Daniel Sample is the manager of the Genealogy and Local History Department in the George Memorial Library located at 1001 Golfview Drive, Richmond, TX 77469 (www.fortbend.lib.tx.us/branches/gm.html)

This program includes how to trace family history using World War I military records such as draft-registration cards, service records, and pension-application files. Find out how and where to obtain copies of compiled service records and pensions for U.S. soldiers. Learn about the George Memorial Library's World War I and other holdings and online resources such as *Ancestry.com*, *Family Search*, and *Fold3* for WWI information.

Daniel Sample grew up in Fort Worth, Texas. In 1996, he earned his Masters of Library and Information Science from the University of North Texas in Denton. He worked for the Houston Public Library system beginning in 1997. In 2005, he joined the Fort Bend County Libraries and worked for George Memorial and some of the branches before becoming head of the Genealogy & Local History Department in 2010.

## **Beginning Genealogy Research SIG**



# Galveston Immigration and Naturalization Records - Free online

Immigration and naturalization records are now maintained by the Federal Government. However, from the late 1860's until the 1950's, immigration issues were handled by the State District Courts. The Galveston County District Clerk's Office has digitized and published online the Galveston Declarations of Intention, Petitions for Citizenship, Petitions for Naturalization, and Certificates of Arrival. These records contain over 500,000 informational references for immigrants from 61 countries. There is no charge to access these records but you do need to create an account to view them. The preview images include a "Galveston Preview" watermark across the page. There is a nominal charge to print the documents. # Resources to Help You Dig Deeper?

ArchiveGrid (<a href="http://archivegrid.org">http://archivegrid.org</a>) helps researchers looking for primary source materials held in archives, libraries, museums and historical societies. This resource includes over four million records describing historical documents, personal papers, family histories, and more held by over 1,000 different archival institutions. In search box located in the upper right corner, enter a surname or a full name in quotes. Use AND, OR, NOT, and parentheses to include additional search terms that may include a U.S. State. Switch to the summary tab to select options that will filter the search results. Also on the main page, search by state or zip code to discover participating archival institutions in the area of your research interest.

Internet Genealogy, issue February 2015, pages 20-24 is an interesting article "Yesterday's Weather for Today's Genealogist" explains how to access past weather record information to supplement your family history. Researching weather conditions could help explain prevailing family diseases or deaths.

If you do not find a local library or historical society through these websites, try doing a Google search for your town or county and the words "public library" or "historical society."

# Free Language Learning Courses

Mango is a free online language learning tool that offers many courses that includes European and Asian languages. Now Mango offers a Cherokee language course in partnership with the Cherokee Nation and the Tulsa City-



County Library. The course consists of 10 lessons that introduce the basics of greetings, gratitude, goodbyes, and getting to know someone. Cherokee is distinct in that it's a polysynthetic language, which means that Cherokee words are made up of smaller parts that have their own meaning. Moreover, as these parts join, their pronunciation changes and makes them less easily discerned, adding to the magic of the language.
