Looking for more details on the lives of your ancestors living between 1836 and 1922 in America? The Library of Congress *Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers* provides free online key word access to historic newspapers during this time frame for 40 states, territories, and the District of Columbia. The goal is to include historic newspaper content for all U.S. states and territories. Come learn how to use this resource to locate family information. 

Finding female ancestors is a hunt for untold stories, filling in gaps

Judy G. Russell presented the program *Mothers, Daughters, Wives: Tracing Female Lines* at the RootsTech 2016 conference. Russell's handout lists record types to use and suggested books and online resources for further research. The resources include an online article "Invisible Women Ancestors: How to Research the Women in Your Family Tree" by Kimberly Powell

(http://genealogy.about.com/od/women/a/female_ancestor.htm) and *Cyndi's List* "Female Ancestors" directory listing of online resources (www.cyndislist.com/female). Russell's handout is available on The RootTech 2016 Class Syllabus page (www.rootstech.org/about/syllabus?lang=eng), click on the category "RootsTech (2901 and above)" to expand, then locate and click on RT9310 to open the handout.

What is Bounty Land?

The article "What is Bounty Land?" published October 22, 2015 on Fold3 HQ blog

(https://blog.fold3.com) explains how these lands were acquired. The War of 1812 Pension Files digitized images can be searched and viewed for free on *Fold3.com* (without login or subscription), go to www.fold3.com/title_761/war_of_1812_pension_files to search by surname. The Revolutionary War Pensions, and Bounty Land Warrant Applications record group is available through *FamilySearch.org* for free. To access the search screen, go to www.familysearch.org, click on Search and on the next page scroll down to "Find a collection." Enter the word bounty and click on "The Revolutionary War Pensions, and Bounty Land Warrant Applications 1800-1900." Start over at "Find a collection" and enter the word pension to see the other state and federal bounty land record groups that are available to research.

Recap February Program – Adoption: Searching for Clues!

Thank you Melissa Hayes for addressing this topic, focusing on what clues and records we might find in the cases of indentures, guardianship, adoption, and apprenticeships. In the time period of interest, use a city directory to identify what unwed mother homes, schools, orphanages, group homes, charity agencies, asylums, lawyers, hospitals, churches, and city/county services. Seek out record locations for one or more of those resources. Melissa's handouts included program slides and a bibliography of recommended books, online articles, databases, and web resources. Access her handouts on the BAGS website, click on **Members Page**, enter password, and click on **Archived Meeting Handouts**.

Software MacKiev has been the developer of Family Tree Maker for Mac for more than six years. You will have continued access to Ancestry Hints, Ancestry searches, and be able to save your tree on *Ancestry.com* with Family Tree Maker beyond 2016.

Ancestry.com has also made an agreement with RootsMagic (**www.rootsmagic.com**), a leading genealogy desktop software program publisher, to connect Ancestry with the RootsMagic software by the end of 2016. With this new relationship, RootsMagic can serve as your desktop family tree software, while having access to Ancestry hints, Ancestry searches, and the ability to save your tree on Ancestry

Resource Recommendations from Clayton Library

Going West? A list of resources you should consider using when researching family involved in the country's western expansion are listed and discussed by the Clayton Library staff in their online newsletter *Clayton Town Crier,* January 2016 edition, accessible online at

The titles include atlases for migration routes, wagon trails, county histories along the National Road (aka Cumberland Road), frontier life, railway passenger lists, ship passenger lists, and Forty-Niners.

Tracing family medical history? The *Clayton Town Crier* issue also included a selection of recommending resources for tracing family medical history. Several online resources are related to German, Canadian, and Scottish research.

German: German-English illness translations **www.odessa3.org/collections/articles/link/illness** provided by Odessa which is a digital library dedicated to cultural and family history of the millions of Germans who emigrated to Russia in the 1800s and their descendants. The Odessa document collection consists primarily of digitized books and records plus indexes of microfilms and research aids that enable users to trace individual and family migrations since the early 1800s. Access the website's search interface at **www.odessa3.org/search.html** Try using the Lexicon search and enter just the first 4 letters of the surname.
