Have Irish Ancestors?

The British National Archives announced Ireland, Poverty Relief Loans 1821-1874 records have been digitized and are available through FindMvPast subscription site. However, you have free access to search and view records in *FindMyPast* while inside any LDS Family History Center. The centers are located in Alvin (2700 Lehi Lane), Friendswood (505 Deseret Drive), Galveston (3114 77th Street), League City (4655 South Shore Boulevard), and Pasadena (4202 Yellowstone). These records relate to the Irish Reproductive Loan Fund that was a privately funded micro credit scheme set up in 1824 to provide small loans to the 'industrious poor' - those most affected by poverty and famine. This collection of almost 700,000 records, which spans the period of the Irish Potato Famine, provides unique insight into the lives of those living in Ireland during the time. The majority of the records cover the years 1824 to 1846 across ten counties in Munster and Connacht. Many of the records are loan application forms, which include the name of the borrower and two names of guarantors, who were often close family members or neighbors. Other details recorded include occupation, notes of health, family circumstances and whether the borrower emigrated. The handwritten ledgers and account books reveal the changing fortunes of Irish ancestors and their subsequent movements in Ireland and across the world. Pre 1820 Immigration Research

To find passenger arrival records for immigrants arriving before 1820, you must rely on printed sources. These include published lists of immigrants' names taken from newspapers, naturalization oaths, indenture lists, headright grants, and other records. Use the *Passenger and Immigration Lists Index* a 15+ volume set compiled by P. William (Percy William) Filby to locate ancestors in these published sources. A new volume is published each year to provide coverage to old passenger and immigration records that were discovered or transcribed during that year. These volumes index over 4.5 million names found in more than 2,500 published sources. These are passengers that came to the New World between the sixteenth and early twentieth centuries. [From *FamilySearch.org* Research Wiki page "US Immigration Passenger Arrival Records"]

Clayton Library has the complete *Passenger and Immigration Lists Index* set (call # 325.1 P287 USA). To use this resource: 1) Look up the surnames in each cumulative index and every subsequent volume as there may be many persons with similar same data. Each entry will provide surname, given name, destination, year, with a source number and a page number. Record all of this data and the volume number. 2) Turn to the bibliography listing located in the front of this volume. Find your source number and record the source title information. 3) Ask Clayton Library if they carry the source title or where it could be located. 4) The source document will give your passenger or immigration information for your surname.

The index is also available online in *Ancestry.com* (only through a personal subscription not the library's edition). To find this index in *Ancestry.com*, click on **Search** and choose **Card Catalog** at the bottom of the **Search** menu. On the Card Catalog page, enter the word *passenger* for the **Title** and enter the word *filby* for the **Keyword(s)** and press the **Search button**. Click on the one result that is returned, *U.S. and Canada*, *Passenger and Immigration Lists Index*, *1500s-1900s*. Now on the next page, you will be searching for ancestor names only in that collection. The search results can provide the age of the person, arrival year, arrival place, and specific print source title and page number where the printed information can be found. Ask Clayton Library if they have the print source title. The information within that print source may lead you to the original record location. A search for Karrick surname returned men that arrived in Boston, Baltimore, Augusta Co. Virginia, and Philadelphia.

VA Markers

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs initially denied headstones for World War I US Army Privates Frank R. Ellis and Oscar Bernard Juenger because they currently have no next of kin. This did not deter a tenaciously dedicated local historian, genealogist, and member Deborah Gammon. For more than 3 years, she has been gathering data, doing genealogical research and reconstructing their service records in hopes of officially marking their graves.

In December 2014, Deborah happily reported success in securing headstones for Ellis and Juenger who are buried in the Fairview Cemetery. The VA marker has



finally been installed for Oscar Bernard Juenger, shown in the picture. Her Galveston County court order was not accepted by the Veterans Administration as part of the marker request (see related article in *BAGS Newsletter* May 2014 issue). However, Deborah found another way to secure distant family signatures. Here is her success story in Deborah's own words.

I went to a marker dedication in Washington Cemetery in Houston. I knew that Oscar had relatives there, his parents and two brothers. I was sitting at a table for the luncheon afterwards and a woman, Cathy Fitch, came over and asked to join our table. She asked me what I did after I told her who I was. And I told her about my VA marker problem and mentioned to her that Oscar had family in her cemetery. She works for Washington Cemetery. I then asked if by any chance would she happen to have a contact for the Juenger family. One week later, I received an email with a grandniece's address in Massachusetts. Wrote a letter. She telephoned me and signed the papers. Oscar got a stone.

Frank's VA marker should arrive by end of January [2015]. I wrote 3 letters to 1/2 great grandnieces and nephews. Letter #3 got a response, Glen T. Norvel signed the paper work and Frank Ellis will get his stone.

The historic Fairview Cemetery is located at the end of Kansas Street in League City, TX. Established in 1900, the 114- year old cemetery holds approximately 1200 residents of League City and several surrounding communities and holds a Texas Historic Cemetery designation.

The punch was so refreshing! Here are the recipes:

SO SIMPLE PUNCH

2 Kool-Aid unsweetened strawberry drink 46oz pineapple juice

1 and 1/2 cups sugar

2 quarts water

1 liter ginger ale

Combine Kool-Aid, pineapple juice, sugar and water. Stir until dissolved. Just before serving, stir in ginger ale. Add sliced sweetened strawberries if you like.

Makes about 30 servings of 4 oz. cups.

GOLDEN GLOW PUNCH

3 oz. package orange flavored gelatin 6 oz. can frozen pineapple-orange juice concentrate

4 cups apple juice

12oz bottle or 3 1/2 cups ginger ale, chilled

Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup boiling water. Stir in pineapple-orange concentrate. Add apple juice and 3 cups cold water. Carefully pour in chilled ginger ale. Be sure to make an ice ring or ice cubes out of each punch.

Makes about 25 four ounce servings.
