Distinguishing People With The Same Name

Rebecca Whitman Koford, CGSM presented the free Legacy Family Tree webinar *Are you My Grandpa? Men of the Same Name* on March 21, 2017. In this program, Rebecca demonstrated methods we can use to analyze evidence and resolve conflicts in that evidence. Analysis and conflict resolution are steps 3 and 4 of the Genealogical Proof Standard. She explained that in order to distinguish between two or more people with the same name, you have to learn as much as you can about each person. Identify places or residence, occupation, social status, financial standing, relatives including in-laws, friends, associates, neighbors, document witnesses, maps, deeds, censuses, tax records, court records, city directories, and signatures on document. Use the resource checklist for inspiration on what records to search. *FamilySearch Wiki* provides a detailed resource checklist online at https://familysearch.org/wiki/en/Resource_Checklist. Create a table to visually compare and contrast your evidence for each person. Also create a timeline outlining the dates and locations for these people. By putting each person in context with this exhaustive research, these tables should show that one person is more likely to be your ancestor.


DNA: Adopted

Adoption DNA Specialist website offers two tutorials for adoptees and others of unknown parentage using genetic genealogy in their search. "Getting Started with your DNA Search" tutorial offers 10 steps/tips for triangulating your DNA information beginning with getting your autosomal test done through Ancestry.com (www.adoptiondnaspecialist.com/start-your-dna-search-today). The second tutorial "Tricks of the Trade" continues the research process with triangulating DNA with trees and paper records.

DNA: The CentiMorgan

CentiMorgan (cM) is a unit of measure in DNA genetic testing. If you have participated in DNA testing, you see matches to other people participating in the same DNA test expressed in centiMorgans. Blaine Bettinger author of www.TheGeneticGenealogist.com developed tables to predict your family relationship based on a centiMorgan value.

To help you visualize how many centiMorgans must be shared to establish a relationship as a grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins, take a look at the chart to the right. This chart can be viewed online under the section "Distribution of

genealogical relationships for given amounts of shared DNA" on the "Autosomal DNA Statistics" page published by *International Society of Genetic Genealogy Wiki*

For example, the chart shows an aunt or uncle would share between 1301 and 2193 cM and a first cousin would share between 533 and 1379 cM. A second cousin would share between 43 and 504 cM. A third cousin would share 0 to 198 cM. A fourth cousin would share 0 to 90 cM. So, it is possible that through traditional record research you can prove relationship to a 4th, 5th, or 6th cousin and not share any DNA because the more distant the cousin is from you (greater than 3rd cousin), the less likely there will be any shared DNA.

February Program Recap

Thank you to Jerry Ross for discussing his book *The Diaries of Harriet "Hattie" Dillabaugh* and his experiences with researching family history. Jerry encouraged the group to follow all siblings, their marriages, and cousins to locate family memorabilia and knowledge. One example is to use the Social Security Death Index to identify a person's place of residence and death date. From that information, locate an obituary which hopefully will provide a list of survivors. Contact the survivors concerning your family history questions.

Newspapers – A Lesson shared by member Annette Bowen

In Trevia Wooster Beverly's latest newsletter, The Tejas Gazette March 2017, she mentioned to be sure to search more than just one newspaper for your relative's death notice or obituary. This reminded me of my find. My grandmother had lived in Jackson, Mississippi, for about 40 years at the time of her death. Her obit in the Jackson newspapers was just the basics - dates of birth and death, survivors, etc. I never thought to look for her obituary in the town where she had lived for the first few years of her marriage until I found a letter, dated 1951, from the editor of the newspaper in that town to my mother. She had apparently written to him, asking for a copy of the paper with her mother's obituary. He must have sent it to her, although I did not find it. He said he remembered her mother, and he also sent her the "Exposition Edition" of his newspaper from 1904 which contained a photo of her father and information about the town and prominent people there. My grandfather was cashier of the bank and on its board of directors at the time. I had found those copies and had no idea where they came from. Mystery solved! I now knew to look for my grandmother's obituary in the newspaper from that town. It included, in addition to the details from the Jackson papers, the editor's memories of my grandmother, adding color to the picture of her early life.

Newspapers are a wonderful source for unexpected information!
