Friday, April 29, 2016: Texas Archives Depository Resources

Public Invited. Join us at 6:30pm for socializing. Meeting begins at 7pm

We meet at the University Baptist Church (UBC) in the Chapel, 1st floor. (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Houston, TX 77059 - online map).

The Texas State Library Archives Commission (TSLAC) maintains a Regional Historical Resource Directory System made up of 23 libraries within the state that collects, preserves, and makes available for public use historical records of the local governments of Texas. Come discover where these depositories are located, their diverse record collection, and the procedures for public access.

Alana Inman, manager of the Sam Houston Regional Library and Research Center in Liberty, TX will present this program. The Center (www.tsl.texas.gov/shc) is one of the TSLAC depositories serving as the official regional historical resource depository for ten southeast Texas counties (Chambers, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Newton, Orange, Polk, San Jacinto, Tyler). Ms. Inman will explain the regional historical

resource depository system and how it can provide access to county government records throughout the state. She will also identify other resources available at the Center that are useful for family historians.

Ms. Inman is currently managing a variety of projects, including a two million dollar renovation of the buildings and grounds that will include a new exhibit on southeast Texas history in an updated museum space; the online cataloging of the Center's books and periodicals; the creation of online databases for map and judicial records collections; and the posting of archival finding aids online. Prior to joining the Sam Houston Center in 2012, Alana worked at the Missouri State Archives for more than eight years. She is a member of the Liberty Rotary Club, Daughters of the American Revolution, Colonial Dames, Order of the Eastern Star, and several other organizations.

Mount Hebron Cemetery App by Lisa Smith

[editor note: BAGS member Lisa Smith recently moved to Virginia and began attending Shenandoah Valley Genealogical Society where she discovered cemeteries creating mobile apps to make their records more accessible.]



Mount Hebron (**www.mthebroncemetery.org**) is one of Shenandoah Valley's most beautiful and historic cemeteries, located in downtown Winchester, Virginia. It is the resting place of both the ordinary and the famous. Many Civil and Revolutionary War veterans are buried here.

The cemetery, in conjunction with **www.webcemeteries.com**, has created a free mobile app that integrates burial records with photos, maps, and videos. Search the records of those interred or entombed, virtually tour the cemetery with videos and photos of notable people, landmarks, and burial sites. View living memorials, photos, videos, and condolences shared by family and friends.

Use this mobile app at home and in the cemetery. The Mount Hebron app can be downloaded to any Android or iOS mobile device.

At home, open the app, choose search,

and enter a person's name. All graves sharing that name will be listed. Choose an entry to view the person's information sheet, then tap the Map icon to view the grave location. Tap the Video icon to see the narrated YouTube video.



Many narrations are also transcribed below the icons. For example, enter the surname Kurtz. Both Adam and Lucy Fitzhugh Kurtz are listed. Tap on Lucy's name and view her headstone, tap the Video icon to listen to a short biography documenting her achievements in the Daughters of the American Revolution.



If you are actually in the cemetery, open the mobile app and touch "Nearby" to view grave sites within 200 feet of your GPS location (you must have GPS enabled on your mobile phone). Tap a blue 'pin' to view information about that grave marker including the person's name, birth and death dates, and grave's section and space location.

At home or in the cemetery, you can select various 'tours' to find interesting people interred in the cemetery. Mount Hebron currently has four tours available: Civil War (Confederate Stonewall Cemetery section), Places of Interest, Revolutionary War (Lutheran and Reformed Cemetery section), and Winchester Notables (18th - 21st century). When you select a tour, you will see a map and a list of people that are featured in that tour. Lucy Kurtz, noted above, is found in the Winchester Notables Tour.

WebCemeteries has created searchable websites and mobile apps for cemeteries in over 20 states. Some of the cemeteries that offer the mobile app include *Historic Oakwood Cemetery* in Raleigh, N.C., *West Laurel Hill* and *Laurel Hill Cemeteries* Philadelphia, PA, *Beth El Synagogue*, Omaha, NE, *Santa Rosa Catholic Cemeteries*, CA. In your mobile device app store, search "WebCemeteries" to get a more complete list of available cemetery apps. Also view the list on a computer by clicking on this link https://play.google.com/store/apps/developer?id=webCemeteries&hl=en Some of the cemeteries that include a burial records search interface by WebCemeteries include *Cave Hill Cemetery* in Louisville, KY (www.cavehillcemetery.com), *Arlington Cemetery* in Drexel, PA (www.arlingtoncemetery.us), *Hollywood Cemetery* in Richmond, VA (www.hollywoodcemetery.org), and *Hope Cemetery* in Kutztown, PA (www.hopecemetery.com).

Have fun searching for your relative and learning about the history of Shenandoah Valley!

