Genetic genealogy has come a long way. In this relatively new field, Family Tree DNA has pioneered the idea of applying genetics to the traditional practice of genealogy. People no longer have to rely solely on historical documents and family lore to trace their heritages and fill in gaps in their lineages. DNA testing for the purposes of genealogy has allowed for people to understand more clearly where they came from, who they are related to, and what their overall ethnic makeup is. It has connected the entire world as one large genealogical community. Jeremy will explain, in layman's terms, what getting tested involves, how the science behind the testing works, and how you can discover your ancestry more clearly through a simple cheek swab. Test kits will be available for purchase and swab on site for people interested in testing.

Jeremy Balkin is an Information Specialist and mans his place in the pantheon of Family Tree DNA's Help Desk. He interprets genetic ancestral results for the expanding customer base, and is one of the voices that you hear when you call FTDNA. He graduated from the University of Houston with a B.A. in History and a minor in Communication. Having worked in the field for almost three years, he has been able to fuse his communication studies with his knowledge of history to provide ancestral analysis that anybody can understand. His Family Tree DNA test results are heavily laden with Ashkenazi Jewish ancestry. Aside from Family Tree DNA, Jeremy is a professional photographer and professional writer. He has shot for several publications, and still photographs weddings and special events.

At the July meeting, BAGS member Michael McCown will demonstrate how to use DNA results with other genealogical resources such as *Ancestry.com* to locate family members.

Meet Mr. Draper and the Reverend Shane and Travel the Natchez Trace Trevia Wooster Beverly Seminar Saturday, July 11, 2015

The Draper Manuscripts: Lyman Copeland Draper (1815-1891) grew up listening to the Revolutionary War stories told by his grandfather and the War of 1812 tales of his father. He became fascinated with American history, particularly the history of the west. The primary geographic concentration is on what Draper and his contemporaries called the "Trans-Allegheny West," which included the western Carolinas and Virginia, some portions of Georgia and Alabama, the entire Ohio River valley, and parts of the Mississippi River valley. Draper's intention was to use his manuscripts to write a book on western history and biography tentatively titled "Sketches of the Lives of the Pioneers." He died before his efforts came to fruition. Upon his death, Draper willed his collection of manuscripts to the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Although the Draper Manuscripts are rich in information, they are not the easiest resource to use but there are a number of indexes and finding aids that will help a researcher use the collection.

The Shane Manuscripts: Rev. John Dabney Shane (1812-1864), born in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1812 to Henry and Nancy (Williams) Shane, was educated at college and seminary in Virginia and returned to Ohio and Kentucky as a Presbyterian minister. From his earliest years, he had a passion for collecting and hoarding everything that had any bearing upon the history of the Presbyterian Church in the Ohio River Valley. Possessing a remarkable zeal for his project, Rev. Shane declined pastoral office and set aside any intentions he may have had concerning the establishment of a family so that he could roam the land in his quest. He dedicated more than twenty years to historical research, using the oral history technique similar to his contemporary, Lyman Copeland Draper. Shane purposefully sought out those of age and experience to interview, writing down their reminiscences. He copied from family, church, and government records and clipped from newspapers and magazines. While Draper had a deep interest in the military (personal papers in his original collection are rare), Shane was just as interested in the domestic, business, educational, religious, and literary aspects of the time. His inquiries concerning old barrels, trunks, and chests—which he carefully searched—brought him many family letters, records, and other items.

The Natchez Trace Collection is actually a series of collections documenting the history from Nashville, Tennessee to Natchez, Mississippi and includes a portion of Mobile, Alabama. Records included relate to the functioning of the territories under French and then Spanish rule. Civil records including lawsuits, wills, estate inventories, notarized bills, IOU's, accounts, contracts, slave sales and manumissions, and others. Records are in French, Spanish or English.

Trevia Wooster Beverly is a native Texan born and reared in Wooster, a community (now a part of Baytown) founded by her great-grandfather in 1892. Her interest in genealogy began with a ninth grade English project, and since that time her research on both her own and her husband's family has taken her back to New England and Virginia in the 1600's, and across 'the pond.' These lines include a Magna Carta Baron, a Mayflower passenger, and both French Acadian and Huguenot lines. A member of the Association of Professional Genealogists, she maintains active membership in numerous archival, cemetery, historical, genealogical, and library organizations. Mrs. Beverly has conducted seminars and workshops throughout Texas, and teaches genealogy classes in Houston. She is listed in several biographical publications, including Who's Who In Genealogy & Heraldry. Mrs. Beverly is a past president of the Texas State Genealogical Society (1984-1987), and served a total of 12 years on the TSGS Board of Directors and a member of the Stripes staff. In 1994 she was the host chairman for Clayton Library Friends for the National Genealogical Society Conference in Houston. A charter member of the Clayton Library Friends, she has been published in the CLF Newsletter and other periodicals. Mrs. Beverly has published several books including a compilation of Texas cemetery directories, indexes to marriage and naturalization records for a number of Texas and Alabama counties, and Suffer the Children: A History of the Confederate Orphanage at Baylands, Texas (2004). She became a member of the Angelina College genealogy faculty in 1998.

Sanborn Fire Insurance Map Collection

This Library of Congress collection offers free online a searchable database of the fire insurance maps published by the Sanborn Map Company for some cities in the U.S. states: AK, AL, AZ, CA, CT, DC, GA, IL, IN, KY, LA, MA, MD, ME, MI, MO, MS, NC, NE, NH, NJ, NV, OH, PA, TX, VA, VT, WY and Canada, Mexico, Cuba sugar warehouses, and U.S. whiskey warehouses. Not all the entries are linked to a digitized image of the map. Currently there are over 6000 sheets digitized and they are adding more. Choose one of the states listed on the left side under "Location" to discover what has been digitized. Once the images for that state are shown, you can then select a specific county under the "Location" section. Click on a specific map and zoom in to look at the detail.

The "About this Collection" page explains the keys and colors used on the maps. You will find street and building layout, exterior and interior structural details, and family names If there is a map for your area of interest in your ancestor's time period, then you can discover their living conditions and infer social and economic status.

Prepare Genealogy Records:

- Backup your data. Don't just save a GEDCOM file. The GEDCOM backup only contains basic data about a person. It will not include all your notes, photos, and citations.
- Keep those backups on small removable media (e.g. compact discs or USB/flash drives) or store on the Internet "cloud" (e.g. send yourself an email with the backup file attached, store on Google Drive, Dropbox)
- Start scanning original documents (e.g. old letters, photographs) that cannot be replaced then backup and share these digitized images. Most local libraries offer a public scanner where the digitized files can be saved to a USB/Flash drive

Know anyone that would need help evacuating in the event of a hurricane?

Register them in advance for a ride by dialing 2-1-1. This includes people that:

- Have a disability or special health care need and require assistance to get out.
- Cannot drive and cannot arrange transportation.
- Do not have a vehicle and you have no one else to help you evacuate.

Registration is required each year. The list of people is not carried over from one year to the next.
