Last Month's Program – Kathleen Maca presented *Digging Up Clues In The Cemetery*


Thank you Kathleen for sharing tips and tricks for researching and visiting cemeteries! She discussed a number of surprising sources for research information. To help interpret the carved images you may find in the cemetery, Kathleen recommended the book *Stories in stone : a field guide to cemetery symbolism and iconography* by Douglas Keister, an illustrated 288 page book covering meanings of images found on grave stones, mausoleums, tombs, sarcophaguses, and stone sentinels.

Kathleen Maca invited everyone to participate in the **Galveston Broadway Cemetery Cleanup Project on Saturday, November 12 from 8am to noon.** There are plenty of jobs available for volunteers of all ages such as picking up trash, sweeping, cleaning headstones, and making repairs. A mapping project will allow volunteers to help us gather the names and dates of the headstones in the Evergreen Cemetery. Start at the sign-in table located at the 43rd Street entrance of the cemetery. There is no need to sign up in advance. All ages are welcome. Children under 12 should have adult supervision. If you would like to clean headstones, training will be provided mid-morning.

In the recap session held Saturday, October 15, Bob Wegner shared with members some of the information Kathleen presented. Bob also prepared a list of cemetery related articles that were published in past *BAGS Quarterlies* and *Journals*. These include "Historic Texas Cemetery Designation" by Bill Mayo, "Genealogy In A Cemetery" by Deborah C. Gammon, and transcriptions from Mount Olivet, Crowder, Arcadia Evergreen, Texas City Memorial, Beguin-Opitz, and Serbian Orthodox cemeteries. Kathleen's program handout and Bob's article list are available on the BAGS website, click on "Members Page" and then click on "Archived Meeting Handouts."

Sanborn Fire Insurance Map Collection

During last month's program, Kathleen mentioned using the Sanborn maps to determine the existence, location, and names of old cemeteries, graveyards, churches. The Sanborn Fire Insurance Map collection consists of a uniform series of large-scale maps, dating from 1867 to the present and



Portion of "downtown" Salt Lick, Bath Co, Kentucky, 1908


depicting the commercial, industrial, and residential sections of some twelve thousand cities and towns in the United States, Canada, and Mexico. These maps document the street names and addresses, property boundaries, building/land use and may provide a glimpse into the environment in which your ancestor lived. Found your ancestor in a city directory? See if you can locate the address on one of these maps. Know the *city/town your ancestor lived in?* These maps can help you identify what churches, societies, and cemeteries existed at that time in that location. Access to digitized images of the Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps requires a subscription. Generally, a state library or archive will purchase a license to offer access to Sanborn maps for their specific state. First, go to Library of Congress www.loc.gov/collections/sanbornmaps and drill down by location on the left (state, county, and city) to determine if maps exist for the place and time period you are researching. These entries do not provide the digital map images. Second, use Google to locate digital map images. For example, from the Library of Congress I found several maps were created for Salt Lick, Bath County, Kentucky in 1908, 1914, 1920, and 1927. Using Google, I entered the search terms: Kentucky digital sanborn. The third search result listed "Kentuckiana Digital Library Home" (http://Athena.uky.edu) showed Sanborn Maps in the summary - pay dirt! Clicking on the link, I was pleased to find free access from home to the Kentucky Sanborn maps as well as books, journals, manuscripts, newspapers, and oral histories. Note: a message on the page stated all content had been moved to Kentucky Digital Library (http://kdl.kyvl.org). However, for now the collections are in both places. From home you can access the Texas Sanborn maps at www.lib.utexas.edu/maps/sanborn/texas.html

The Spyglass File – A Book Review by Annette Bowen

The Spyglass File is Nathan Dylan Goodwin's fourth book in the Morton Farrier, Forensic Genealogist, series of Genealogical Crime Mysteries. Mr. Goodwin's books combine genealogy, history and mystery.

The Spyglass File tells the story of Elsie Finch, who married a young soldier two weeks before Great Britain declared war on Germany in what we now call World War II. Within weeks of their marriage Elsie's husband left for France, and she soon got a telegram telling her that he was missing and presumed dead. Elsie, to escape the loneliness and boredom at home, decided to enlist in the Women's Auxiliary Air Force (WAAF). When her interviewers discovered that Elsie was fluent in German, she was assigned to a group that monitored transmissions of German pilots to determine where they were heading during bombing raids over Britain.

Jump to the present. A lady named Barbara, while working on her family genealogy, could find no record of her own birth in the registers. Someone suggested she should check the adoption registers. She was shocked to discover that she had been adopted. Her mother was Elsie Finch, a married lady, but her father was not Elsie's husband. Her father was a deceased pilot named William



Smith. After Barbara had come to a brick wall in her own research, she turned to Morton Farrier, forensic genealogist, to see what he could discover about Elsie's role during the war and anything about William Smith, an extremely common name.

Because Morton, too, had discovered as an adult that he was adopted, he agreed to help Barbara. As usual Morton's investigation disturbed people who feared that he would discover their past crimes. In an exchange with his police officer fiancé he asked, "Would you believe me if I said I'd been threatened *again*?" She answered, "Your job's more dangerous than mine! Is this *normal* in genealogy?"

According to Dick Eastman's blog, Forensic Genealogy "usually means to research ancestry by means of standard records AND MORE." Forensic genealogists think differently, looking for clues in non-standard records to add to family history. (https://blog.eogn.com/2014/06/15/forensic-genealogy-explained) Mr. Goodwin lets us follow Morton as he searches for information, plugging the fictional characters into actual records. Perhaps he will inspire you to look at different kinds of resources to fill out your own family history.
