Friday, May 26, 2017: Thomas Green discusses research resources and strategies for SRT and SAR membership and Potluck Dinner

We meet at the University Baptist Church (UBC) in the Chapel on the 1st floor (16106 Middlebrook Drive, Houston, TX 77059 - online map).

Thomas Bruce Green III, a U.S. Navy veteran, is active in both the Sons of the Republic of Texas (SRT) and the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and spends much of his time promoting these two Societies. He was inducted as a Knight of the Order of San Jacinto at the annual convention of the SRT in 2006, the highest award of the SRT, which was started in 1843 by President Sam Houston during the Republic of Texas days. Tom has received the National Merit Award by the Freedom Foundation of Valley Forge, the George Washington Distinguished Service Award by the Paul Carrington SAR Chapter, and the San Jacinto Star Award by the San Jacinto SRT Chapter. Tom is a Colonel in the Texas Army and an Admiral in the Texas Navy. Tom is also a member of the American Legion and the North American Vexillological Association (the study of flags) and has collected or made over 75 historic flags of both the American Revolutionary and the Texas Revolutionary periods. Sons of the Republic Of Texas

The *first* Sons of the Republic of Texas was formed on April 21, 1893, at Richmond, Texas, by several sons and grandsons of veterans of the Texas Revolution. Their main purpose was to accompany the Texas Veterans Association members to their annual reunions. The Texas Veterans Association ceased to exist when its last member, Alphonso Steele, died in 1911. With the demise of the Texas Veterans Association, the Sons of the Republic of Texas (SRT) slowly became inactive. However, in 1922 the ideas were revitalized. The State of Texas chartered the SRT in 1934.

The SRT has been an active leader in preserving Texas' rich heritage. In 1936, the SRT was instrumental in the design and construction of the San Jacinto Monument and the founding of the Museum. In 1957, the SRT influenced the Texas legislature to appropriate funds for the construction of the Texas State Library and Archive Building. In 2003, the SRT and other historical organizations worked with the Texas legislature to designate March as Texas History Month. In 2005, the SRT led the movement for the Texas legislature to designate the third Saturday in September of each year as Texian Navy Day.

Annually, the SRT awards monetary gifts and presents medals and certificates for the purpose of fostering and encouraging Republic of Texas history, scholarship and literary works. The **Summerfield G. Roberts Award** is given to the author of the outstanding work published on early Texas during the year. **Three college scholarships** are granted annually to high school seniors through an essay writing contest. **Educator of the Year Award** for outstanding efforts or activities that promoted the study of the history of the Republic of Texas. **The Presidio La Bahía Award** is given to best published book, paper, article periodical article, or project researching the Spanish colonial period of Texas.

Texas Resource Resources

The Kathryn Stoner O'Connor Mexican Manuscript Collection, 1555-1987

collected by the Sons of the Republic of Texas, is made up of 5,400 printed and manuscript documents, periodicals, pamphlets, and broadsides, predominantly written in Spanish, and ranging in date from the 16th through the 20th centuries. The collection includes government documents, financial records, legal petitions, political and ecclesiastical decrees, wills and legal testaments, and personal and business letters. A broad array of topics is covered in the collection, including information on government, politics, finances, work, religion, social status, marriage and family, and numerous other subjects of social and historical interest. The Bexar Archives consists of over 80 linear feet of Spanish and Mexican records relating to the governance of Texas and is one of the most important sources for the history of Texas prior to 1836 (i.e. the Spanish province of Texas and the Mexican state of Coahulia y Texas). The Archives have been housed at the University of Texas at Austin since 1899. Recently the Briscoe Center for American History began digitizing the Bexar Archives and providing transcriptions and translations for select items. (continued on page 6)

Texas Resource Resources (continued)

The Bexar Archives Online

(www.cah.utexas.edu/projects/bexar/index.php) is an innovative web-based resource that features over 5,000 original documents (23,000 pages) that have been digitized from microfilm. Researchers may browse, by year, the originals and translations, or compare an original and its translation side-by-side. Full-text searching of the translations is also supported. The Laredo Archives consists of 3,245 documents

recording the history of Laredo from its founding in 1755 to 1848, when it became part of the United States. The Laredo Archives consist of the official documents preserved at Laredo under the rule of Spain, Mexico, the Republic of Texas, and the United States. Edicts from the Spanish king, the viceroy, and the archbishop, together with correspondence of the alcaldes, military and land records, election returns, census records, and other local matters were accumulated at Laredo in the conduct of the government. Materials are transcripts and microfilm copies of the Laredo Archives, dating from 1749 to 1896, with the bulk dating from 1768 to 1834. This archives are located on the 2nd Floor of the Blume Library at the St. Mary's University in San Antonio, TX. There are seven digitized indexes available through The Portal of Texas History (https://texashistory.unt.edu).