Recap March Program – Chronicling America

At the March meeting, Kim Zrubek reviewed the free digitized newspaper resource *Chronicling America* (http://chroniclingamerica.loc.gov) supported by the Library of Congress and the National Endowment for the Humanities. The program handout is available on the BAGS website's Members page. *Chronicling America* is only one of many free online sources for digitized newspapers that you can research from home. Many are accessible through public and university libraries, historical societies, and state archives. Use the Google search engine to locate sources by entering terms that include the town, the state, and "digitized newspapers."

Interested in searching the *19th Century U. S. Newspapers Digital Archive* (1847-1897 which includes *Galveston Daily News*, 1874-1897) or the *Dallas Morning News Historical Archive* (1885-1897) from home? You need a Houston Public Library card. From home, access the Houston Public Library website (http://houstonlibrary.org), click on Research and then click on Newspapers (under Popular Research Resources). Click on the Newspaper of interest and enter your library card number.


Do you have a Rosenberg Library card? You can access the **United States NewspaperArchives (1753-2016)** which include historic Galveston newspapers published from 1838 to 2015 from home. First, go to the Rosenberg Library website's online databases page: **www.rosenberg-library.org/elibrary/topical.html** and scroll down to click on "Galveston County Daily News – Historical" and enter your library card number. This brings you into *United States NewspaperArchives* where you can search across the US, or pick a state and/or city to narrow your search. For access to the Galveston newspapers, scroll down to click on Texas and then click on Galveston. Enter a person's name or other keywords for a place or event.

Surprises in Newspapers by Annette Bowen


Since I didn't get interested in family history until most of my older relatives had died, I had nobody to tell me stories of my ancestor's lives. I discovered that newspaper articles could fill in details that are available nowhere else, especially for those who lived in small towns. The major problem with using newspapers has been that they don't have indexes. I have spent hours going through newspapers on microfilm, but unless I have a good idea of the date of an event, such as a marriage or a death, it takes more time than I usually have to spend in archives or libraries.

Now we are fortunate to have many old newspapers online. After Kim's program at March BAGS meeting on the *Chronicling America Historic American Newspapers* site, I revisited it to see what I could find. Much to my delight, I found that it now includes the Southern Telegraph from the now "ghost town" of Rodney, Mississippi, where my ancestors lived in the 19th and early 20th centuries. Using the Advanced Search and the box "with the phrase" I plugged in various names and name variations (first & last names, middle & last names, initials & surname, etc.) In the March 18, 1836 newspaper, I found the marriage announcement for my great-great-grandparents.

I had already found this on microfilm, but then came the surprise. All I knew about V. M. Stuart were his birth, marriage and death dates from my greatgrandmother's Bible, and that he was named in the wills of both of his parents. He died in 1849 when my



great-grandmother was only 7 years old. My search brought up several ads showing that he had been a merchant in Rodney. On February 26, 1836 was the following ad, informing the public that he and S. A. Cochran intended to operate a mercantile business in Rodney. The August 2, 1836 newspaper announced the dissolution of the partnership between V. M. Stuart and S. A. Cochran and the formation of a new firm, Stuart and Smith, owned by V. M. Stuart and V. B. Smith. It isn't much, but it added one more piece to the puzzle.



Newspapers are continually being added to this site. If you don't find your ancestors now, try again in a few weeks or months.

Spend some quality time researching with friends, in groups or one-on-one. Ask questions and share ideas. Bring your laptop or mobile device. Free WiFi connection is available inside the library.

On Sunday, April 10 a group met at Helen Hall and exchanged research ideas, resources, and goals. Topics discussed ranged from newspaper resources for Wisconsin and Louisiana, finding divorce information in the newspaper and courthouse, colonial marriage and divorce, and record sources for Norway, Sweden and Wisconsin. A couple of specific tips shared:

- Amanda Pearson recommends *Genealogy Bank* for New Orleans newspapers and the local LDS Family History Center for *Newspapers.com* access (also available in any Houston Public Library branch and remotely through Rosenberg Library in Galveston).
- Electronic copies of Florida death certificates can be ordered online for \$5. The FamilySearch Research Wiki article "How to Find Florida Death Records" explains what information is available from 1877 to present (https://familysearch.org/wiki/en/How_to_Find_Florida_Death_Records).
- Louisiana marriage and death records older than 50 years and birth records older than 100 years can be ordered online for \$5, online index search is available at www.sos.la.gov/HistoricalResources/ResearchHistoricalRecords/Pages/OnlinePublicVitalRecor dsIndex.aspx.
- Annette Bowen found some useful information at the Norwegian American Genealogical Center and Naeseth Library in Madison, WI. Their website **www.nagcnl.org** contains good information that anybody can use. The website for the Digital Archives of Norway is http://arkivverket.no/Digitalarkivet It includes transcribed databases and census records as well

as the scanned original church records, written in Norwegian using Gothic script. Install and use the Google Crome web browser to view the web pages in English.
