Friday, January 30, 2015: Irene Walters presents "Crossing the wide blue seas : passenger lists of our ancestors"

Public Invited. Join us at 6:30pm for coffee and socializing.

We meet at the University Baptist Church in the Great Room on the 2nd floor. (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Clear Lake City - online map)

Since the discovery of the New World ships have been bringing passengers to our shores to start new lives. Some of these voyages were well documented and some not. In this program, Irene Walters will discuss how to find evidence of your ancestors on passenger lists.

Irene Walters is one of the "Yankee Librarians" at Houston's Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research. She is originally from New York State and has her Masters of Library Science degree from the State University of New York at Buffalo. Irene came to Clayton in September 1997 and over the years has been in charge of volunteers, periodicals, CD-ROMs, and computers. Currently, Irene is the liaison between Clayton

and the Houston Public Library cataloging department. She also coordinates Clayton's involvement in the digitization project with the LDS Library in Salt Lake City. Irene has given talks to many local groups on various aspects of genealogical research including, computers, the Internet, ancestors in the modern military,



using newspapers for your research, New York State, Irish and French research. Irene started her own genealogy research as a teenager and has taken her lines back into France and Ireland. Her German lines and those dropped off by passing alien ships are being more difficult.

Opportunities in Lineage Groups


Would you like to join a lineage group and honor your ancestors in another way? You meet with other women who are doing the same, share information and work finding more ancestors. Colonial Dames of the XVII Century and Daughters of American Colonists record our colonial ancestors in Jamestown, Plymouth, and the other early colonies on the Atlantic coastal area.

Colonial Dames of the XVII Century includes the immigrants up to 1700 while Daughters of the American Colonists goes up to 1775. The United States Daughters of 1812 honors our ancestors who fought in the War of 1812.

All of these groups meet in Dickinson. The United States Daughters of 1812 meets four times a year in February, May, August, and November. The Colonial Dames of the XVII Century meet five times a year in January, March, May, September, and November. The Daughters of American Colonists also meet five times a year in January, March, May, September, and November. They don't meet during the summer so mothers can be home with their children.

Shake the Trees @ FamilySearch.org

Family Trees within FamilySearch.org is a relatively new resource that helps you to discover, organize, and record your genealogy online. The goal is to create one large worldwide tree. However, you do not have to publish or post your family information to find this resource useful. There is a search feature that can help you find leads to family members and fellow researchers. There is no guarantee that the information in Family Tree is accurate. Data comes from many sources, and anyone can edit the information in Family Tree. A "Latest Changes" section is found on the detail page for each person. This section lists the information that was added/changed for that person and which researcher made the update. These entries provide you contact points to other living researchers interested in the same family lines. I found my grandfather had already been entered in the system. I followed his posted ancestors to see if there were any surprises and checked the "Latest Changes" section to determine who was doing the research. Now I have a new friend to meet!

Access Details: Go to the website www.FamilySearch.org Along the top of the webpage is the menu selections: Family Tree, Memories, Search, Indexing. Using your mouse, hover over "Family Tree" and a pull down menu will appear. Click on "Find" and sign in. You must create an account and sign in to search for people already added to the Family Trees. The account will allow you to search, view, update, and add people. If you index for FamilySearch, the same account will work. Once signed in, enter a surname and given name (or nickname) and follow the tree. Help and training is available online at https://familysearch.org/ask/#/tree/

PBS Announces Season 2 Schedule for Genealogy Roadshow



PBS announced their season 2 episode lineup which

premieres January 13th 7PM central time. Described as "part detective story and part emotional journey," Genealogy Roadshow showcases families, their histories and their connections to the larger history in and around St. Louis, New Orleans, and Philadelphia. Each individual's story links to a larger community (and in some cases, national) history, to become part of America's rich cultural tapestry. Below are descriptions for each of six episodes:

New Orleans – Cabildo, January 13, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

A team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family stories at the famous Cabildo, home of the Louisiana State Museum. A couple whose ancestors hail from the same small Italian town explore the chance they may be related; a woman is desperate to find out who committed a gruesome murder in her ancestor's past; a home held by one family for more than a century renders a fascinating story; and a woman discovers the difficult journey her ancestor took on the path to freedom from slavery.

St. Louis – Central Library, January 20, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

At Saint Louis' historic central library, a team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family stories from Missouri's famous gateway city. A mystery writer discovers her mother has hidden a life-changing secret; a woman finds out if she is descended from the infamous pirate Blackbeard; a mother and daughter seek connections to a famous author; and a young man seeks connection to the Mali tribe in Africa.

Philadelphia – Franklin Institute, January 27, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

At Philadelphia's Franklin Institute, a team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family histories. A man learns that the event that drove his family to the City of Brotherly Love changed the course of history; a man may be a Viking descendant; another's family could have part of one of history's biggest scams; a young man hopes to confirm his relation to a signer of the Declaration of Independence; and two sisters learn their ancestors were part of the great Irish migration.

New Orleans – Board of Trade, February 3, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

A team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family stories at the New Orleans Board of Trade. A local man seeks to recover essential history washed away in Hurricane Katrina; a woman discovers she has links to both sides of the Civil War; another unravels the mystery behind her grandfather's adoption; and one man explores a link to the famous New Orleans Voodoo Queen, Marie Laveau.

St. Louis – Union Station, February 10, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

At St. Louis' historic Union Station, a team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family stories from Missouri. A musician hopes to find connections to a famous St. Louis jazz composer; two sisters explore links to a survivor of the legendary Donner party; an Italian-American woman finds out if she is related to Italian royalty; and a schoolteacher who has all the answers for her students has very few about her own past.

Philadelphia – Historical Society of Pennsylvania, February 17, 2015 at 7:00pm (central)

A team of genealogists uncovers fascinating family histories at the Historical Society of Pennsylvania. One woman's ancestor may have sparked historic labor laws; a pastor may have an outlaw in her family tree; a woman learns about slave genealogy and, with the help of DNA testing, gets the answer she has waited for; and another woman learns her ancestor may have helped others escape the Holocaust.
