of Italian birth records and used genealogy Italian aids to read the film contents.

I was able to confirm that my paternal ancestors came from Petralia Sottana and found the civil birth records for many other Italian ancestors who all were born in that small town.

While talking to my younger brother Marty about this discovery, he shared a rather surprising piece of news. Amazingly, he remembered that the name of the town matched a small booklet he received from our uncle Vincent when Marty visited in Newark, New Jersey about 20 years ago! My brother mailed me the booklet. I scanned it and then put it away for storage.

**Discovery:** For the 2014 BAGS Show & Tell, I brought that small booklet which is entitled "Statuto e regolamento della società operaia Petralia Sottana di mutuo soccorso." **(continued on page 5)**

My rough translation of the booklet title is: "Statutes and regulations of the Petralia Sottona workers' mutual aid association." I also found a list of members of that association in 1920. I have sometimes seen the members refer to themselves as "Petralisi" which I would think is a short way of saying "people from Petralia Sottana." That 1920 list contains the names and amounts of money contributed by members of that association to help the World War I wounded and orphans. There are more than 200 names on the list of contributors. Included in that list were the names and contributions of my grandfather and two of his brothers. I think the members of that association were all men. If you double the number of contributors to account those men's wives and possibly some children who were also born in Petralia Sottana (such as my first born aunt Frances), then over 400 people moved from a town (which now has a population of under

three thousand) to Newark, New Jersey by 1920. We all know that many parts of Europe were poorer than the United States and that there were more opportunities in the United States. However, I have discovered around 1906 the sulphur mines closed which may have been another reason for that group of southern Italians to emigrate. With the loss of a major employer in that region, there was a strong incentive to leave for America.

Can any of the readers imagine one hundred years from now, the *Yearbook* from the Bay Area Genealogical Society being in the hands of one member's descendant in another state who was also doing genealogical research? That is the equivalent of the booklet that I have from my ancestors.

The bus leaves for Clayton on Wednesday, November 5





Kotz's lecture argues that family histories are an essential element for people to understand and appreciate American History. Every genealogist has wondered about the importance and validity of a family story or lore that has been passed down for generations. His latest book, The Harness Maker's Dream: Nathan Kallison and the Rise of South *Texas* will be available for sale and signing at the end of the lecture. His book tells the epic story of how his Russian-Jewish grandfather, at age 17. escaped from the Czar's marauding Cossacks in 1890 to seek a better life in America. His journey took him from a Ukrainian shtetl to a Chicago ghetto, and then on to San Antonio in 1899 to open a one-room saddlery, which he grew into the largest farm and ranch supply business in the Southwest.

#### 3rd Annual Genealogy Symposium Featuring John Philip Colletta, Ph.D. Saturday, October 18, from 9:30am to 4:30pm

(Registration opens at 9:00am) in the Meeting Room at George Memorial Library located at 1001 Golfview in Richmond, TX.

Nationally known genealogist and lecturer John Philip Colletta, Ph.D., will share his knowledge, experience, and insight on a variety of topics designed to help family-history buffs explore different avenues of genealogical research.

The program is free and open to the public. Seating is limited, however, and reservations are required. To register online at the library's website (www.fortbend.lib.tx.us), click on "Calendar," select "George Memorial Library," and find the program. Participants may also register by calling the library's Local History and Genealogy Department at 281-341-2608.

The first lecture, "U.S. Passenger Arrival Records, 1820-1930s: Sources and Strategies for Challenging Cases," will begin at 9:30 am. Dr. Colletta will provide an overview of sources for finding arrival records of 19th- and 20th-century immigrants to America. He will also discuss a variety of alternative sources and methods for overcoming obstacles such as variant spellings of names, conflicting arrival dates, confusion of ship names, various ports of departure and arrival, and missing passenger manifests.

At 11:00 am, Dr. Colletta will present "U.S. Military Pension and Bounty Land Records, 1776-ca. 1916." Learn how military-pension and bounty-land files in the National Archives differ from military-service records. Dr. Colletta will discuss the basic information needed to start a search for an ancestor's file, and where to find that information. He will then outline a step-by-step procedure for locating, identifying, and retrieving a particular file, using resources such as websites, National Archives indexes, and other search tools.

The final lecture of the day, "Principles of Good Writing and Good Storytelling," will begin at 3:30 pm. This lecture will demonstrate how to take known information about an ancestor's life and combine it with details from the period to create an engaging true story that will hook a reader's interest. Specific examples will show how to incorporate archaic expressions and period quotations; utilize literary techniques to describe the setting, action, characters, and theme; and remain historically accurate by using qualifiers such as "probably," "perhaps," and "evidently."

Dr. Colletta has written a "murder-mystery-family-history" with details from his own family history -- Only a Few Bones: A True Account of the Rolling Fork Tragedy and Its Aftermath – which recounts the story of his great-great-grandfather, Joe Ring, who moved his family from Buffalo, NY, to Rolling Fork, MS, after the Civil War. When Ring's country store burned to the ground with five unfortunate victims sleeping upstairs, the incident was investigated as mass murder, robbery and arson.

The genealogy symposium is presented with the generous support of the Friends of George Memorial Library. Proceeds from the Friends of the Library book sales and annual membership dues help to underwrite the costs of special programming and various cultural and educational events at the library.
