

### World War I Resources - US Army Transport Lists

The *U.S., Army Transport Service, Passenger Lists, 1910-1939* collection recorded details on all persons leaving or arriving at U.S. ports on U.S. Army Transport Service ships. In addition to troops, passengers could also include nurses and other support personnel, family members, and any other passengers who may have been traveling onboard these ships. In some instances, troops from other countries traveled on U.S. Army ships as well. For example, this collection includes BAGS member Garry Garrett's grandfather, Ellie H. Garrett. The left page shows him traveling to France from Hoboken, New Jersey on July 26, 1918 as a Private First Class in Company "B" 141 Infantry, 36 Division. The entry also list his residence as Driftwood, Texas and his mother Mrs. John A. Garrett as next of kin. On the right page, Ellie H. Garrett traveling to Hoboken, New Jersey from St. Nazaire, France on March 25, 1919 as part of a group that was sick and wounded from Base Hospital 216 Convalescent Detachment No. 54 St. Nazaire. It states he had a gun shot wound in the left ankle and right leg. We also learn the initial "A" in his mother's name stands for Anna.

#### **Lost Merchant Marines**

The U.S. Merchant Marine is a fleet of privately owned ships that act as an auxiliary arm of the military, transporting troops and supplies during wartime. This *U.S., Lists of Merchant Seamen Lost in WWI, 1914-1919* collection contains a list prepared by the Marine and Seamen's Division of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance of casualties and ships during World War I. The collection includes officers, seamen, enlisted personnel, and civilians that were either killed, wounded, or captured.

#### **Gold Star Mothers**

BAGS member Gale French discussed the Gold Star Mother pilgrimage during the April 2017 general meeting. His handout contained website addresses to records and information resources. That handout is available on the BAGS website **www.TxBayAreaGen.org**. Click on the "Members Page" and then after entering the password, click on "Archived Meeting Handouts". On the next page, click on the **2017-04-28** entry. The U.S. government invited and paid for mothers, stepmothers, and widows to travel overseas to visit the grave of their family member who died during active service in World War I and was interred in Europe. These women and their associated soldiers are listed in a book titled *Pilgrimage for the mothers and widows of soldiers, sailors and marines of the American forces: now interred in the cemeteries of Europe as provided by the Act of Congress of March 2, 1929*. This book is available at the Clayton Library (call# 40.465 USA) and through Ancestry.com and FamilySearch.org. Entries include the woman's place of residence, the soldier's rank, organization, and cemetery where interred.

FamilySearch.org: https://familysearch.org/search/catalog/289103 accesses the complete book for free. The book is organized by state and then by county within the state. Search for names within the book. Download the complete book or print individual pages.

Ancestry.com: http://search.ancestry.com/search/db.aspx?dbid=4224 accesses a search index. View search results using a free account. Original pages can be viewed using a subscription login or access from within a Family History Center, Houston Public Library, Harris County Public Library, or Fort Bend Public Library.

### **WWI Enemy Alien Registrations**

In an attempt to minimize the threat from German aliens residing in the United States, the Presidential Proclamation of April 6, 1917 required persons of German birth who had not completed the naturalization process to register with the Justice Department. These records contain detailed family information, a physical description, fingerprints and a photo of the individuals registered. Currently only records from San Francisco, CA and Kansas have been digitized.

A BIG THANK YOU to Melodey Hauch for her presentation on the removal of Texas City's historic Campbell's Bayou Cemetery and reinterment in Forest Park East Cemetery in Webster. Fascinating to take an inside look at the steps taken to locate, identify, preserve, and re-inter



the people found buried in the Campbell's Bayou Cemetery. Much care, compassion, and research was put to this project. The research helped establish individuals as well as family relationships between the individuals. A large monument was placed at the re-interment location which provides the history and the original handwritten lists of family names provided by two sisters. Those original records were an invaluable resource in the identification process. The published government report covering all stages of the project is archived at the Galveston County Museum located at 722 Moody Ave., Galveston, Texas (www.galvestoncountymuseum.org)
