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


How the war reshaped the world and the lasting effects still present today. Presented by Kevin Burke, a WWI historian and re-enactor and a Friendswood resident.

Few Tips and Tricks Shared From The All-Day Genealogy Live Webinars held Friday, October 19

- Once you have found the name of a living cousin from an online tree contribution, message posting, or DNA match, use Veromi.net (<u>www.veomi.net</u>) to search their names. The initial results can show estimated age, multiple residences and clues to other relatives and maiden name possibilities.
- Adoptee strategy for reviewing DNA test results: Look at the associated family trees and based on
 the listed ancestors try to map the DNA test takers into two family groups with the hope that one
 group will represent living cousins on your maternal side and the other group represents your
 paternal side.
- The United State Census Bureau website provides another of resources to help you interpret information found on the Federal censuses. On the "Through The Decades" page (www.census.gov/history/www/through_the_decades), you can access the list of census questions asked by decade (Index of Questions), the instructions given to the enumerators (Census instructions), and pop culture facts by decade (Fast Facts). Check out list of available state censuses, funded by the individual US States

www.census.gov/history/www/genealogy/other_resources/state_censuses.html Keep in mind there are also a few county censuses, funded by the county independent of the state. Consult the individual US state archives to determine how to access state or county censuses. Also, search the Mortality Censuses for the years 1850, 1860, 1870, 1880, and 1885. This is a list of persons who had died in the year immediately preceding the official Federal census. A few of these censuses are in FamilySearch.org however, HeritageQuest and Ancestry.com have all of them. The information provides death date, location, cause, age, profession, residency but unfortunately not next of kin. (continued on page 6)

"Digitizing Your Own Family Records" September Program Recap

Thank you to Sue Yerby and Fidel Ramirez for their dual presentation on the latest digitization news and the why and how to create electronic images of personal papers and memorabilia (a.k.a. digitize). Digitize, digitize, digitize to extend the lifespan, survive natural disasters, and share your collected family history.

Psst. Did you know

Clayton Library Center for Genealogical Research offers equipment for you to scan your photos, slides, and documents creating digital files to be stored on your USB drive or cloud storage. Create digital


files in the format of JPG, PDF, searchable PDF, TIFF, or PNG. Reservations required. Please call the library (832-393-2600) and schedule a specific date and time up to one month in advance. The equipment available:

- Kodak EZ Photo Scanner, a device capable of high-quality bulk photo scanning at the rate of 25 photos per minute
- Flatbed photo scanner for photographs and documents that cannot or should not be put through the bulk photo scanner.
- Kodak SlideSnap Lite, a quick and easy way to convert photographic images found on slides into digital images.

A minimum scanning dots per inch (DPI) setting for documents is 300 DPI and for photographs is 600 DPI according to page 5 of *Digital Record And Digitization Standards* document published by the LDS Church (2016) online at www.lds.org/callings/church-history-adviser/bc/pdf/records-preservation-centers/digitization-standards-2016.pdf. BAGS member Gale French recommends creating two digital images for each photograph. One digitized file at 300 DPI setting to create a smaller sized file that is easier to post, email, share and the other digitized file at 600 DPI setting for the greatest detail and serve as your official archive/backup copy.

- Store photographs and documents in materials that are PAT (Photographic Activity Test) Certified, in international standard test for evaluating photo-storage and display products. Look for archive storage products from suppliers such as Brodart (www.shopbrodart.com), Gaylord (www.gaylord.com) and Light Impressions (www.lightimpressionsdirect.com).
- Energize family participation in your family history work by using Instagram and "Genealogy Photo A Day" challenge. To help you choose which photo to post, daily theme prompts are published at the beginning of the month. Post a family picture that relates to the theme with a short caption on Instagram and include #genealogyphotoaday. Posting and receiving comments/feedback is fun, interactive, and educational for family members of all ages. Access the complete list of October's prompts at www.instagram.com/p/BoZAYdIgP4p For example, on October 22 the theme prompt was beverage.
