Conducting genealogical research of federal records at the National Archives (www.archives.gov) is both rewarding and frustrating. A network of nationwide federal record centers are open to the public. They are located in Fort Worth, Atlanta, Kansas Citv. St. Louis, Denver, San Francisco, Seattle, Dayton, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, New York City, and Washington D.C. You can find family history in federal records covering military service, immigration, naturalization, passports, censuses, land grants, Native American rolls, African-American post-Civil War support, petitions, pensions, post office service, maritime, trade, tax, etc. Based on personal experience, Andrew "Andy" Shaner will share some tips for a successful visit and encourage you to make the trip to one of these centers.

As part of the Education and Public Engagement arm of the Lunar Planetary Institute, Mr. Shaner develops and hosts public outreach programs that engage families, educators and students in space science and enhance the public appreciation of lunar and planetary science. Checkout his Cosmic Exploration Speaker Series, Sky Fest programs, and ExMASS an authentic lunar/asteroid research program for high school students. Learn more about the current LPI education programming online at www.lpi.usra.edu/education. In his spare time, Mr. Shaner looks for his family history in early records in Pennsylvania and Germany. He earned a B.A. in Secondary Education from Wichita State University and a M.A. in Teaching and Teacher Education with a minor in planetary science from The University of Arizona.







Living Family Research

Genealogy starts with capturing the family details from living relatives. This Thanksgiving and Christmas, do a little family research at the dinner table with your living relatives. Don't play 20 questions. Just pick a few questions and don't forget to ask "why?" to get the details behind the answer. That is where the interesting stories come from. There are a number of online sites that provide lists of family history questions, to get your creative juices flowing. Alternatively, before dinner or after dessert, break out old photos to start a discussion of family

memories. 


Red Book: American State, County, and Town Sources

When researching records on a specific US geographical location, use the *Red Book* to discover the history of land settlement and formation of state and counties. This information is helpful in identifying where and when records were originally created to trace family history. The book dedicates a chapter to each U.S. State and the District of Columbia. Within the chapters, each major genealogical record group (i.e. vital, census, county, land, probate, court, tax, cemetery, church, military, periodicals, newspapers, and manuscript collections, archives, libraries, and societies) is discussed, explaining what records are available, missing, and suggested finding aids

specific to that U.S. location. A table is included listing the state's counties, their formation date, parent county, and dates for when each county began recording birth, marriage, death records, land, probate and court records. Each state also has a county, town, or parish map. Within the book's introduction are articles summarizing early settlement history of the major U.S. geographical areas: New England, Mid-Atlantic, Old South, Gulf States, Frontier South, Midwest, Frontier West, West, and Northwest.

The Source: A Guidebook To American Genealogy

Not sure what information a particular type of record is supposed to provide? Refer to *The Source*. Each chapter addresses a specific genealogical record type explaining how the information was collected over time, the possible content, strengths, limitations, access locations, and substitutes that can be used when the records are not available.
